3	CALL TO ORDER/ASCERTAINMENT OF QUORUM
4	CHAIR BENNETT: Good morning. This is
5	Michael Bennett, and this is the June meeting of
6	the D.C. Board of Elections. I'd like to call
7	the meeting to order. First, I want to ascertain
8	a quorum. Can I have Ms. Greenfield acknowledge
9	that she's present?
10	MEMBER GREENFIELD: I'm present.
11	CHAIR BENNETT: Thank you, Ms.
12	Greenfield. Can I have Mr. Gill acknowledge his
13	presence?
14	MEMBER GILL: I'm here, Michael.
15	CHAIR BENNETT: Thank you, Mr. Gill.
16	So we've got a quorum.
17	ADOPTION OF AGENDA/APPROVAL OF MINUTES
18	CHAIR BENNETT: I'd like to start out
19	first by adopting the agenda for today and also
20	approval of the minutes from the May 5th meeting,
21	which was the May meeting. Can I get a motion
22	from Mr. Gill to adopt the agenda for today and

to approve the minutes from the May 5th meeting, 1 2 the May meeting? 3 MEMBER GILL: I make a motion to 4 approve the minutes from the May meeting. 5 CHAIR BENNETT: Great. Can I get a second from Ms. Greenfield? 6 7 MEMBER GREENFIELD: I second. 8 CHAIR BENNETT: It's been properly 9 moved and seconded. Can I get a voice vote? Ms. 10 Greenfield. 11 MEMBER GREENFIELD: Aye. 12 CHAIR BENNETT: Mr. Gill. 13 MEMBER GILL: Aye. 14 CHAIR BENNETT: Mr. Gill. 15 MEMBER GILL: Aye. 16 CHAIR BENNETT: You may be on mute, 17 but I assume that's an aye. It's aye for me, as 18 well, so it's -- I think I see some motion. So 19 The agenda for today and the it is unanimous. 20 minutes from the last meeting are adopted. It is 21 now time for Board matters. Let me stop, though, before Board 22

1 matters, and make sure that our court reporter is 2 present. Can I get an acknowledgment from the 3 court reporter that they are present and that 4 they can hear? 5 (No audible response.) Yes, I got a thumb's 6 CHAIR BENNETT: 7 up. 8 BOARD MATTERS 9 CHAIR BENNETT: In the Board mattes, 10 Mr. Gill, do you have any Board matters today? 11 MEMBER GILL: No, I do not. 12 CHAIR BENNETT: Ms. Greenfield, do you 13 have any Board matters for today? 14 MEMBER GREENFIELD: No, I do not. 15 I do not, as well. CHAIR BENNETT: We 16 shifted the normal agenda around a little bit to 17 make sure we get to -- to be able to vote on a 18 couple things relatively early. We're going to 19 start off with the general counsel's report, Ms. 20 Terri Stroud. Thank you. GENERAL COUNSEL'S REPORT 21 22 MS. STROUD: Good morning, everyone.

I have on my agenda a final rulemaking. The rulemaking is to amend Chapter 10 to place that chapter into conformity with the newly enacted Initiative and Referendum Process Improvement Amendment Act of 2020, which took effect on March 16th.

Emergency and proposed rulemaking with 7 8 respect to this rulemaking was introduced at the Board's April 7th meeting, and it was published 9 in the D.C. Register on April 16th. 10 No written 11 comments on the proposed rules were received 12 during the public comment period, and no 13 substantive changes have been made to the 14 regulations as they were proposed. 15 As I discussed during the Board's 16 April meeting, the rulemaking reflects amendments 17 to the Board's regulations which reflect 18 legislation. It requires, among other things, 19 that the Board's drafted summary statement for the initiative be written in plain language. 20 21 The Board is required to request a 22 fiscal impact statement with respect to

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initiative measures from the Office of the Chief 1 2 Financial Officer and to request advisory opinions from the Office of the General Counsel 3 for the Council, as well as the attorney general. 4 5 They are required to submit advisory opinions within a certain time frame. 6 We're also required to publish our formulations with respect 7 to initiatives and referenda which were adopted 8 9 at a public meeting in the D.C. Register, at least one newspaper in general circulation, and 10 11 to be posted on the Board's website. That's a 12 summary of the regulations. I'm requesting that 13 the Board approve the rulemaking so that it can 14 be sent to the D.C. Register for publication. CHAIR BENNETT: It seems like our 15 16 camera's not on, but we're going to keep going. 17 We're going to try and fix that. I do understand 18 the camera's not on, but we're going to try to 19 fix that. Okay, can I get a motion from Mr. Gill 20 to approve the permanent rulemaking -- the final 21 rulemaking, sorry, that Ms. Stroud just

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described?

MEMBER GILL: I make a motion to 1 2 approve the final rulemaking with the general 3 counsel's description. CHAIR BENNETT: Okay. Can I get a 4 5 second from Ms. Greenfield? 6 MEMBER GREENFIELD: Yes, I second 7 that. 8 CHAIR BENNETT: It's been properly 9 moved and seconded. Get a voice vote. Ms. 10 Greenfield. 11 MEMBER GREENFIELD: Aye. 12 CHAIR BENNETT: Mr. Gill. 13 MEMBER GILL: Aye. 14 CHAIR BENNETT: Aye for me, as well, so it's unanimous. The final rulemaking is 15 16 complete. Thank you, Ms. Stroud. Can you 17 continue with your report? 18 MS. STROUD: That is the only item on 19 my agenda for today's meeting. 20 CHAIR BENNETT: Okay. Mr. Gill, do 21 you have any questions for the general counsel? 22 MEMBER GILL: No questions.

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1	CHAIR BENNETT: Ms. Greenfield, do you
2	have any questions for the general counsel on any
3	other matters?
4	MEMBER GREENFIELD: No, I don't have
5	any questions.
6	CHAIR BENNETT: Okay, great. Neither
7	do I. Thank you, Ms. Stroud. We're going to
8	move on
9	MS. STROUD: I'll just state, for the
10	record, that I will submit this, and it will be
11	published in the D.C. Register on next Friday,
12	not this coming Friday, but the next Friday.
13	CHAIR BENNETT: Okay, great. Thank
14	you. Also, now we have Item 6 on the agenda,
15	campaign finance, Ms. Cecily Montgomery.
16	CAMPAIGN FINANCE REPORT
17	MS. COLLIER-MONTGOMERY: Yes, good
18	morning. First, again, I would like to report
19	that the Office of Campaign Finance continues to
20	operate under a modified status. All of our
21	services continue to be provided remotely, by
22	email, as well as by telephone. We can be

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reached at 202-671-0547. 1 2 All candidate and committee reports will continue to be received online, at our 3 website, on the required deadlines. Candidates 4 may contact the office for instructions 5 concerning the registration process. 6 Commencing June 7, 2021, the OCF 7 managerial staff will return to the office for at 8 9 least 50 percent of their scheduled weekly tour of duty. Also, I want to announce, on the 10 record, that as of this date, the OCF line staff 11 12 is scheduled to return on July 12, 2021. 13 On May 21, 2021, the Office of 14 Campaign Finance published, at our website, fact sheets for the fair elections and the traditional 15 16 campaign finance programs during the 2020 17 election cycle. 18 The information brochures contained 19 information concerning the following deadlines 20 during the 2022 election cycle, as well as 21 information concerning the contribution limits 22 for the traditional program and the threshold

1 requirements for the fair elections program. 2 With community outreach during the month of May, 3 the Office of Campaign Finance once again 4 initiated its program with the advisory 5 neighborhood commissions across the city. During the month of May, the OCF 6 7 managers participated in the following ANC 8 virtual meetings: on Tuesday, May 4, ANC 4A; on 9 Wednesday, May 12, ANC 1C; on Wednesday, May 12, ANC 6C; and on Wednesday, May 19, ANC 5A. 10 11 With our fair election program, during 12 the month of May, again, during the 2020 election 13 cycle, the total sum of \$4,016,797.64 was disbursed from the fair elections fund in base 14 amount and matching payment to the 36 candidates 15 16 who were certified in the program to participate in the June 2, 2020 primary election, the June 17 18 16, 2020 special election, and the November 3, 19 2020 general election. The 2020 election cycle closed on 20 21 November 3, 2020, and the 2020 special election 22 cycle closed on June 16, 2020. During the month

of May 2021, there were no disbursements 1 2 authorized for base amount and matching payments from the fund for candidates who have registered 3 4 seeking to participate in the program during the The audit section of the 5 2022 election cycle. fair elections program during the month of May 6 7 conducted nine desk reviews of termination and amended reports of receipts and expenditures, 8 9 which have been filed with the Agency and, as a result of those desk reviews, issued four 10 11 requests for additional information. 12 As of May 31, 2020, the total fund of 13 \$132,148.07 have been remitted for deposit in the 14 fair elections fund from the campaign operations, 15 again, of participating candidates in the June 16 16, 2020 special election, the June 2, 2020 17 primary election, and the November 3, 2020 18 general election. 19 During the month of May 2021, the 20 Office of Campaign Finance did not receive any 21 further remission payments. With the ongoing post-election full field audits which have been 22

initiated in the fair elections program of the 1 2 candidates who participated in the three 3 elections during calendar year 2020, the status of those audits -- and there are 34 audits in 4 5 total -- will be posted at our website with the report of the office this evening, at the close 6 of business. Just for information, there were 7 8 ten post-election audits which were initiated 9 with respect to the June 2nd primary election. There were four post-election audits 10 11 which were initiated at the June 16, 2020 special 12 election, and ten post-election audits which were initiated of the November 3, 2020 general 13 14 election 20. I would just also say, for the record, 15 16 with these post-election audits, the audits are -- these are full-field audits which are 17 18 conducted of the entire campaign operations of 19 the candidates who were certified in the fair 20 elections program. In the Public Information and Records 21 22 Management Division, during the month of May,

there was one filing deadline. That filing 1 2 deadline was on May 3, 2021. That was the filing deadline for the 16th report of receipts and 3 expenditures by the legal defense committee, 4 which is registered with the office. There was 5 one required filer, filing timely filed and also 6 7 electronically filed the report. During the month of May, in terms of new candidates and 8 9 committees in our traditional program, we had two candidates who registered, one was Phil 10 11 Mendelson, Mendelson for chairman, registered on 12 May 5, 2021, Oye Owolewa, Owolewa for U.S. 13 representative '22, registered on May 11, 2021. 14 As of May 31, 2021, four candidates 15 have registered in the traditional campaign 16 finance program, and one candidate has registered 17 seeking to participate in the fair elections 18 program for the 2022 election cycle. 19 We also had candidates and treasurers 20 who completed the mandatory entrance conference 21 presentation during the month of May, one Brandon 22 Scott, treasurer for the Ward 7 Democrats,

Brandon Clark, treasurer for Ryan Jones for 1 2 attorney general, Ben Young, treasurer of Mendelson for chairman 2022, Oye Owolewa, 3 candidate Owolewa for U.S. representative 2022. 4 5 In our traditional audit program, during the month of May 2021, the audit branch 6 7 conducted ten desk reviews of reports which have been filed with the Office of Campaign Finance. 8 9 Also during the month of May, for the record I would like to state what the status of the audits 10 11 are in the traditional audit program. First, 12 there were no audit reports issued. With respect 13 to ongoing audits, we have two full-field audits 14 of newly elected officials in the District of Columbia which are ongoing. 15 The first is Brooke Pinto for Ward 2, 16 17 and the audit notification letter was issued on 18 February 8, 2021. The records were due on March 19 15, '21. An extension was approved until March 30, 2021. 20 The audit was initiated on April 4 --21 April 8, 2021, and the field work is in progress. The second audit of a newly elected 22

official is Jacque DC for at-large State Board of Education. The audit notification letter was issued on February 8, '21.

The records were due on March 8th. 4 5 The second reminder was sent on March 12th. The audit was initiated on April 5, 2021. 6 The audit 7 manager is in the process of reviewing the audit field work, and also is preparing the issuance of 8 9 the draft preliminary statement of findings. With respect to random periodic audits in the 10 11 traditional audit program of past and continuing 12 committees who participated in the 2020 election, 13 there are ongoing audits of the January 31, 2021 14 The first is with Oye for U.S. report. 15 representative. The preliminary draft statement 16 of findings was issued on April 14, 2021, and the audit manager's in the process of reviewing the 17 18 committee's response in the final audit report. 19 The second is the committee to elect Alex Pedro. 20 The preliminary draft statement of 21 findings was issued on April 1, 2021. The audit manager is in the process of reviewing the 22

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committee's response and the final audit report. 1 2 That completes my report with respect to the divisions, the Fair Elections Program 3 division, as well as our traditional program, and 4 also the Public Records and Information Division. 5 I would ask the General Counsel, William Sanford, 6 7 to now provide the report of the Office of the General Counsel. 8 9 GENERAL COUNSEL'S REPORT 10 CHAIR BENNETT: Thank you. Mr. 11 Sanford. 12 MR. SANFORD: Good morning, Mr. 13 Chairman and distinguished Board members. I am 14 William Sanford, General Counsel for the Office 15 of Campaign Finance. During the month of May 2021, the Office of the General Counsel did not 16 17 receive any referrals for informal hearings. 18 However, the office did issue a total of 35 19 orders, which included the following. Seven orders were issued in which statements of 20 21 violations and notices of hearings were vacated. 22 Twenty-eight orders were issued in

1 which fines that totaled \$52,600 were imposed. 2 During the month of May 2021, the Office of the 3 General Counsel imposed fines against 28 4 respondents. 5 However, I will not read each fine and respondent into the record, but the entire report 6 7 will be published at the Office of Campaign 8 Finance website by close of business today. During the month of May 2021, the Office of the 9 General Counsel did not collect any fines. 10 11 During the month of May 2021, there 12 were no open investigations. There were no 13 requests for interpretive opinions, and there 14 were no show cause proceedings conducted. That 15 should conclude my report. 16 CHAIR BENNETT: Thank you, Mr. 17 I just had -- Mr. Gill said he didn't Sanford. 18 have any questions. Ms. Greenfield, do you have 19 any questions? 20 MEMBER GREENFIELD: No, I don't have any questions. 21 22 CHAIR BENNETT: I have one. Ms.

1 Montgomery, can you tell me, again -- I know you 2 repeated it in your report -- the number of people that have applied for the fair elections 3 4 program so far and who they are? 5 MS. COLLIER-MONTGOMERY: In this Yes. -- as of this date, there has been one candidate 6 7 who has applied to -- who has registered, rather, 8 to participate -- seeking to participate in the 9 fair elections program. I believe that candidate is Ryan Jones, who has registered as a candidate 10 11 for the Office of Attorney General. 12 CHAIR BENNETT: Okay. There's 13 obviously a lot more time that people could file 14 and apply for that. Is it possible to start out in the traditional program, and then switch if 15 16 you have not actually collected money that would 17 be in violation of the fair elections program? 18 MS. COLLIER-MONTGOMERY: Yes, it is 19 possible. What they would be required to do is to file a termination report of their receipts 20 21 and expenditures in the traditional program, then 22 register (Simultaneous Speaking). Yes.

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1	CHAIR BENNETT: If they had collected
2	and had that was not in compliance with the
3	fair election, they'd have to give money back, I
4	would assume, in order to be in compliance.
5	MS. COLLIER-MONTGOMERY: Yes, they
6	would. In fact, they would have to distribute
7	the surplus in accordance with the process that
8	is established in the Campaign Finance Act.
9	There is no provision which would allow them to
10	transfer those funds over into the fair elections
11	program for the purposes of qualifying in that
12	program.
13	CHAIR BENNETT: Okay.
14	MS. COLLIER-MONTGOMERY: One thing I
15	would like to add and neglected to report would
16	be the audits that are currently being conducted
17	in the constituent service program. Those are
18	periodic random audits of the April 1, 2021
19	reports.
20	The first is Phil's Fund for Citizen
21	Service. The audit records were due to the audit
22	staff on May 3rd. An extension was approved until

1 May 18th. The records were received on May 14, 2 2021, and the audit field work is in progress. The second is the Evans Constituent Service Fund. 3 The audit records were due to the audit staff on 4 5 May 3, 2021. This is a termination report. The audit staff has requested that the committee 6 request the final bank statement from its 7 8 depository. That concludes my report. 9 CHAIR BENNETT: Thank you, Ms. Montgomery, and thanks for answering my question. 10 11 The next item on the agenda is the executive 12 director's report, Ms. Alice Miller. 13 EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR'S REPORT 14 MS. MILLER: Good morning. Thank you, 15 Mr. Chairman. Not a lot, but I will report that 16 on May 24th, we appeared before the subcommittee 17 on redistricting, which is chaired by 18 Councilmember Silverman, and also Councilmember 19 Henderson and Councilmember Bonds serves on that 20 committee, to provide comment on the 21 redistricting process as it relates to the ward's 22 responsibilities.

1 As you know, every ten years, the city 2 undergoes a redistricting process. Normally, the city council would have had the redistricting 3 They usually get it in March. 4 information. But 5 the census was delayed with that data due to COVID, nationally, so the data will not be 6 7 provided until late August, which has backed up 8 the whole process, not only in D.C., but on a national level, and has created some challenges 9 as it relates to the redistricting process. 10 11 Basically, just for the record, the 12 D.C. law requires the Board to assist Board task 13 forces as they draw ANC SMD boundaries. D.C. law 14 requires that the Board, along with the mayor, 15 provide each ward task force with technical and 16 analytical services necessary for the decennial 17 redistricting. 18 The services include, but are not 19 limited to, statistical analysis of official census data and the production of the maps. 20 The 21 Board will work, as I put on the record, in 22 conjunction with the Office of Planning, to

provide the materials needed to each of the ward task forces.

3 We have done this in the past, so we will do it with this process, as well. 4 We will 5 have to have the materials by December 23rd. That's 180 days before the election, before the 6 7 June 21st election, which is what the law requires, in order for us to successfully 8 9 complete the process prior to the election. 10 Anything after December 23rd would not provide 11 timely delivery of the information for us to have 12 it done in time for the June 21st election. 13 Also, we did do our first in-person outreach 14 event last Thursday, on May 26th, at the Harriet Tubman House women's shelter. 15 That was the first one since COVID. 16 17

We were able to register approximately 20 individuals. We will start scheduling these a little bit more frequently now that things have gotten a little better.

That one was scheduled from 11:00 to 1:00, as I said, and it was a women's shelter. I

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will also put on the record that we will have our 1 2 ANC 7F-07 election, which is the first election that the Board will actually conduct. 3 As you know, the council initiated 4 5 emergency legislation that provided -- that we were responsible for conducting elections for the 6 7 ANC as long as the public health emergency This is the only one, so far, that has 8 existed. 9 been -- that has mandated that we conduct an election because the other vacancies have all 10 11 been -- have not required an election to be 12 conducted because only one person is qualified. 13 Those individuals have been, basically, the ones 14 confirmed as the winners. They've not been The 7F-07 election will be scheduled 15 contested. 16 for June 15th, from 3:30 to 7:30, at Park Kennedy 17 Apartments, 1901 C Street, Southeast. That 18 concludes my report. 19 CHAIR BENNETT: Great, thanks, Ms. 20 Miller. Any questions, Ms. Greenfield? I think 21 Mr. Gill has no questions. No, I don't have 22 MEMBER GREENFIELD:

1 any. 2 CHAIR BENNETT: All right, thank you. 3 We are now at public matters. If you have a question or some thoughts, please just, I guess, 4 5 raise your hand and we will unmute you and go from there. 6 7 PUBLIC MATTERS 8 CHAIR BENNETT: Let's unmute everybody and see if anybody has anything to say. Anybody 9 have anything? You can unmute yourselves. 10 Okay, 11 I will take that as no public matters today. 12 With that, can I take a motion from Ms. 13 Greenfield to adjourn the meeting? 14 MEMBER GREENFIELD: Yes, I move that 15 we adjourn the meeting. CHAIR BENNETT: Okay, second. 16 It's 17 been properly --18 MS. BRIZILL: This is Dorothy Brizill. 19 I was trying to unmute myself to raise a public 20 matter. 21 CHAIR BENNETT: Okay. Sorry, Ms. 22 Brizill. We will not adjourn the meeting. Would

you go ahead and identify yourself, Ms. Brizill, 1 2 and ask a question. 3 MS. BRIZILL: This is Dorothy Brizill, I'm executive director of D.C. 4 B-R-I-Z-I-L-L. 5 Watch, located at 1327 Gerard Street, Northwest. I have two public matters I'd like to raise. 6 I'm raising them because we're in the budget season 7 8 and the budget hearing for the Board of Elections will be held before the next Board meeting. 9 My first question has to do with what 10 11 is -- I'd like to learn what is the status of the 12 Chairman's plan to reorganize the Board of Elections and the Office of Campaign Finance, as 13 14 well as to change election processes and procedures, such as the creation of large vote 15 16 centers, the mailing of absentee ballots to all 17 registered voters, etc. Can you tell me what the 18 status of that plan is? 19 I am still, actually, CHAIR BENNETT: 20 thinking through and working through some -- the 21 whole process in my own head, relative to what I 22 may recommend for a reorganization. I hope to

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1	put something out in probably 30 days or so, Ms.
2	Brizill, if I put anything out. I've been kind
3	of thinking through it and got drafts of my own
4	that I'm kind of working through
5	(Simultaneous speaking)
6	MS. BRIZILL: Along those lines, can
7	you tell us, other than your input, how will the
8	plan be developed, and how will you secure public
9	input or the input of elected officials?
10	CHAIR BENNETT: What I'll do is to put
11	out some recommendations to both the elected
12	official council and also the mayor's office, as
13	well as to the general public. It will be just
14	recommendations, in terms of how I see things.
15	Just to recap a little bit, this past
16	year or so has taught us all a lot in every part
17	of our life. The reality is, I don't think,
18	anyway, that we are going to go back to how life
19	was before the pandemic. I have some thoughts as
20	how it might work best for both the public and
21	for the organization, relative to structure. I
22	plan to make it to make my recommendations

known probably within the next 30 days, Ms. 1 2 Brizill. 3 MS. BRIZILL: The current budget before the council does not reflect any 4 5 reorganization changes or policy changes at the Board of Elections. 6 7 CHAIR BENNETT: No, ma'am. 8 MS. BRIZILL: My next question has to do with the warehouse. What are the plans for 9 the warehouse in Northeast? In the budget, there 10 11 is specific reference to the warehouse in this 12 sentence: funding is provided in the budget for 13 temporary warehouse space and to install an IT 14 infrastructure for BOE's voting equipment, 15 systems, and activity. What does that mean and 16 reference? 17 CHAIR BENNETT: Ms. Miller. 18 MS. MILLER: Yes. That has to do with 19 the temporary location that we have right now 20 where the drop boxes are stored. There is no IT communication -- there's no communication in that 21 22 specific location. I believe that's what that is

referring to, to be able for the staff, the 1 2 warehouse staff to be able to use that location 3 to do things, such as charting poll paths and 4 setting up a communications system there. 5 MS. BRIZILL: Can you tell me, Ms. Miller, where were election ballots counted and 6 7 processed last year? Were they processed at the 8 warehouse? 9 MS. MILLER: The ballots, yes. MS. BRIZILL: Going forward, you said 10 11 the warehouse would be more than just the storing 12 of drop boxes and charging of pods. It would be 13 the site for the tabulation of votes. Am I 14 correct? I'm sorry, Ms. Brizill. 15 MS. MILLER: 16 You're muffled. I couldn't quite understand what 17 you're saying. 18 MS. BRIZILL: Can we go back, in terms 19 of reviewing your answer? Is it your intention to use the warehouse, in the future, in the same 20 21 manner that you used it in 2020? That was to 22 process votes.

1	MS. MILLER: Yes, for the ballots that
2	came in through the mail, that's correct. That's
3	not your question referred to the IT.
4	MS. BRIZILL: No. Wait a minute. Why
5	don't I state my question so that you don't
6	speculate as regards what my question is. In
7	2020, where were ballots processed by the Board
8	of Elections? Was it at the warehouse?
9	MS. MILLER: Yes.
10	MS. BRIZILL: Going forward, where do
11	you intend to process ballots in the future?
12	MS. MILLER: The mail-in ballots will
13	be processed at the warehouse.
14	MS. BRIZILL: And is that the reason
15	for the funding for IT infrastructure at the
16	warehouse?
17	MS. MILLER: No.
18	MS. BRIZILL: I don't understand that
19	answer, then.
20	MS. MILLER: Because we have two
21	locations. The IT infrastructure that the
22	upgrades are referring to are tied to the second

1 location, which is about -- which is located down 2 the street from the location where 3535 V Street 3 is. That, as I said, currently, actually, 4 5 has no communication, whatsoever, capabilities. Those funds are to provide communication data 6 7 processing. There's no telephone system. There 8 is no communication -- so that we'll be able to do things such as charge poll pads, charge the 9 voting machines and things like that. 10 I think your question, 11 CHAIR BENNETT: 12 Ms. Brizill, was whether or not we would be 13 counting ballots at that second location. Ι 14 think the answer is no, if that was your 15 question. 16 MS. BRIZILL: Where did you tabulate 17 ballots in 2020, what location? 18 MS. MILLER: 3535 V Street. 19 MS. BRIZILL: The funding that's in the mayor's budget for IT infrastructure, is 20 there a second warehouse that is referred in the 21 22 budget as temporary warehouse?

1	MS. MILLER: That's correct.
2	MS. BRIZILL: Why is it temporary?
3	MS. MILLER: Because it's a temporary
4	location. It's not a permanent location.
5	MS. BRIZILL: Do you intend to
6	identify a permanent location?
7	MS. MILLER: We have no idea as to
8	whether or not that will be provided to us.
9	Right now, it's identified as temporary because
10	that's what we've been told.
11	MS. BRIZILL: One last question. The
12	main warehouse for the Board of Elections at 3535
13	V Street is not air conditioned.
14	MS. MILLER: It is air conditioned.
15	MS. BRIZILL: When did it get air
16	conditioned?
17	MS. MILLER: It's always been air
18	conditioned. The air
19	(Simultaneous speaking)
20	MS. BRIZILL: I'm talking about the
21	main large space at that warehouse.
22	MS. MILLER: always been air

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conditioned. I can tell you that the air 1 2 condition is not always functioning. 3 MS. BRIZILL: It has never been 4 functioning in the times I've been over there. 5 What percentage of the time is the air conditioning down? 6 7 MS. MILLER: It has the capability to 8 provide air conditioning, and it goes out quite 9 frequently, but it's always repaired. 10 CHAIR BENNETT: Last summer was a very 11 difficult period for air conditioning at that 12 facility. 13 MS. BRIZILL: The reason I'm asking 14 that question is to invest in putting -- first of 15 all, to be counting ballots in a space where you 16 have workers, as well as sensitive equipment, and 17 that space is not air conditioned, especially in 18 the summer months and heat that we had last year, 19 is that a wise investment to make, or is there a need to identify an alternative location? 20 21 MS. MILLER: I agree with you, but 22 this space is air conditioned, and they fix it

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1	all the time. It is air conditioned.
2	MS. BRIZILL: Mr. Bennett, if I could
3	ask a question I hate to belabor this.
4	CHAIR BENNETT: Okay.
5	MS. BRIZILL: A great deal of funds
6	were spent to relocate the Offices of the Board
7	of Elections, the Office of Campaign Finance to
8	what many in the community refer to as pretty
9	posh space.
10	Why wasn't an allocation of space made
11	for the tabulation of votes there, as opposed to
12	a dirty, non-air conditioned space at a warehouse
13	in far Northeast that is not readily accessible?
14	Why wasn't provision and planning made to put the
15	counting center in the main offices of the Board
16	of Elections?
17	CHAIR BENNETT: I appreciate your
18	question, but quite honestly, we're not
19	completely in control of our space. We make
20	requests, but the Department of General Services
21	actually drives the matter around space. I
22	appreciate your point. I don't have any argument

1	with you. Alice, did you want to add anything?
2	MS. MILLER: I can say that we don't
3	identify the space that we're in, as Mr. Bennett
4	has just said. We put in a request for space,
5	and we're told where that space will be. We
6	don't go out and find space. That's not what we
7	do.
8	MS. BRIZILL: That's not what my
9	question was, and that's not what I asked about.
10	That's not what I asked about at all. In terms
11	of size and space, which was an odyssey the Board
12	went on for several years, you had to identify to
13	the General Services Administration the total
14	square footage you needed and any other special
15	specifications you needed in that space.
16	When you did that, did you indicate
17	that you needed space allocated for a count
18	center for the tabulation and review of ballots
19	and voter registrations, or did you always intend
20	to have that operation separate and apart, over
21	at the warehouse? That is not a decision General
22	Services made. That's a decision the Board of

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Elections made.

2	MS. MILLER: I just also received a
3	message that DGS has replaced the unit, the air
4	conditioning unit, and it's currently functional,
5	to answer that part of your question, as well.
6	MS. BRIZILL: That does nothing for
7	the problems that occurred last year and that
8	could likely occur again. But can you answer my
9	question, in terms of DGS acted on
10	specifications, including square footage, and any
11	other qualifications that (audio interference) in
12	terms of the need for new (audio interference).
13	I didn't indicate that I expected the
14	Board or the Board staff to go around, in terms
15	of going to real estate options and what have
16	you, but why didn't the Board make preparations
17	for a vote center, a counting center, a counting
18	facility in its new offices?
19	CHAIR BENNETT: I wish we could answer
20	your question, Ms. Brizill, but we are we work
21	with DGS and provide them with the information
22	and the square footage and all the specifications

1 That's an ongoing activity. that we need. We 2 appreciate your concern, and we are constantly 3 focused on trying to make sure we have adequate 4 space, along with all the other things. I'm not 5 sure how best to answer your question. MS. BRIZILL: Mr. Bennett, are you 6 saying that the Board of Elections did not 7 8 provide DGS with information regarding the need for space for its computers, for its staff, for 9 its equipment to tabulate votes at its main 10 11 office? 12 CHAIR BENNETT: Yes, we did. 13 MS. MILLER: We did. They actually 14 came to the old space, looked at it, made 15 measurements and all of that, saw what we had 16 there, took that, identified it, and then made 17 measurements with respect to moving to the new 18 space. All of that took place. 19 MS. BRIZILL: Where did things fall 20 apart, then? 21 MS. MILLER: I'm sorry; can you repeat 22 the question?

1	MS. BRIZILL: Where did things fall
2	apart? When you moved into your new space, were
3	you aware then that there was no room, or did you
4	separately decide that you didn't want to
5	tabulate the votes there and that you wanted to
6	have an offsite location to tabulate votes?
7	CHAIR BENNETT: Your question is why
8	didn't we have this space as space to tabulate
9	ballots. Was that your
10	MS. BRIZILL: I think that was my
11	question.
12	CHAIR BENNETT: Okay, Ms. Brizill,
13	we're struggling trying to hear you.
14	MS. MILLER: The normal process, we
15	would receive the votes back by modem. We would
16	never have the number of paper ballots that we
17	had to be tabulated that we had last year. Last
18	year was an exceptional circumstance that we had
19	to adjust and figure out how to do what we did.
20	As you know, we get the ballots back
21	through electronic means. We get the results
22	back through electronic means, which comes in

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through the polling places, through our sticks, 1 2 through our vote sticks. We never generally had that number of ballots that we're actually 3 manually counting. 4 5 MS. BRIZILL: I don't mean to belabor it, but you do -- you would acknowledge that with 6 7 special ballots having to be cast at polling sites, you do have a good deal of paper ballots, 8 9 even in a normal election, that you have to Do you provide space at your main 10 process. 11 office for the processing of those paper ballots, 12 or did you just always intend to have the tabulation of votes done offsite? 13 14 MS. MILLER: We do tabulate our special ballots and absentee ballots at our main 15 location, yes. 16 17 MS. BRIZILL: Let me make sure I 18 understand this. What did you tabulate at the 19 warehouse, then? 20 MS. MILLER: We tabulated the mail-in 21 ballots at the warehouse, the ballots that came 22 in through the drop boxes, the ballots that came

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1	in by mail we tabulated at the warehouse.		
2	MS. BRIZILL: Where did you tabulate		
3	voter registrations sent in by mail?		
4	MS. MILLER: I'm sorry?		
5	MS. BRIZILL: Where did you tabulate		
6	voter registrations sent in by mail?		
7	MS. MILLER: Where did we tabulate		
8	voter registrations sent in by mail?		
9	MS. BRIZILL: Yes, that's the		
10	question.		
11	CHAIR BENNETT: They come into the		
12	main office, and they're loaded here, at the main		
13	office.		
14	MS. BRIZILL: So the only thing that		
15	the pictures show of paper being fed through your		
16	equipment are the absentee ballots that came in		
17	by mail or the drop boxes?		
18	CHAIR BENNETT: Yes.		
19	MS. MILLER: The mail and drop boxes.		
20	CHAIR BENNETT: Yes.		
21	MS. BRIZILL: The second warehouse		
22	that you want to acquire, that would be		

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predicated upon the D.C. Government passing 1 2 legislation that would authorize the Board to 3 send absentee ballots to every registered voter. 4 MS. MILLER: No. 5 CHAIR BENNETT: That particular warehouse, Ms. Brizill, was really acquired for 6 7 storage that was -- that we needed for drop boxes 8 that we bought last year that we hadn't 9 anticipated buying. We had no idea we would need that kind 10 11 of storage. With that space, the point is there 12 are other things that could be done there that 13 you need some kind of IT infrastructure to be 14 able to do. You need phones. You need to be 15 able to have IT. I'm not sure --16 MS. BRIZILL: Okay. What is the 17 address of the second warehouse? 18 CHAIR BENNETT: Say again. 19 MS. BRIZILL: What is the address of 20 the second warehouse? 21 MS. MILLER: It's about three or four doors down from 3535 V Street. 22 I don't know the

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exact address. It's on V Street. 1 2 CHAIR BENNETT: We can find that. If 3 you want to drop an email, we'll certainly be happy to give that to you, Ms. Brizill. 4 5 MS. BRIZILL: Okay. See you at the budget hearing. 6 7 CHAIR BENNETT: Thanks. Any other 8 public matters? 9 (No audible response.) 10 CHAIR BENNETT: Okay, I think I'll 11 take a motion to adjourn again. 12 MS. MILLER: I have it. It's 3559 V 13 Street. 14 CHAIR BENNETT: Okay. Can I get a motion to adjourn from Mr. Gill? I think I see 15 him. 16 17 MEMBER GILL: I make a motion to 18 adjourn the meeting. CHAIR BENNETT: Can I have a second 19 20 from Ms. Greenfield. 21 MEMBER GREENFIELD: I second. 22 It's been properly CHAIR BENNETT:

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1	moved and seconded. Voice vote. Ms. Greenfield.
2	MEMBER GREENFIELD: Aye.
3	CHAIR BENNETT: Mr. Gill.
4	MEMBER GILL: Aye.
5	CHAIR BENNETT: Aye from me, as well.
6	It's unanimous. The meeting is hereby adjourned.
7	Thank you so much.
