The District of Columbia Board of Elections convened via videoconference, pursuant to notice at 10:30 a.m. EDT, Gary Thompson, Chair, presiding.

3 CHAIR THOMPSON: All right, good
4 morning, everybody. Welcome to our regular
5 Board meeting for June.

6 We're in the home stretch here, heading
7 towards the June 16th primary election, as well
8 as the at-large seat.

9 My name is Gary Thompson, Chair of the
10 Board of Elections.

11 I believe that Karyn Greenfield is
12 there, so together, we have a quorum.

13 I do want to apologize, I can't be
14 there in person today, sorry about that.

15 Real quick, we've got a pretty
16 straightforward agenda, we've both looked at it
17 and I would move we adopt that agenda.

18 MEMBER GREENFIELD: I second.

19 CHAIR THOMPSON: All in favor aye?

20 (CHORUS OF AYE.)

21 CHAIR THOMPSON: Also, we've looked at
22 the minutes from our May regular meeting and at

1 this time I move we adopt those minutes.

2 MEMBER GREENFIELD: I second.

3 CHAIR THOMPSON: All in favor, aye?

4 (CHORUS OF AYES)

5 CHAIR THOMPSON: All right, well, that
6 was easy.

7 Turning next to our Executive
8 Director's report from Monica Evans.

9 MS. HOLMAN EVANS: Thank you, Mr.
10 Chair.

11 Good morning, the Executive Director
12 report for the month of May.

13 Executive Director May engagement.

14 During the month of May, I attended
15 several events to educate on ranked choice
16 voting, or RCV.

17 I engaged in several radio appearances
18 on senior living on WOL 1450.

19 I gave a presentation at the monthly
20 meeting of the Washington D.C. Chapter of Delta
21 Sigma Theta and attended an event at Regency
22 House in Ward 3.

1 I also presented at a town hall
2 sponsored by Councilmember Bonds at the
3 Convention Center on May 23rd.

4 On Sunday, May 31st, I was the guest on
5 Senator Michael Brown's podcast, Shadow
6 Politics.

7 The Agency's budget oversight hearing
8 was held on Friday, May 8th.

9 And finally, D.C. Board of Elections
10 was selected as a 2026 Power Partner Award
11 recipient by the Washington D.C. Alumni Chapter
12 of Delta Sigma Theta Sorority, Incorporated.

13 The Power Partner Award honors an
14 active community partner whose vital role and
15 steadfast commitment to collaboration have
16 helped the Washington D.C. Alumni Chapter
17 effectively serve the community.

18 Voter registration rolls.

19 In May, the Board of Elections
20 registered 2,103 new voters and processed 5,103
21 registration changes.

22 In total, we prepared 7,206 voter

1 registration cards to be mailed.

2 Additionally, 223 registered voters
3 moved out of D.C., 266 voters canceled their
4 D.C. registrations and registered with other
5 jurisdictions, and 758 voters registered in D.C.
6 after canceling their registrations in other
7 states.

8 Online voter registration.

9 We are continuing to register voters
10 using our website portal.

11 To date, we have processed over 112,197
12 applications using the portal. These include
13 new voter registration and updates to current
14 registrations.

15 Total non-citizen registration is
16 1,245. We registered 73 new non-citizen voters
17 in May, and we are continuing our outreach in
18 D.C. communities to share information about non-
19 citizen voting in local elections.

20 2026 election cycle planning.

21 We are continuing to implement the
22 requirements of the Automatic Voter

1 Registration, or AVR Expansion Act, and we are
2 maintaining a file of otherwise eligible voters
3 who decline voter registration at the Department
4 of Motor Vehicles.

5 We are also continuing to monitor
6 legislation and court decisions that affect
7 elections.

8 Ranked choice voting.

9 During the June 16 primary and special
10 elections, we are implementing ranked choice
11 voting, or RCV.

12 We have developed informational
13 materials that are available on our website and
14 are available to our community partners.

15 We have scheduled many virtual and in-
16 person outreach events.

17 We have a video presentation and a lot
18 of informational materials. All materials and
19 outreach events, including those specific to
20 RCV, can be found on our website.

21 Vendor and partner coordination.

22 BOE has been holding ongoing meetings

1 with our vendors and partners in preparation for
2 the 2026 primary and special elections.

3 These discussions focus on confirming
4 operational and technical requirements,
5 reviewing project time lines, and ensuring all
6 systems, services, and supporting activities
7 remain in a state of readiness to support
8 election operations.

9 The voter registration deadline for the
10 primary and special elections was May 26, 2026.

11 Eligible residents must have completed and
12 submitted their voter registration by this date
13 to be eligible to participate in the upcoming
14 elections.

15 Registration applications received
16 after this deadline will be processed after the
17 election.

18 However, residents may still take
19 advantage of same day registration at vote
20 centers.

21 Mail ballot requests deadline for non-
22 UOCAVA voters.

1 The deadline for non-UOCAVA voters to
2 request a mail ballot was Monday, June 1st,
3 2026.

4 On May 4, 2026, BOE posted alphabetical
5 lists of registered qualified electors at the
6 main public library and each ward branch
7 library, in accordance with D.C. official code.

8 On June 2nd, BOE posted the revised
9 citywide list of registered qualified electors
10 at the main public library and in ward branch
11 libraries.

12 Mail ballot drop box availability.

13 From May 22nd through June 16th, 2026
14 at 8:00 p.m., the Board will provide 55 secure
15 mail ballot drop boxes for voters to return
16 their voter ballots. The drop boxes are placed
17 across all eight wards.

18 Voter Education and Outreach.

19 During the month of May, the Voter
20 Education and Outreach Division participated in
21 98 outreach events on behalf of the Agency.

22 Events included Riggs Park Day, the

1 Brooklyn Manor Town Hall meeting, and a
2 Commission on Aging meeting.

3 We also continued our webinar series on
4 ranked choice voting.

5 Election Worker Division.

6 The election worker training cycle has
7 officially concluded after 11 weeks of classes.

8 We have trained 1,975 election workers.

9 The final training class took place on
10 May 31st as 20 high school students were
11 trained.

12 All early voting and election day vote
13 centers are adequately staffed.

14 Restore the vote.

15 The Restore the Vote Division continues
16 to meet biweekly with the Department of
17 Corrections, or DOC, to plan for registration
18 events and the training of election workers to
19 operate early vote centers.

20 The division will operate early vote
21 centers at the Department of Corrections three
22 days next week on June 9, 10 and 11.

1 Last week, staff provided election
2 worker training to 14 residents of the DOC who
3 will work various positions within the vote
4 centers.

5 The division continues work -- to work
6 diligently to ensure all ballots reach residents
7 and correctional facilities.

8 Vote center preparation.

9 We're in the process of ensuring all
10 vote centers receive equipment and supplies for
11 early voting and Election Day voting.

12 Early voting will occur from June 8th
13 through June 14th. Twenty-five early vote
14 centers will be open from 8:30 a.m. to 7:00 p.m.

15 We will operate 75 vote centers on
16 Election Day, Tuesday, June 16th. Election Day
17 vote centers will be open from 7:00 a.m. until
18 8:00 p.m.

19 And that concludes my report.

20 Thank you.

21 CHAIR THOMPSON: All right, thank you
22 very much.

1 Moving on to General Counsel with Terri
2 Stroud.

3 MS. STROUD: Good morning, thank you,
4 Mr. Chair.

5 Before I begin my report, I wanted to
6 acknowledge and introduce the Board's summer
7 2026 interns. We have four college students and
8 we will have three students from Georgetown Day
9 School who will be joining us later this summer.

10 Our -- we have Sloane Holder, who's a
11 student at Columbia University.

12 We have Bernardo Little, Jr. who's a
13 student at Georgetown University with plans to
14 attend law school in the future.

15 We have Ms. Sydney Mayes, who's a
16 student at UNC Charlotte.

17 And Mr. Ian Makle, who's a student at
18 Morehouse, he's not here today.

19 But they are all here with us for the
20 summer and they will be helping out with the
21 election cycle and with helping out the various
22 divisions achieve very important tasks that must

1 be completed for the election cycle.

2 The GDS students who are coming later
3 are Alexandria Hughes, Jilly Lyons, and Sabine
4 Wood.

5 So, I just wanted to introduce them to
6 the Board and staff and to thank them in advance
7 for all the hard work they're going to be doing
8 for us this summer.

9 The first item on my agenda is the
10 rulemaking, the final rulemaking to Title 3 of
11 the DC Municipal Regulations. They are
12 amendments to Chapters 7, 10, 11, 14, 15, 16,
13 17, and 99.

14 This is a final rulemaking to Title 3
15 that would finalize the third revised rulemaking
16 that was published in the DC Register on April
17 10th, which established regulations consistent
18 with various provisions of the Ranked Choice
19 Voting and Open the Primary Elections to
20 Independent Voters Act of 2024 and the Petition
21 Administration Clarification Emergency Amendment
22 Act of 2026.

1 It clarified aspects of the nominating
2 petition and ballot access measure processing
3 procedures and established how write-in rankings
4 will be adjudicated in the context of RCV
5 contests.

6 The Board took emergency and proposed
7 rulemaking action with respect to this
8 rulemaking on April 1st and the associated
9 notice was published in the DC Register on April
10 10th at 73 DCR 5968.

11 We received no written comments on the
12 rulemaking during the public comment period, and
13 so now I would ask for a motion to submit the
14 final version of this rulemaking to the Office
15 of Documents and Administrative Issuances so
16 that it's published in the June 12th edition of
17 the DC Register.

18 CHAIR THOMPSON: The Chair so moves.

19 MEMBER GREENFIELD: I second.

20 MS. STROUD: Okay.

21 And we'll take a roll call vote with
22 respect to that.

1 Mr. Chair?

2 CHAIR THOMPSON: Aye.

3 MS. STROUD: Member Greenfield?

4 MEMBER GREENFIELD: Aye.

5 MS. STROUD: And with that, we will be
6 submitting the final version of the rulemaking
7 to ODAI.

8 The next item on my agenda is
9 enforcement hearings, and we have five matters
10 in the matters of Allison Bass, Cara Shockley,
11 Terrell Dance, Jenefer Ellington, and Desdemona
12 Harris.

13 By way of background, all five of these
14 matters originated from a voter participation
15 project report issued by the Election
16 Registration Information Center.

17 The ERIC report flagged certain
18 individuals as possible double voters in the
19 2024 general election, which prompted the Office
20 of the General Counsel to conduct investigations
21 that gathered additional voting and signature
22 evidence.

1 Four of the five matters involved
2 evidence of voting in both D.C. and another
3 jurisdiction, namely Maryland for three of them
4 and Georgia for one of them.

5 The Bass matter ultimately concerned
6 the inadvertent casting of another voter's mail
7 ballot rather than double voting.

8 The applicable legal framework is the
9 same across all matters, D.C. Official Code
10 Section 1-1001.09(g)(1), prohibits people from
11 voting twice in an election.

12 1-1001.14 makes it a criminal offense
13 to vote or make false representations as to
14 voting qualifications, including that a person
15 may not claim voting residence or the right to
16 vote in another state.

17 D.C. Official Code 1-1001.14
18 additionally prohibits fraudulent ballot casting
19 and, of course, federal law independently
20 prohibits double voting in federal elections.

21 And I will let our staff attorney, Ms.
22 Christine Pembroke, go into more depth with

1 respect to these matters.

2 MS. PEMBROKE: Thank you, General
3 Counsel.

4 So, the first matter to be addressed on
5 the agenda is Allison Bass.

6 In this matter, we became aware through
7 the ERIC report described by the General Counsel
8 that a ballot had been cast in the same voter's
9 name in both D.C. and in Maryland in the 2024
10 general election.

11 Because that was evidence of possible
12 illegal voting, the Board staff reviewed the
13 mail ballot return envelope for the ballot that
14 was cast in D.C.

15 And when they looked at that, they saw
16 that the ballot return envelope bore a legible
17 signature for someone other than the voter to
18 whom the ballot was issued.

19 We were able to identify that third
20 party as Alison Bass, a voter residing at the
21 same address to which the ballot was sent.

22 The matter was then turned over to the

1 Office of General Counsel for investigation and
2 OGC made multiple attempts to contact Ms. Bass.

3 Eventually, correspondence from OGC
4 reached her and she promptly called and emailed
5 OGC.

6 On May 28th, 2026, Ms. Bass and her
7 attorney attended a pre-hearing conference
8 before OGC.

9 Ms. Bass cooperated fully with the
10 Office of General Counsel and entered into a
11 stipulated agreement.

12 By that agreement, Ms. Bass
13 acknowledged that she inadvertently cast a mail
14 ballot issued to another voter.

15 She provided credible information that
16 showed she was unaware that the ballot that she
17 had received at her home in fact bore the name
18 of another voter, and that she did not intend to
19 vote another person's ballot.

20 Under the stipulation, the General
21 Counsel has agreed to cap her recommendation as
22 to the specified civil fine level in this matter

1 at \$100.

2 OGC is asking that the Board accept the
3 stipulation into the record.

4 And I would also note that I can see
5 Ms. Bass is here.

6 I don't know if her attorney is on the
7 -- in the meeting, I can't see his email, but I
8 can't see the entire list.

9 So, he might want to raise his hand if
10 he's here.

11 He did tell me that he had another
12 court matter that might conflict with his
13 ability to attend.

14 And with that, I would just reiterate
15 that we're asking the Board accept the
16 stipulation into the record.

17 MS. STROUD: We see a hand raised.

18 MS. PEMBROKE: Okay.

19 PARTICIPANT: I'm Mr. Cooper Smith's
20 intern, he's the attorney representing Ms. Bass.

21 He's currently at a hearing that's
22 scheduled to end around 11:00 a.m. He could

1 have some comments around then, if that is okay.

2 MS. PEMBROKE: I don't know that it's
3 necessary to continue the matter to 11:00 a.m.,
4 but I defer to the Board Chair on that.

5 CHAIR THOMPSON: I mean, would counsel
6 question our adoption of a stipulation or is
7 that in doubt?

8 MS. STROUD: I think the question was
9 for you, the intern for the counsel for Ms.
10 Bass.

11 Is there any issue with the proposed
12 stipulation? I'm assuming not because Ms. Bass
13 signed it.

14 PARTICIPANT: No, not that I heard of.
15 He just -- all he told me to say was
16 just that he was in a scheduled hearing and was
17 not able to be here at this moment.

18 MS. STROUD: Okay.

19 And Ms. Bass, would you like to say
20 something for the record with respect to the
21 stipulation?

22 MS. BASS: Sure, can you hear me?

1 MS. STROUD: Yes.

2 MS. BASS: I just wanted to reiterate,
3 I thought it was my ballot. I never would have
4 mailed it if I knew it was someone else's ballot
5 and I apologize.

6 MS. STROUD: Thank you for that, Ms.
7 Bass.

8 And Mr. Chair or Ms. Greenfield, do you
9 have any questions?

10 MEMBER GREENFIELD: No.

11 CHAIR THOMPSON: The stipulation is
12 signed at this time, I move that we adopt the
13 stipulation.

14 MEMBER GREENFIELD: I would second.

15 MS. STROUD: Okay.

16 And we'll take a roll call vote with
17 respect to that.

18 Mr. Chair?

19 CHAIR THOMPSON: Aye.

20 MS. STROUD: Member Greenfield?

21 MEMBER GREENFIELD: Aye.

22 MS. STROUD: Okay.

1 And with that, the stipulation is
2 accepted and the -- Ms. Bass is fined \$100 and
3 we will not refer this matter to the Office of
4 the Attorney General.

5 And that concludes this matter.

6 Thank you, Ms. Bass.

7 MS. BASS: Thank you.

8 MS. PEMBROKE: The next matter involves
9 Cara Shockley.

10 Again, this came to our attention
11 because of the ERIC report.

12 And that report showed that a ballot
13 had been cast in Cara Shockley's name in the
14 D.C. 2024 general election and in the 2024
15 general election in Georgia.

16 Notably, the ballot return envelope for
17 the D.C. mail ballot issued to Ms. Shockley had
18 a handwritten name that was consistent with the
19 name of Cara Shockley and the signature
20 associated with the 2024 Georgia ballot, which
21 consisted of only a last name, matched other
22 last name signature samples on file for Ms.

1 Shockley.

2 As a result of this evidence, an
3 investigation was opened by the Office of
4 General Counsel.

5 On February 27, OGC sent Ms. Shockley
6 notice that there would be a pre-hearing
7 conference before that office on May 16th, 2026.

8 The notice was sent to the email and
9 D.C. residential addresses in the D.C. voter
10 file for Ms. Shockley.

11 The email did not bounce back and the
12 hard copy notice was not returned by the U.S.
13 Postal Service.

14 Ms. Shockley did not appear at the
15 March 16th pre-hearing conference.

16 Ms. Shockley was then sent notice that
17 on June 3rd, the Board would hear the General
18 Counsel's recommendation as to enforcement
19 action that the Board should take against her.

20 I have not heard from Ms. Shockley.

21 In support of the General Counsel's
22 recommendation of enforcement action in this

1 matter, OGC is requesting that the Board accept
2 into evidence the signature material that was
3 provided to the Board documenting the signatures
4 that I just documenting the signatures that I
5 just described.

6 CHAIR THOMPSON: So accepted.

7 MS. PEMBROKE: I guess at this point,
8 the General Counsel could make a recommendation.

9 MS. STROUD: Yes, my recommendation
10 would be that this matter be referred to the
11 Office of the Attorney General for further
12 investigation and possible prosecution, subject
13 to a delay in referring to allow the parties to
14 seek reconsideration under 3 DCMR Section 429.

15 CHAIR THOMPSON: Thank you.

16 Chair so moves to adopt Counsel's
17 recommendation.

18 MEMBER GREENFIELD: I second.

19 MS. STROUD: And we'll take a roll call
20 vote with respect to that.

21 Mr. Chair?

22 CHAIR THOMPSON: Aye.

1 MS. STROUD: Member Greenfield?

2 MEMBER GREENFIELD: Aye.

3 MS. STROUD: And with that, this matter
4 will be referred to the Office of the Attorney
5 General subject to the target's ability to seek
6 reconsideration before the Board.

7 MS. PEMBROKE: The next matter is
8 Terrell Dance.

9 Again, this came to our attention as a
10 result of the ERIC report, which showed that a
11 ballot was passed in the name of Terrell Dance
12 in the D.C. 2024 general election, and that a
13 ballot was cast in the name of Terrell Dance in
14 the 2024 general election in Maryland.

15 Notably, the ballot return envelope for
16 the D.C. mail ballot issued to Mr. Dance had a
17 handwritten name that was consistent with the
18 name Rell Dance, and the signature associated
19 with the 2024 Maryland ballot consisted of only
20 Rell, and the signatures matched.

21 Based on this evidence, an
22 investigation was opened by the Office of

1 General Counsel.

2 On November 14th, 2025, OGC sent Mr.
3 Dance notice that there would be a pre-hearing
4 conference before that office on December 5th,
5 2025.

6 The notice was sent to the available
7 email and residential addresses for Mr. Dance.

8 The email did not bounce back and the
9 hard copy notices were not returned by the U.S.
10 Postal Service.

11 Mr. Dance did not appear at the
12 December 5th pre-hearing conference.

13 Mr. Dance was then sent notice that, on
14 June 3rd, the Board would hear the General
15 Counsel's recommendation as to enforcement
16 action that the Board should take against him.

17 The mail sent to Mr. Dance's Maryland
18 address was just returned as undeliverable.

19 Mr. Dance has not responded and I have
20 not heard from him.

21 Again, in support of the General
22 Counsel's recommendation in this matter, OGC is

1 requesting that the Board accept the signature
2 evidence provided to the Board previously into
3 the record.

4 CHAIR THOMPSON: Thank you, the Board
5 accepts it.

6 MS. PEMBROKE: And with that, I would
7 ask General Counsel to make a recommendation.

8 MS. STROUD: And my recommendation with
9 respect to this matter would be the same as in
10 the previous matter, that this matter be
11 referred to the Office of the Attorney General
12 for further investigation and possible
13 prosecution subject to the delay in referring to
14 allow the parties to seek reconsideration under
15 3 DCMR 429.

16 CHAIR THOMPSON: Thank you.

17 The Chair so moves to refer the matter.

18 MEMBER GREENFIELD: I second.

19 MS. STROUD: And with that, we'll take a
20 roll call vote.

21 Mr. Chair?

22 CHAIR THOMPSON: Aye.

1 MS. STROUD: Member Greenfield?

2 MEMBER GREENFIELD: Aye.

3 MS. STROUD: And it has been moved, and
4 the Board has moved that we refer this matter
5 subject to the ability to seek reconsideration.

6 MS. PEMBROKE: The next matter is
7 Jenefer Ellingston.

8 Again, this was the result of the ERIC
9 report showing that Ms. Ellingston had voted in
10 the D.C. 2024 general election and in the 2024
11 general election in Maryland.

12 The evidence consisted of a poll pad
13 signature associated with the D.C. in-person
14 ballot issued to Ms. Ellingston that bore a
15 decipherable name of Jenefer Ellingston, and a
16 signature associated with the 2024 GE Maryland
17 ballot that was also decipherable as Jenefer
18 Ellingston.

19 Despite the signatures being produced
20 on different media, they had similarities.

21 On November 14th, 2025, OGC sent Ms.
22 Ellingston notice that there would be a pre-

1 hearing conference before that office on
2 December 5th.

3 The notice was sent to available email
4 and residential addresses for Ms. Ellingston.

5 The email did not bounce back and the
6 hard copy notices were not returned by the U.S.
7 Postal Service.

8 Ms. Ellingston did not appear at the
9 December 5th, 2025 pre-hearing conference.

10 She was then sent notice that, on June
11 3rd, the Board would hear the General Counsel's
12 recommendation as to enforcement action that the
13 Board would take against her.

14 To date, I have not heard from Ms.
15 Ellingston.

16 OGC is requesting, again, that the
17 Board accept into the record the evidence
18 indicating that Ms. Ellingston voted twice in
19 the 2024 general election.

20 MS. STROUD: And I recommend that this
21 matter be referred to the OAG for further
22 investigation and possible prosecution subject

1 to a delay to allow the target to seek
2 reconsideration before the Board under 3 DCMR
3 429.

4 CHAIR THOMPSON: Thank you.

5 The Chair so moves.

6 MEMBER GREENFIELD: Second.

7 MS. STROUD: We'll take a roll call
8 vote.

9 Mr. Chair?

10 CHAIR THOMPSON: Aye.

11 MS. STROUD: Member Greenfield?

12 MEMBER GREENFIELD: Aye.

13 MS. STROUD: And with that, the matter
14 will be referred subject to the ability of the
15 -- subject to the delay that would allow the
16 target to seek reconsideration in accordance
17 with 3 DCMR 429.

18 And the final matter is in the matter
19 of Desdemona Harris.

20 MS. PEMBROKE: Yes, and again, we have
21 evidence that, in the 2024 general election, Ms.
22 Harris voted twice.

1 She -- and in fact, the signatures are
2 an exact match for her in-person vote in D.C.
3 and on the voter authorization card for her
4 Maryland ballot.

5 On November 3rd, OGC sent Ms. Harris
6 notice that there would be a pre-hearing
7 conference before that office on November 17th.

8 The notice was sent to available
9 residential addresses for Ms. Harris.

10 The notices were not returned by the
11 U.S. Postal Service.

12 Ms. Harris did not appear at the
13 November 17th pre-hearing conference.

14 Ms. Harris was sent notice that, on
15 June 3rd, 2026, the Board would hear the General
16 Counsel's recommendation as to enforcement
17 action that the Board should take against her.

18 She has not responded.

19 Again, I'm asking that the Board accept
20 into the record the signature evidence showing
21 that Ms. Harris voted twice in the 2024 general
22 election.

1 MS. STROUD: I recommend that this
2 matter be referred to the OAG for potential --
3 for investigation and potential prosecution
4 subject to the delay to allow the target to seek
5 reconsideration before the Board in accordance
6 with 3 DCMR 429.

7 CHAIR THOMPSON: Thank you, the Chair
8 so moves.

9 MEMBER GREENFIELD: I second.

10 MS. STROUD: We'll take a roll call
11 vote.

12 Mr. Chair?

13 CHAIR THOMPSON: Aye.

14 MS. STROUD: Member Greenfield?

15 MEMBER GREENFIELD: Aye.

16 MS. STROUD: And with that this matter
17 will be referred to the OAG subject to the delay
18 that would allow the target to seek
19 reconsideration before the Board.

20 MS. STROUD: That concludes the referral
21 matters of the enforcement matters.

22 And the final item on my agenda is

1 litigation status where I'll report out on the
2 active cases before -- that the Board is
3 involved in.

4 The first is Hall vs. the Board.

5 This is a remand from an appeal where -
6 - of a June 20, 2025 D.C. Circuit reversal of
7 the U.S. District Court's denial on the basis of
8 standing of a challenge to legislation allowing
9 non-citizens to vote in local elections.

10 There's been no change in the status of
11 this case since the last report.

12 The next matter is Wilson vs. Muriel
13 Bowser, et al., including the Board, that's in
14 the D.C. Superior Court.

15 This was a challenge to the Board's
16 finding that Initiative 83 met proper subject
17 requirements and its formulations of the
18 measure.

19 We were scheduled to have a hearing in
20 this matter on June 12th, but on yesterday, the
21 Court issued an order that granted the
22 Defendant's motion to strike, denied the

1 Defendant's motion to expedite as moot, granted
2 Defendant's motion for judgment on the
3 pleadings, granted Intervener Defendant's motion
4 for summary judgment, vacated all future
5 hearings, and ordered the case closed.

6 The next matter is Long vs. the Board.

7 There has been no change in the status of this
8 case since the last report.

9 The next matter is the U.S. Department
10 of Justice vs. Monica Evans. We are waiting for
11 the Court to decide this matter.

12 The next matter is Guggenmos vs. the
13 Board.

14 This was a challenge to the Board's
15 decision finding that Initiative Measure Number
16 87 met proper subject requirements and its
17 adoption of that measure's formulation.

18 On May 19th, the parties filed
19 dispositive motions in accordance with the
20 adopted litigation schedule, and the Board
21 requested that the Court take judicial notice of
22 the record.

1 On May 21st, the Court denied
2 Plaintiff's May 4th request for discovery.

3 The Court also denied the Board's May
4 19th motion for judicial notice because the
5 Court may already consider the Agency record
6 that the Board filed on April 28th for purposes
7 of its dispositive motion.

8 On June 2nd, the parties' oppositions
9 to the pending dispositive motions were filed
10 and replies to those oppositions are due next
11 Tuesday, June 9th.

12 The final matter is Douglass vs. the
13 Board, this is in D.C. Superior Court.

14 This is a challenge to the Board's
15 decision finding that Initiative Measure Number
16 88 met proper subject requirements and its
17 adoption of that measure's formulations.

18 This complaint was filed on May 22nd.

19 The Court has set an initial hearing
20 date of August 28th.

21 On June 2nd, we entered a notice of
22 appearance in the matter.

1 And on June 3rd, we filed the record in
2 the matter and the certification thereof.

3 That concludes the litigation status
4 and my report in its entirety.

5 I'm happy to answer any questions the
6 Board might have at this time.

7 CHAIR THOMPSON: I haven't studied it
8 closely, but it looks like yesterday's ruling in
9 Wilson vs. Bowser granted our motion for
10 judgment on the pleadings, specifically on the
11 point that we correctly determined that
12 Initiative 83 was, quote, proper subject matter.

13 MS. STROUD: That is correct.

14 And in doing so, the Court did construe
15 the motion for judgment on the pleadings as a
16 motion for summary of judgment and granted that
17 as well as the Intervenor Defendant's motion for
18 summary judgment.

19 CHAIR THOMPSON: Right.

20 And I see that the Court went through
21 all the arguments that were presented to us.

22 I can't even remember what it was a

1 long time ago under the Home Rule Act and the
2 First Amendment and D.C. Human Rights Act, et
3 cetera, went through all those arguments
4 upholding our findings.

5 This is a Superior Court ruling, so I
6 guess they have an opportunity to appeal.

7 MS. STROUD: Yes, within 30 days of the
8 Court's order.

9 CHAIR THOMPSON: Is there any other
10 pending litigation regarding Initiative 83?

11 MS. STROUD: No, there isn't.

12 CHAIR THOMPSON: Okay. Thank you.

13 I think with that we'll turn to our
14 campaign finance report from Cecily Collier-
15 Montgomery.

16 MS. COLLIER-MONTGOMERY: Good morning.

17 For the record, the full report of the
18 activity of the Agency for the month of May 2026
19 will be posted at the OCF website,
20 www.ocf.dc.gov, before the close of business
21 today.

22 And I will, at this time, highlight a

1 few items of interest for the public.

2 First, on May 8th, 2026, I presented
3 testimony before the Council's Committee on
4 Executive Administration and Labor on the
5 proposed fiscal year 2027 budget request for the
6 Office of Campaign Finance.

7 In our Fair Elections Program Division,
8 I would note with respect to the 2026 election
9 cycle, as of this date, there are 20 certified
10 participating candidates in the Fair Elections
11 Program.

12 And the Agency has authorized the
13 disbursement of the total sum of \$9,429,119.53
14 from the Fair Election Fund and base amount and
15 matching payments to the candidates who have
16 been certified in the program.

17 For the 2026 election cycle for a
18 member of the Council at-large, as of this date,
19 there are three certified participating
20 candidates in the Fair Elections Program.

21 And the Agency has authorized the
22 disbursement of the total sum of \$415,206.15

1 from the Fair Elections Fund and base amount and
2 matching payments to the candidates, again, who
3 are certified to participate in the special
4 election.

5 During the month of May 2026, there
6 were also 38 disbursements authorized of public
7 funds.

8 And the list of the disbursements is
9 available in our report which, again, will be
10 posted at close of business today.

11 The Fair Elections Program also
12 reviewed 87 amended reports of receipts and
13 expenditures, and as a result of that review,
14 issued 25 requests for additional information.

15 As far as the ongoing 2020, 2022, 2024,
16 and 2025 post-election full field audits, they
17 are listed in the OCF report.

18 I would point out that, during the
19 month of May, the Fair Elections Program issued
20 one preliminary audit findings report and one
21 final audit report.

22 And those are the Sheila Bunn Principal

1 Campaign Committee, post-election preliminary
2 audit report which was issued on May the 26th
3 2026.

4 And that report pertains to the
5 candidate's participation in the 2025 special
6 election cycle.

7 The Monica Palacio for City Council
8 Principal Campaign Committee post-election final
9 compliance audit report was issued on May the
10 26th.

11 And the candidate was a participant in
12 the 2022 election cycle.

13 The final audit report is available at
14 our website for review by members of the public.

15 In our Public Information and Records
16 Management Division, during the month of May,
17 there was one report date for the filing of
18 reports of receipts and expenditures, and that
19 was May 10th, 2026.

20 And the reports were due by the Active
21 Fair Election Candidate Committee.

22 And that is basically, the candidates

1 who are participating in the 2026 election
2 cycle.

3 With respect to the financial reports
4 that were filed, the images of the reports are
5 available at our website for review by members
6 of the public.

7 And the report also provides the status
8 of the financial reports which were due on that
9 date, the number that were filed and the number
10 of late filings, as well as the number of
11 reports which were not filed.

12 For the candidates and committees who
13 are participating in the 2026 election cycle, in
14 the Traditional Campaign Finance Program, there
15 are a total of 164 candidates who have
16 registered.

17 And 158 of those candidates have an
18 active status.

19 During the month of May, the following
20 new registration occurred. In the June 16th
21 2026 primary election for the Office of Mayor,
22 the candidate, Anthony Muhammad, who's the

1 write-in candidate, registered on May the 13th
2 2026.

3 In the Fair Elections Program, there
4 are currently 59 candidates, 41 of those
5 candidates are active who have registered to
6 participate in the program.

7 For the month of May, the list of
8 candidates in new registrations are as follows.

9 For the November 3, 2026 general
10 election, for the Office of State Board of
11 Education member from Ward 1, the candidate Ben
12 Williams registered on May 26th, 2026.

13 There was also one initiative committee
14 registration for the month of May. The
15 committee Housing D.C.'s Future, treasurer David
16 Lewis, registered on the May 26th, 2026.

17 The Division referred 11 committees to
18 the OCF Office of the General Counsel for the
19 failure to timely file the May 10th report of
20 receipts and expenditures, and the names of
21 those committees and the treasurers are listed
22 in the report.

1 Last, there were five candidates and
2 treasurers who completed the OCF Entrance
3 Conference for May 2026, and those were Rami
4 Chalabi, Rami for D.C. Treasurer, Thomas P.
5 Daley, DC Association of Realtors PAC Treasurer,
6 Lindsay McFarland, Affordable Future D.C., and
7 that's an Independent Expenditure Committee, and
8 that is the Treasurer, Thomas P. Daley, D.C.
9 Association of Realtors, Independent Expenditure
10 Committee, and the treasurer is Thomas P. Daley,
11 Laura Kraft, Washington Forward Political Action
12 Committee, and the treasurer is Laura Kraft.

13 In the Traditional Campaign Finance
14 Program during the month of May, there were 25
15 desk reviews of financial reports which have
16 been filed in the Traditional Program and nine
17 requests for additional information were issued
18 as a result of the review of those reports.

19 Also, as far as audits which were
20 issued, we have one audit which was issued, that
21 was for the Bike Walk and Bus Political Action
22 Committee.

1 The final compliance audit of the
2 January 31st, 2026 report of receipts and
3 expenditures of the committee and the audit
4 report was issued on May the 22nd.

5 There's one ongoing audit in the
6 Traditional Program and that is in the
7 Constituent Services Program.

8 It was the random periodic audit of the
9 January 1st, 2026 report which was filed by
10 Felder's Fund for Citizen Service. The audit is
11 in progress.

12 The audit field work has been completed
13 and the preliminary draft statement of findings
14 was issued on May the 22nd.

15 Before the General Counsel for the
16 Agency gives his report, I would just like to
17 acknowledge on the record that the Agency did
18 receive training on the ranked voting as well as
19 on the calculation of the votes from the Board.

20 And I would like to thank Monica for
21 that training.

22 And also I would just like to

1 acknowledge that your staff is tremendous and,
2 as a result of the training, we all have a
3 better understanding of the process, and that
4 certainly was important to me as a resident of
5 the District, so, thank you.

6 And I would ask Bill Sanford to give
7 his report.

8 MR. SANFORD: Thank you, Director.

9 Good morning, Mr. Chairman
10 distinguished Board Member Greenfield.

11 During the month of May 2026, the
12 Office of the General Counsel received 26
13 referrals, completed three informal hearings,
14 and issued three orders which included the
15 following.

16 Two orders were issued in which no
17 fines were imposed, and one order was issued in
18 which a fine of \$4,000 was imposed.

19 That fine of \$4,000 was imposed against
20 Eboni-Rose Thompson 2024 candidate, principal
21 campaign committee.

22 During the month of May 2026, the

1 following investigations were pending before the
2 Office of Campaign Finance.

3 Docket Number OCF-FI2026004,
4 consolidated.

5 The Complainants are Elissa Silverman,
6 Tim Krepp, Amy Mauro, Michael Crawford, Senovia
7 Hurtado-Aviles.

8 That complaint was docketed on the 24th
9 of March 2026 through the 30th of March 2026.

10 The Respondent was Khalil Lee,
11 principal campaign committee.

12 And the allegation was campaign
13 contribution reporting violation.

14 That matter remains pending.

15 Second matter was OCF-FI2026005.

16 Complainant was Jack Evans.

17 It was docketed on the 2nd of April
18 2026.

19 The Respondent was Phil Mendelson.

20 The allegation was improper use of
21 government resources.

22 And that order was issued in this

1 matter on the 18th of May 2026.

2 And in the order, a fine of \$4,000 was
3 imposed against Mendelson.

4 Docket Number OCF-FI2026006.

5 Complainant was Douglas Ticker.

6 It was docketed on April 20th, 2026.

7 Respondent was Jakeline Maryori Reyes
8 Janes.

9 And the allegation was failure to
10 report expenditures.

11 That matter was expanded by an
12 additional complaint or referral from the Fair
13 Election Division in which they alleged campaign
14 contributions reporting violations had also
15 occurred with the Ms. Reyes Yanes campaign.

16 And that referral was received by the
17 Office of the General Counsel on May 11th, 2026.

18 That matter remains pending.

19 The next matter is Docket Number OCF-
20 FI2026-007.

21 The Complainant is Kevin Sobkoviak.

22 It was docketed on the 24th of April,

1 2026.

2 The Respondents are Janeese Lewis
3 George, Principal Campaign Committee, Safe &
4 Affordable Political Action Committee, UNITE
5 HERE Local 25 Union, and the SEIU 32BJ Union.

6 The allegation is improper
7 coordination.

8 That matter remains pending.

9 Next matter is OCF FI-2026008.

10 Complainant was Shelli Jackson.

11 It was docketed on the 28th of April
12 2026.

13 The Respondent was Yazam, doing
14 business as Empower.

15 The allegation was no disclaimer on
16 campaign literature and failure to register with
17 the Office of Campaign Finance.

18 On May 11th, the Office of Campaign
19 Finance issued a cease and desist order and an
20 order to show cause.

21 The next matter is OCF FI2026-009.

22 Complainant was William Singer.

1 That matter was dated -- was docketed
2 on the 7th of May 2026.

3 Respondent was A United Research
4 Council.

5 The allegation was failure to identify
6 political advertising and failure to report an
7 independent expenditure.

8 An order to show cause and cease and
9 desist order was issued in this matter on May
10 13th and that matter remains pending.

11 During the month of May 2026, there
12 were no requests for interpreted opinions.

13 And finally, during the month of May
14 2026, the two show cause proceedings that I
15 alluded to earlier remain pending.

16 And those are OCF FI2026008,
17 Complainant Shelli Jackson. Respondent, Yazam
18 doing business as Empower.

19 And OCF FI2026009, Complainant William
20 Singer and Respondent, A United DC Research
21 Council.

22 The contents of the General Counsel's

1 report will be published at the Office of
2 Campaign of Finance website under the data and
3 reports section by close of business on today's
4 date, the 3rd of June 2026.

5 And that should conclude my report.

6 CHAIR THOMPSON: All right, thank you
7 very much.

8 Anything else from OCF?

9 MS. COLLIER-MONTGOMERY: Basically,
10 that concludes the report of the Office of
11 Campaign Finance.

12 CHAIR THOMPSON: Okay.

13 And finally, we'll hear from any
14 members of the D.C. public who'd like to
15 comment.

16 I think everybody knows this already,
17 early voting starts Monday, June 8th, and it
18 continues through Sunday, June 14th.

19 We have 25 early vote centers, you can
20 vote anywhere where a vote center is open.

21 And to prove it, I have now voted in
22 seven of the eight Wards.

1 So, very shortly I will vote in Ward 6
2 and complete my cycle of voting in all eight
3 wards.

4 I literally cycle, in that I will get
5 on my bike and ride to all 25 vote centers once
6 again. I think I'm going to do it on June 9th.

7 So, I like to bike around and see
8 what's going on and mostly just say thank you to
9 our staff and our thousands of election workers
10 who are out there staffing each and every vote
11 center.

12 So, with that I see Mr. Schiller,
13 Nicholas Schiller has his hand raised.

14 Hello, Mr. Schiller, and please
15 proceed.

16 MR. SCHILLER: Can you hear me okay?

17 CHAIR THOMPSON: Yes.

18 MR. SCHILLER: Excellent.

19 I have three questions, I'll try to be
20 as brief as I can.

21 I was going to do a different question
22 first, but since you brought up your cycling

1 around D.C. and voting, I think this question is
2 kind of tailored to that one.

3 So, I -- as someone who reviews the
4 voter roll on a regular basis, I have concerns
5 about the use of precincts.

6 Because a long time ago, precincts were
7 like you could only vote at your precinct, that
8 you were assigned to your precinct.

9 And now, as you're clearly doing, you
10 can go around and vote at any vote center that's
11 open.

12 So, I'm not able to really find out
13 where voters are voting right now.

14 Is there a page on the D.C. Board of
15 Elections website that details how many voters
16 voted at each vote center specifically, like
17 both during early voting and on election day?

18 I know there might be something that
19 comes up for next week, but it'd be really
20 useful for campaigns and also for voters to know
21 which vote centers are more popular than others,
22 which ones get more foot traffic.

1 This might be something for an after
2 action report.

3 But now that voters can vote at any
4 vote center, the precinct data that campaigns
5 receive is kind of useless because, you know,
6 we're not able to find out that information now.

7 So, it'd be really useful if we can get
8 that data.

9 The other part is along the same vein
10 is in the past Board of Elections has issued
11 updated voter rolls after the primary election.

12 So far in this primary campaign cycle,
13 I have requested FOIAs for the voter roll
14 through the FOIA process.

15 And I heard Ms. Evans mention that the
16 voter roll was published in the library on June
17 1st and across D.C.

18 And I submitted a FOIA on June 1st to
19 receive the same voter roll and I have yet to
20 receive the voter roll for June 1st.

21 And my concern, maybe it might be
22 because I'm going through the FOIA process

1 instead of going directly to the Board of
2 Elections, but throughout the last couple months
3 I had three different FOIA requests for the
4 voter roll.

5 Like April 1st I got the next day of
6 the April 1st voter data.

7 On May 1st I asked for the May 1st
8 voter data, I got April 23rd voter data.

9 And then, on May 26th I asked for the
10 voter data, and I got the May 7th voter data.

11 And on June 1st I requested the June
12 1st voter data, and I'm still waiting to get
13 that.

14 So, it'd be great if we could figure
15 out something that works well for all parties
16 involved.

17 And the last part is a question about
18 the Douglas, et al. lawsuit concerning
19 Initiative 88.

20 With respect to the Initiative 87
21 lawsuit, there was a Motion for Expedited Review
22 that was filed seven days after the complaint

1 was filed in D.C. Superior Court.

2 It's been ten days since the Douglas
3 lawsuit was filed.

4 Is the Board of Elections planning on
5 filing a Motion for Expedited Review concerning
6 Initiative 88?

7 Thank you so much for your time and
8 your service to the voters of the District of
9 Columbia.

10 MS. HOLMAN EVANS: Yes, thank you for
11 your questions.

12 You are correct, we now no longer have
13 precinct based voting in the District and any
14 voter can vote at any vote center.

15 We do post information on our website
16 and have for the last few election cycles where
17 you can see the voted ballots received.

18 And that information is available for
19 ballots received through the U.S. Postal
20 Service, through mail ballot drop boxes, and
21 also in-person early voting as well.

22 And so, we have a landing page on our

1 website, and it has voted ballots received, and
2 you can find that information, and it will be
3 available for early vote centers once they open.

4 I'm trying to remember the second
5 question -- yes, as far as getting the voter
6 list, and you are correct, we are adhering to
7 the rules of the FOIA process.

8 And so, the FOIA process does give us a
9 number of days to respond to the request.

10 The information you receive has not
11 always been on the same cadence because it
12 depends on the workload and other
13 responsibilities of the office, how quickly we
14 can turn that around.

15 But we do ensure that we adhere to the
16 guidelines around the FOIA process and providing
17 that information as we receive it.

18 And it also depends on the number of
19 requests we may receive at any given time as
20 well.

21 As far as your third inquiry, I will
22 turn that over to our General Counsel.

1 MS. STROUD: The statute requires
2 expedition, so the Office of the General Counsel
3 will govern itself accordingly.

4 And that's what I will say with respect
5 to that, because that is active litigation and
6 that's what I'm going to say with respect to
7 that question.

8 MR. SCHILLER: Thank you for answering
9 all the questions.

10 I -- just to follow up on the vote
11 center totals, I really love the drop box totals
12 and the U.S. Postal Service totals on the
13 website.

14 I download them and check them out
15 actually every single day, I think it's very
16 useful.

17 I think it will also be useful for --
18 to have the totals on a daily basis for the vote
19 centers, but also possibly in the future for an
20 action item report of what the -- which vote
21 centers are the most utilized.

22 Because I think, ultimately, the Board

1 of Elections would save money if they don't need
2 to have as many vote centers specifically on
3 election day.

4 So, thank you again for all your time
5 and service to the voters of DC.

6 MS. HOLMAN EVANS: Absolutely.

7 And to your point we do post daily once
8 vote centers open those totals so they will be
9 available beginning June 8th.

10 CHAIR THOMPSON: Okay.

11 I see a hand from Mr. Angelo Greco.

12 MR. GRECO: Hello, good morning, can
13 you hear me everyone?

14 CHAIR THOMPSON: Yes.

15 MR. GRECO: Thank you so much, thank
16 you so much to the Board and all its
17 distinguished members.

18 Good morning, everyone, my name is
19 Angelo Greco, I represent the D.C. Living Wage
20 for All.

21 Thanks again for giving me the
22 opportunity to speak, I'll keep it under three

1 minutes, I know everyone's time is precious.

2 I'm here today as a D.C. resident, a
3 voter, and in this case, an advocate for
4 Initiative 87, which is Living Wage for All
5 Amendment of 2026.

6 As you may know, D.C. Living Wage for
7 All is the ballot committee I chair, and I'm
8 here today to urge to give us a chance to
9 qualify the Living Wage Initiative this year.

10 And you know, we recently sent a letter
11 to the Board on this issue.

12 The initiative is important to me, to
13 restaurant workers, and to all workers who
14 currently don't earn enough to meet the cost of
15 living, and to the District to allow special
16 interests who opposed it delay the process more
17 than they already have by filing this lawsuit
18 against the Board in Superior Court.

19 My hope is that you act promptly if the
20 Court rules in the Board's favor on June 23rd
21 when the hearing is held or shortly thereafter.

22 You know, I'm urging that the Board can

1 and should notice a special meeting on the 26th
2 to present the original petition form.

3 This would give the public the
4 necessary and required two days notice and would
5 give us the same time we need to collect and
6 submit valid signatures by the 6th to qualify
7 the Initiative for the November ballot.

8 If the Board waits, not only could we
9 be harmed, but it's every restaurant worker who
10 we represent who are also in D.C., who are D.C.
11 voters, who are just hoping for this to pass,
12 can be damaged.

13 And so, we, the D.C. voters who support
14 this Initiative by more than a four to one
15 majority are just really hoping we can move
16 quickly on this.

17 We shouldn't have to wait until 2028.

18 You know, the initiative can't wait
19 because we already have an affordability crisis.

20 This is what we are -- we've been fighting for
21 this time and time again.

22 And, you know, as a D.C. resident, I'm

1 so disappointed that, you know, we are still at
2 it, you know, there's some administrative
3 problems here.

4 But, you know, we're struggling,
5 minimum wage workers are struggling every day,
6 and we're falling further behind as the price of
7 rent and food and gas and childcare climb, and
8 here we are back at square one.

9 I'll tell you a little bit about
10 myself, I'm a former restaurant worker myself.

11 I'm an entrepreneur now, and I know
12 what it means to make ends meet, and work just
13 to get enough to pay rent.

14 And in D.C. it is the case for me and
15 all of my friends and neighbors.

16 This is about my neighbors, my
17 community, my friends, and people I work with
18 and have lived in D.C. for generations and for
19 years.

20 This is why we have this Initiative
21 process.

22 We can exercise our vote and get the

1 issues on the ballot that are important to us.

2 This happened twice before when the
3 people have had the opportunity to raise the
4 minimum wage in D.C., they overwhelmingly voted
5 to do it.

6 The District did, but despite that, and
7 despite what the voters wanted, that strong
8 support was overturned.

9 The Council repealed, in large part,
10 both Initiatives, which is why we're back here
11 again.

12 Special interests oppose the living
13 wage initiative now, that they don't, which is
14 why our best hope is for them to try this delay.

15 They filed that lawsuit against the
16 Board to try to delay and derail this process.

17 We're not asking the Board to favor us
18 over them in any way, we're simply asking you to
19 do what the law says you should do, which is
20 review this.

21 So, once the lawsuit is resolved and
22 the Court rules in the Board's favor, we're

1 asking you to give us a chance to get the
2 Initiative on the November ballot.

3 We know we can gather the number of
4 ballot signatures needed to qualify the
5 Initiative for the November ballot.

6 We've done it before, we can do it
7 again. We've done it, and we're very confident
8 we can.

9 You know, our groups have proven time
10 and again that they can collect enough ballot
11 signatures in a span of little more than a week.

12 This year, we have special opportunity,
13 on Saturday, June 27th, there will be mass
14 mobilization with thousands of D.C. voters.

15 If you hold your meeting within 48
16 hours notice on June 26th, as the law allows you
17 to do, we can collect anywhere from a third to a
18 half of all the necessary signatures.

19 We have a plan in place and we're ready
20 to get it done.

21 So, all we're asking is that you give
22 us a chance, give the restaurant workers the

1 chance, give D.C. voters the chance, give
2 democracy a chance.

3 Please, if the Court rules for the
4 Board, stand for a prompt Initiative process and
5 notice of special meetings to present the
6 petition.

7 Let us get started talking and taking
8 the Initiative to voters and to D.C. through the
9 democratic process.

10 That's all we're asking for.

11 CHAIR THOMPSON: Thank you so much for
12 your comment.

13 In terms of the timing relative to the
14 Court action, I'll defer to General Counsel
15 Stroud to comment.

16 MR. GRECO: Thank you, sir, we
17 appreciate it.

18 MS. STROUD: We don't have an idea of
19 when this resolution, I mean, this litigation
20 will be concluded.

21 I do know that we have a hearing
22 scheduled for the 23rd, and I think that the

1 proposers are assuming that the Court will make
2 a decision at that time.

3 But it's up to the Board to determine
4 whether or not it wants to call a special
5 meeting should the Court rule.

6 And that's what they're asking you to
7 do, they're asking you to notice and schedule a
8 meeting should the Court rule on June 23rd.

9 The meeting would be on June 26th to
10 allow for 48 hours notice, but it is up to the
11 Board to determine whether or not it would call
12 a special meeting for issue.

13 CHAIR THOMPSON: Yes, we can't schedule
14 a meeting currently, obviously, until we know
15 what happens on the 23rd, but if that window
16 presents itself, I'm available on June 26th to
17 hold a special meeting and consider the issuance
18 of petitions.

19 If Mr. Greco and his colleagues -- if
20 they can collect signatures in that window of
21 time, that's their prerogative.

22 So, yes, I'll be available on the 26th

1 if it's important.

2 MR. GRECO: Amazing, thank you, thank
3 you.

4 If it's possible, I'm joined here by my
5 colleague and friend, Ben Roble, he's also a
6 District voter, I think he has his hand up.

7 CHAIR THOMPSON: Yes, yes, we'll hear
8 from Mr. Roble.

9 And obviously, we don't have any
10 position of the merits of the Initiative.

11 We're trying to organize the process
12 here, including relative to Court proceedings.

13 So, Mr. Roble, please go ahead.

14 MR. ROBLE: Thanks, Angelo, and thank
15 you so much, I will be brief.

16 My name is Ben Roble, I'm a D.C. voter
17 and longtime advocate for social justice issues.

18 Like Angelo, I'm fortunate to be
19 working with One Fair Wage on the Initiative 87
20 campaigns.

21 Thank you for the opportunity to speak.

22 I'm likewise here to ask you to notice

1 the special meeting on June 26th if the Court
2 rules promptly to present the original petition
3 form so that we, meaning D.C. voters, have the
4 opportunity to weigh in this year on this
5 critical issue.

6 As Angelo shared, polling shows that 80
7 percent of D.C. voters approve of Initiative 87
8 and advocates began this process at the
9 beginning of the year, nine months before the
10 election.

11 And D.C. residents should not have to
12 wait until 2028 or even 2027.

13 So, what we're asking for is to commit
14 to noticing a special meeting on June 26th, as
15 Angelo shared.

16 And what ultimately matters here is
17 that voters like myself have an opportunity to
18 be heard on this issue of critical importance to
19 the District.

20 So, thank you again for your time.

21 CHAIR THOMPSON: All right, yes, thank
22 you.

1 We'll be at the ready.

2 All right, well, seeing no other public
3 comment, we'll conclude our meeting.

4 I'll just say thank you to everybody on
5 the staff, especially that's working so hard
6 around the clock. There's so much going on
7 right now it's hard to even summarize and say
8 sufficient thank yous.

9 So, there'll be much more of that in
10 future meetings, but starting Monday, we'll see
11 our voters live in early voting.

12 And so, with that, unless there's any
13 other comments or matters, I will move that we
14 adjourn.

15 MEMBER GREENFIELD: I will second.

16 CHAIR THOMPSON: All in favor?

17 (CHORUS OF AYES)

18 CHAIR THOMPSON: All right, have a
19 great day, thank you.

20 (Whereupon, the above-entitled matter
21 went off the record at 11:36 a.m.)
