CHAIR BENNETT: Let me call the meeting to order and ascertain the quorum. Can I get a here from Ms. Greenfield?

MEMBER GREENFIELD: Here.

CHAIR BENNETT: Can I get a here from Mr. Gill?

MEMBER GILL: This is Mike Gill here.

CHAIR BENNETT: Okay. Great. So, we have a quorum. I'm Michael Bennett, Chair of the Board and I am here. I'd like to get a (1) I'd like to get a motion to adopt the minutes from the last meeting and I'd like to amend the agenda to move the report from Campaign Finance from Item Number 2 to just after Board Matters. So, if I can get a motion to approve the minutes from the December meeting as well as the amending of the agenda that would be great. Mr. Gill?

MEMBER GILL: Motion to approve to change the agenda and the minutes from the last meeting.

17	CHAIR BENNETT: Great, thank you. Mr.
18	Gill?
19	MEMBER GILL: Same thing, Happy New
20	Year. It just good to be past, looking forward
21	to 2021.
22	CHAIR BENNETT: Absolutely. And I echo

that and don't have any other matters for the Board other than from the Board at least from me other than the fact that it was gratifying to see how straightforward our diligence. Apparently our colleagues in Georgia were with regard to insuring that they a successful vote. I was really surprised that they broke --- I think they broke their record by almost three percent and had no lines at the polls from the final day of election which says a lot of the efforts in terms of early voting which, I think, is very instructive for the entire nation and certainly for us. So, kudos to the election administration in Georgia.

So, if that is it we can go to Board Matters. So, if I could go to Ms. Montgomery and get the report from the Office of Campaign Finance.

MS. MONTGOMERY: Good morning and, again, Happy New Year to everyone. First, I will report from the Office of Campaign Finance that is still operating under a modified status. All

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of our services are being provided remotely by email and also by telephone. We can be reached at 202-671-0547. And that number is being manned by Resident Williams who is the Manager of our Public Records and Information Division.

In the Fair Elections Program Division during the month of December the activity of the division is as follows. As of December the 31st, 2020, the total sum of \$6,009,449.90 has been disbursed and base amount in matching payments to 36 candidates who were certified in the Fair Election Program to participate in the General Session 2020 primary election, the June 16, 2020, special election and the November the 3rd, 2020, general election.

During December 2020 the total sum of \$8,105 were distributed in matching payments to the following five FEP participating candidates.

One, on December the 16th two matching payments were made to Friends of Allister Chang. The first amount was \$100. The second was \$300. On December the 17th a matching payment of \$1,780

was made to Christina Henderson. Also on

December 17th three matching payments were made
to Washington Ward 8 in the amount of \$250, \$200
and \$100. On December the 17th, 2020, the amount
of \$5,050 was paid to elect Janeese Lewis. On
December the 17th, 2020, the amount of \$325 was
authorized in matching payments to re-elect
Trayon White 2020.

In all there were 20 candidates who were certified as participating candidates in the program for the November 2020 General Election.

Twelve candidates were certified in the June 2nd, 2020, Primary Election and four were certified in the June 16th, 2020 Special.

The following FEP candidates were elected to office in the November General Election and certified as winners by the Board on December the 2nd, 2020. The first was Christina D. Henderson, At-Large Member of the Council. The second was Janeese Lewis George, Ward 4, Member of the Council. The third was Trayon White, Ward 8, Member of the Council. Fourth was

Allister Chang, Ward 2, Member of the State Board of Education. The fifth was Frazier O'Leary, Ward 4, Member of the State Board of Education. The sixth was Eboni Rose Thompson, Ward 7, Member of the State Board of Education and the seventh was Dr. Carlene D. Reid, Ward 8, Member of the State Board of Education.

Also in the Division during the month of December the Division conducted 42 desk reviews of the mandatory December the 10th, 2020, report and also amended reports that were received in Receipts and Expenditures which was received in the Agency. They also issued nine requests for additional information letters. During the month of December the Division forwarded 20 recommendations for the division of funds to the Office of the General Counsel on December the 2nd, 2020, to the 20 candidates who participated in the General Election. And the names of those candidates are listed in our report and the report will be posted this afternoon at the website of the Office of

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Campaign Finance.

There are 14 ongoing audits in the division and there are 10 post election audits with respect to the June 2nd, 2020, Primary Election. The audits were initiated on June the 19th, 2020, of the campaign operations of those candidates who did not proceed to the General Election. Those names of those candidates are listed in the report as well as the status of the ongoing audits and, again, that information will be posted at the website this afternoon.

This the post election audit of the June 16th, 2020, Special Election. There are four ongoing audits. The audits were initiated on July the 6th, 2020, and, again, those audits are of the Campaign Operations of the Candidates who participated in the Special Election and the status of those audits is listed in our report. And, again, the report will be posted at the end of the day for view by members of the public.

In our Public Information and Record

Management Division, during the month of December

there were four filing deadlines for the filing of reports of Receipts and Expenditures. The first report was due on December the 1st, 2020, and that was by our Legal Defense Committee that are registered with the Agency. At this time there's one required filer that were timely filed and also electronically filed their report.

With our Principal Campaign Committee and Political Action Committee who were active during the 2020 election cycle. The Report of Receipts and Expenditures was due on December the 10th. There are 78 replied files, 67 timely filed, 3 late files, 2 requested extensions and extensions were approved, 7 failed to file. There were 10 referrals to the Office of General Counsel for enforcement and 70 of the filers electronically filed their report.

With the Fair Elections Program

December the 10th was also the filing deadline

for the filing of the Report of Receipts and

Expenditures for those Campaign Committee. There

were 42 required filers, 30 timely filed, 2 late

filed, 8 requested extensions and the extensions were granted. Nine failed to file. There were 11 referrals to the Office of General Counsel and 30 of the campaigns electronically filed their report.

December the 10th was also the filing deadline for the filing of the Report of Receipts and Expenditures by our Independent Expenditure Committee. There were three required filers.

All three timely filed. One did late file. With respect to the referrals there was one referral to the Office of the General Counsel and all three electronically filed their reports.

During the month of December we also had new committees who registered with the Office of Campaign Finance. The first was the D.C. Black Democratic Caucus which is a Political Action Committee and that committee registered on December the 18th, 2020. We also had a Recall Committee which registered Mayor Muriel Bowser, Default Committee registered on December the 24th, 2020. We also conducted mandatory

conference during the month of December and the candidates and treasurers who completed the presentations for December number one, Dawn Crawford, Treasurer of the Committee to Elect Mysiki Valentine. Two, Lauren Cain for Treasurer of election meeting 2020.

Again there were 21 referrals to the Office of the General Counsel due to the failure to file the December 10th Report of Receipts and Expenditures. And the names of those committee and treasurer are listed in our report and, again, they will posted on our website at the end of the day.

In our report of Analysis and Audit
Division which is responsible for our traditional
program. The activity during the month of
December was as follows. The Audit Division
conducted 95 desk reviews of the Report of
Receipts and Expenditures that had been filed
with the Agency that included 51 reports filed by
the Political Action Committee and 37 reports
filed by principals on campaign committees. The

Division issued 22 requests for additional information. The Division resolved 16 of those matters and deferred three matters to the Office of the General Counsel.

Also during the month of December the Audit Branch issued five final audit reports.

The first, and these were periodic audit reports.

The first one was a committee who participated in the 2020 election cycle and they were of the January 31st filing. The first was Friends of Robert White. The audit report was issued on December the 17th, data from Ward 7. The report was issued on December the 4th. The third was a committee to elect Rogers for Council. Report was issued on December the 17th.

The fourth report was Firefighters

Committee on Political Activities and that was
issued on December the 4th. That was a periodic
random audit of Political Action Committee of
their January 31st filing. And the last was of a
Constituent Service Program and that was of the
October the 1st, 2020, filing. That was the Do

Something Constituent Fund Program and that report was issued on December the 4th, 2020.

All of the reports are available at our website to be reviewed by members of the public and all the reports were compliant audit reports which means that the committees complied with all of the requirements of the Audit Branch. So, that concludes my report, but I would ask that the General Counsel now provide his report for the public and that would be Bill Sanford.

CHAIR BENNETT: Thank you. Mr.

Sanford?

MR. SANFORD: Good morning, Mr.

Chairman and distinguished Board Members. My

name is William Sanford. I'd like to wish

everyone a safe, happy and healthy New Year.

During the month of December 2020, the Office of

the General Counsel received 23 referrals,

completed 20 informal hearings and issued 20

orders which included the following.

Twelve orders were issued in which no fines were imposed. Seven orders were issued in

which fines totaling \$12,200 were imposed and one order was issued which vacated the Notice of Hearing Statements of Violation. During the month of December 2020, the Office of the General Counsel imposed fines totaling \$12,200 against the following respondents.

A fine of \$1,800 was imposed against
Develop Freemore 2020 Principal Campaign
Committee. A fine of \$1,600 was imposed against
D.C. Dental Park. A fine of \$1,800 was imposed
against the Friends for Ward 8, Principal
Campaign Committee. A fine of \$1,800 was imposed
against the Ivan Floyd for U.S. Representative,
Principal Campaign Committee. A fine of \$1,800
was imposed against Committee to Elect Harry Red.
A fine of \$1,600 was imposed against the Senior
United Pact and a fine of \$1,800 was imposed
against the Edwards Award for Principal Campaign
Committee.

During the month of December 2020 there were no open investigations in the Office of the General Counsel and during the month of

1	2020 there were no requests for interpretive

3	conducted. And that should complete my report.

17	CHAIR BENNETT: Next on the Agenda is
18	the Executive Director's Report for the Board of
19	Elections, Ms. Alice Miller.
20	MS. MILLER: Yes. Thank you, everyone
21	and let me join in with the previous comments and
22	I wish everyone a Happy New Year and hope that

you all remain safe and healthy. I will begin by going to the fact that we did certify the

November Election on December 2nd. The result of the certification was sent to Secretary of the

City, Beverly Bacchus and the Mayor Muriel Bowser as we are required to do. The city then went forth and held the formal electoral vote of the District of Columbia election on December 14th and all of that is conducted under the auspices of the Secretary of the City.

Those results were also from our office is sent over to the President of the Senate and the Congress so all of our certification processes with respect to the November election were finally complete by the middle of December. I want to put on the record the status of poll worker payments. There have been issues associated with that and so I want to just make clear what exact has occurred since the poll worker's checks were mailed out in early December.

There were 5,057 checks mailed to

election workers from information provided from our office to the Office of Finance and Resource Management which is the Board's physical office entity. So, the Office of Finance and Resource Management handles and processes all of the information that we provide them. We mailed --- we gave them --- they processed checks for election workers on December 4th, December 11th and December 17th. On December 21st the Board was notified by the Office of Finance and Resource Management that there was a processing error with some of the election worker payments.

There were some election workers who were overpaid, 337. And there were 339 workers who were underpaid. So, the Board staff then emailed all of the election workers who were issued incorrect checks, a little over 600 obviously of what the problem was and that the fact that the Office of Finance and Resource Management was working to try to correct this error because that was totally within their authority to do that within your hands.

payments put on checks of those individuals who were issued overpayments. Supplemental checks in the meantime were mailed to those who received under payments. So, OFRM issued the stop payments on the overpayment checks and they then began immediately to process the supplemental payments for those individuals who were under paid.

supplemental checks that were issued. OFRM has informed the Board and we've been working very closely with them to get this matter resolved. They informed the Board that as of January 4th all of the checks have, in fact, been reissued. So, I want to put on the record that this has been an extremely frustrating process for the election workers who, of course, had been entitled to or expecting their money and under the circumstances that they were certainly should not have dealt with any challenges with respect to getting their money. This was not acceptable.

Election under circumstances that were very challenging to them in light of the health emergencies that were in place and the delay was absolutely unacceptable for whatever reason it happened. I do know that OFRM has accepted responsibility for the error and they have been working to resolve it as quickly as they can.

I'm just going to say going forward errors of this magnitude should not and cannot be repeated. We need to work to make certain that our workers are paid on time with the correct amount without any challenges to them receiving their checks.

I know that there have been a few delays with respect to our Postal Service from some of the batches of checks that were issued.

I'm told that most of those are coming from checks that were issued on December 11th. That is obviously without any control that either the Government Agency, OFRM, or the Board has and we're addressing issues as well. With those workers we need them to work with us to make a

decision as to whether or not they want us to put a stop payment on the checks which would result in additional delays. If they get the checks they wouldn't be able to cash it because we would have to do a whole another reissue of the checks.

So, I just want to put that on the record because it is an ongoing issue and we're working hard to resolve it and we want to apologize to our workers who supported us without question for the November election. Any questions on that? No?

CHAIR BENNETT: No. No questions.

MS. MILLER: All right. So, just a little bit about some of our populations that we worked with for the November election and I'll just give you some stats. We had to restore the vote enacted by the Council which required the Board to have voters registered to vote who were incarcerated in Federal prison and both the Bureau of Federal Prisons and in D.C. who may have been incarcerated for a felony.

With that, even though we were not

required to work with the Federal prison so in 2021 we actually got that in place this year and these voters were able to get registered and vote for the November 2020 election. And the results of that show that we had issued 513 ballots to the Federal prisoners of which we received back 248 ballots that were counted and were returned back to the office. So, I want to recognize that because it was a heavy lift. It was lot of work. We did not have immediate access to the information and the data and my staff working directly with the Bureau of Federal Prisons and a number of other independent agencies who were able to get information that allowed us to get that in place a year before it was required or at least before it was required to be in place.

We also had numbers come back from the D.C. jail with respect to prisoners who were incarcerated for felonies or for raids for that matter and with respect to those numbers we sent out 401 ballots and we received 333 ballots back. So, again, you know, the credit goes to the staff

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who worked hard to get that done and to get this process started. We have work to do in order to clean it up and to make certain that it moves forward in a more positive way as we move ahead.

With respect to our ward coordinator and our senior residential ballot election I think everyone knows we worked hard We tried to get seniors to vote who with that. were not comfortable with going out or who did not want to leave their ballots to the mail or the ballot drop processes for one reason or another. At the end of the day we had 57 participating senior buildings for us to work with them to receive their ballots in person. So the senior buildings, most of which were collected from convalescing and nursing home facilities and, of course, our long-standing partnership with individual communities that we have with the senior homes.

We were able to collect from those numbers about 1,200 ballots over a period of a week. Where staff actually went in as well as

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the ward coordinators to physically pick up those ballots and collect them the bring them back to the Board's offices. We found that most of the senior were, in fact, relying on the mail and were helpful with putting their ballots in the mail. But as I said close to 1,200 ballots were physically hand collected.

And just one more thing with respect to our student population. We did have 828 student applications who submitted their applications to work with the election worker division during the General Election and to assist us during the process for getting through pollworker processes with the November election. So, we're happy with that. We hope those numbers will increase and, of course, elevate, escalate and in light of COVID all of this is commendable and the staff should be recognized for it. So, that's why I wanted to put it on the record. And that concludes our report.

CHAIR BENNETT: Great. Thank you, Ms. Miller. Are there any questions from the Board.

Ms. Greenfield?

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MEMBER GREENFIELD: I don't have any questions.

CHAIR BENNETT: Mr. Gill?

MEMBER GILL: No questions. Just Alice, thanks for that update I wasn't aware of that. It sounds like we are, you know, standing between us and the Office of Finance that issued them which I fought and I know that it's not our error and it's not our procedure. But for our workers they're going to us to fix it. And so I know that you have to sort of stand between the two entities. But I appreciate it. It sounds like that's what you've been doing and I encourage you to continue that so that our workers don't have to go directly to the Government to try to figure out that we're a resource and an advocate for them.

MS. MILLER: Well, we've involved OFRM pretty -- pre-election as well and, again, we'll give credit to the staff who has put up and had to unfortunately deal with, you know, a lot of

angry and frustrated pollworkers understandably.

So OFRM is very much in the midst of this.

Emails have gone it and have indicated that

because we want to make sure that they understand
the breath of the problem as well so they can
hurry and get it addressed and resolved.

MEMBER GILL: Got you. Thank you.

CHAIR BENNETT: I have a little bit on that Mr. Gill, on that so this particular election cycle where we had far more poll workers than we've ever had before. It's important to make sure that they get paid and that we work with them -- that the administrative process to work with them, you know, continues and we get them paid appropriately because I would imagine going forward we are going to need more poll workers than we had before based on how we have to collect elections in the future. So, thanks, Ms. Miller, for making sure those things are ironed out. And to Mr. Gill's point, you know, making sure that the poll workers know that we're working on their behalf in trying to get paid

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both promptly and efficiently.

So, with that, I'll move onto the next report of the General Council. Ms. Stroud.

MS. STROUD: Good morning, everyone, and Happy New Year. The first item on my agenda is the issuance and formal adoption of a petition to the Samuel Troper for the proposed recall of Muriel Bowser, the Mayor of the District of Columbia.

So, byway background pursuant to D.C. Official Code 1-1001.17(e), the Board must approve a recall petition form before it can be circulated. The Board is required to prepare and provide to the proponent an original petition form at a public meeting which is what we're doing today which the proponent must formally adopt as their own. And the adoption of that form by the proponent triggers the 180 day period during which the proponent must collect signatures in support of a petition so that the measure, the recall measure may be placed on the ballot.

I just wanted to give some background on the current state of the law with respect to the recall petition. Under current law the recall petition that we are discussing today must be circulated in person. So, during the 2020 election cycle there was legislation in place that allowed for the electronic circulation of initiative referendum and nominating petition but the law was not similarly admitted with respect to recall petition. So, currently the status of the law provides that the petition form must be circulated in person.

Now, we've notified the Council as to the status of the law so that they could take action with respect to if they, you know, choose to but the Board has communicated with Council staff with respect to this issue. But as it stands, the Board issuance of the petition form and the adoption by the proponent triggers the 180 day period. Are there questions or does anyone --- do the Board members have any comments with respect that?

MEMBER GILL: I don't have questions,
Terri, thanks.

CHAIR BENNETT: Yeah, no questions or comments. Wanted to get some input from the proponent relative to how they'd like to proceed.

MR. TROPER: Yeah, this is Sam. I was curious if we could, I wonder, I do not know that the law that was issued last year did not pertain to recall elections as well. So, I'm curious if we have an issue but delay the adoption of this until I communicate or you communicate with the Council and learn their intentions to adopt a law for recall elections or not.

MS. STROUD: Thank you, Mr. Troper.

There is an actual precedent for the delay of the Board's issuance of a form. It happened with respect to Initiative 81 for precisely this reason. The petitioners had requested that the Council enact legislation with respect to initiative measure circulation in light of the fact that there was a pandemic.

And so the Council as you are aware

1 did enact legislation eventually but in the 2 meantime the board did hold the issuance of the petition in abeyance. And is that what you're 3 requesting that the Board not issue the petition 4 5 today and do a docket today which would trigger another 180 day circulation period? 6 7 MR. TROPER: That's correct. 8 MS. STROUD: Okay. So, before the 9 Board is to assess on the part of the proponent and it's similar to delay the issuance of the 10 11 recall petition. 12 CHAIR BENNETT: Are there any questions 13 by the Board Members? Ms. Greenfield? 14 MEMBER GREENFIELD: No, I don't have any other questions. 15 16 CHAIR BENNETT: Mr. Gill? 17 MEMBER GILL: No questions. Thank you 18 very much. 19 And I don't CHAIR BENNETT: Okay. 20 have any questions. Is there a question with 21 regard to 22 the delay of the petition issuance.

Ms. Stroud, do you not want to bring it before the Board today relative to the issuance of that petition and have them take it off the agenda?

MS. STROUD: Yes. I think we should proceed the same that we did with respect to Initiative 81. And the Board during its meeting on February 5th with respect to that measure acted to delay the issuance of a decision. The Board could issue it but we have a ready. request that the Board not issue the petition. There's no --- the proponent is a registered qualified elector who properly verifies the contribution with the Office of Campaign Finance and all were proper in all with respect from Mr. Troper that the Board issue to whether or not to issue the actual petition. We received from the Mayor the form has been reviewed but we just wouldn't issue it today.

CHAIR BENNETT: Okay. All right. Any other comments? I see Ms. Cameron is muted. Do you have any comments, Ms. Cameron?

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1	MS. CAMERON: No objection to a brief
2	delay for this reason that it has to go before
3	the Mayor for an opportunity to consult on the
4	matter.
5	CHAIR BENNETT: Okay. Thanks.
6	Ms. Stroud, I will call for a vote. I
7	don't need to but I will anyway. A motion to
8	delay the issuance of this petition. I need a
9	motion, Mr. Gill, to delay the issuance of this
10	petition.
11	MEMBER GILL: Yes. I move that we
12	delay the issuance based on the Council's
13	summary.
14	CHAIR BENNETT: Ms. Greenfield, a
15	second?
16	MEMBER GREENFIELD: I second it.
17	CHAIR BENNETT: It's been properly
18	moved and seconded. I'll get a Board vote. Mr.
19	Gill?
20	MEMBER GILL: Aye.
21	CHAIR BENNETT: Ms. Greenfield?
22	MEMBER GREENFIELD: Aye.

CHAIR BENNETT: And aye from me as well.

So, the petition is merely delayed and we will explore it going forward until Council recommends.

All right. Ms. Stroud?

MS. STROUD: Thank you. The next item on my agenda is Litigation Status. The first case in litigation status is Phillip Hammond v. This matter which was filed in the D.C. DC BOE. Court of Appeals is an appeal of Board Order Number 19-032 which upheld the resolution of ANC 7(b) that found no vacancy and FMD 7004 on the basis that Mr. Hammond did not meet the burden of proving that Commissioner Nicole Smith-McDermott did not meet residency qualifications necessary for her as an advisor and move her as commissioner and form the District 7(b)04. case was consolidated with the next case in litigation status. Marlin v. DC BOE, by order of the Court of Appeals dated September 24th, 2019.

The petitioner filed their brief in

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this matter on December 16th and their appendix on March 4th. We filed our response on April 5th and we expect the court to decide the merits of this matter soon.

The next case which was consolidated with the aforementioned case is Robin Marlin v DC BOE. This was filed in the D.C. Court of Appeals and it's an appeal of Board Order 19-033 which upheld the resolution of ANC-7(b) finding the vacancy as a Single Member District 7(b)05 on the basis that Ms. Marlin did not meet the burden of providing that Commissioner Valerie Johnson was not qualified to serve as ANC Commissioner for ANC7(b)05 on the basis of residency.

The next matter is Alliance Party v DC BOE. This was filed in D.C. District Court and was handled by the District Office of the Attorney General. It was a complaint against the Board that sought to preclude the Board from enforcing the August 5th, 2020, ballot access filing deadline against independent influence by candidates for the Office of United States

President.

And what happened was the Council had passed legislation that lowered the signature requirements for every office except for the Office of President. And so it was a challenge to that statute.

The Court denied the plaintiff's motion for a TRO, a Temporary Restraining Order on on September 3rd, but the plaintiff still sought to litigate the case on the merits. On November 5th the Office of the Attorney General filed a motion to dismiss and that motion was granted on December 7th, 2020.

And the last case is Kathy Henderson v. DC BOE. Ms. Henderson asked the D.C. Court of Appeals to review the outcome of the At-Large Member of the Council contest on the form.

This matter was filed in the District Court of Appeals --- actually it was single district 5B05. It was filed in the D.C. Court of

Appeals on December 9th, 2020. It's a petition 1 2 for review of ANC --- the ANC contest and formed in the District 5B05. The Board filed a motion 3 to dismiss for failure to stake a claim that 4 5 Congress release be granted on December 15th. The motion was held in abeyance by the court on 6 December 22nd because Ms. Henderson had failed to 7 8 pay the filing fee for the petition or 9 alternatively file a motion in forma pauperis. Ms. Henderson filed in opposition to the Board's 10 11 motion on December 23rd and she filed a motion in 12 forma pauperis on December 29th. The decision is 13 on the Court of Appeals on this matter. 14 And that concludes my litigation status and that concludes the Report of the 15 16 Office of the General Council. 17 CHAIR BENNETT: Great. Thank you. 18 question from the Board. Ms. Greenfield? 19 MEMBER GREENFIELD: No questions. 20 CHAIR BENNETT: Mr. Gill? 21 MEMBER GILL: No questions. Thank you. CHAIR BENNETT: Great. Thank you. 22 And

I have no questions. Thank you, Ms. Stroud. 1 2 Now we are and I believe the way we assess the (audio interference) but if I'm not 3 4 mistaken, Randy, people can get just unmute 5 themselves if they have a matter for the Board? MR. LEGETTE: Correct. If they are on 6 7 the phone they do *3 to raise their hand and I 8 can recognize them or if you already want to keep 9 it, you just hover over your name and there is a hand icon that you select to raise your hand. 10 11 CHAIR BENNETT: Okay. 12 So, let me go to --- Randy, can you 13 just unmute each person as we go --- that you 14 see? MR. LEGETTE: Yeah, anybody who raises 15 16 their hand I can unmute them or they can unmute 17 themselves. 18 CHAIR BENNETT: Okay. 19 MR. LEGETTE: It's probably better if 20 they unmute themselves. 21 CHAIR BENNETT: Okay. I see a hand or I'm not sure who. 22

MR. LEGETTE: That's me, sorry.

CHAIR BENNETT: All right.

MR. LEGETTE: So far no one has raised their hand so far.

CHAIR BENNETT: Okay. All right.

Going once? Going twice? Nobody raised their hand yet, Randy?

MR. LEGETTE: No, sir.

CHAIR BENNETT: Okay. Well, I will conclude the meeting with just one comment. And I want to thank you, Randy, Randy Legette, for probably the best technology driven meeting we have had to date. I think Webex is probably working pretty good. But I also know that it's not easy and you've done a great job making sure that this is probably the smoothest call out to everyone in a long time relative to work and regardless whether it's the Board of Elections or not. And I've been on a lot, you know, like most have. So, thank you very much. And with that unless there are any comments from other Board Members, Ms. Greenfield, Ms. Gill.
