3 CHAIR THOMPSON: All right. Good
4 morning, everybody. Happy October. My name's
5 Gary Thompson, the Chair of the D.C. Board of
6 Elections.

7 And with us here today is my fellow
8 Board Member, Karyn Greenfield. We've got a
9 quorum. At this time I would move we adopt the
10 agenda that's been distributed.

11 MEMBER GREENFIELD: I second.

12 CHAIR THOMPSON: All in favor say, aye.

13 MEMBER GREENFIELD: Aye.

14 CHAIR THOMPSON: And I also move that
15 we adopt the minutes that we've had a chance to
16 review from our last meeting.

17 MEMBER GREENFIELD: And I second that.

18 CHAIR THOMPSON: All in favor, aye.

19 MEMBER GREENFIELD: Aye.

20 CHAIR THOMPSON: Okay. That was easy.
21 I guess we have some other things to talk about.
22 So I will turn it over to our Executive

1 Director, Monica Evans.

2 MS. EVANS: Good morning, and thank
3 you. This is the Executive Director's report
4 for September 2025.

5 On September 23rd, I attended an AI
6 workshop in Reston, Virginia. The workshop
7 focused on the ways skills are changing in the
8 workforce.

9 Employee expectations have changed and
10 technology skills often become obsolete within
11 two years. We are becoming a society where
12 people want an on demand learning process.

13 AI addresses the skill gaps. Skills
14 are the currency to help businesses transform
15 with AI. There was a discussion about how AI
16 complements work by reinforcing adaptive skills.

17 On September 26th, several staff
18 members and I visited early voting at the
19 Arlington County Board of Elections. In
20 addition to observing early voting we took an
21 office tour and we asked questions about their
22 implementation of rank choice voting.

1 We, also, staffed an outreach event on
2 Sunday, September 28th. I was able to talk to
3 teens who did not know you can pre-register to
4 vote at the age of 16 in the District of
5 Columbia.

6 Many teens expressed interest in
7 registering to vote. However, several lived in
8 Virginia and Maryland. Voter registration
9 rolls.

10 In September we registered 2,816 new
11 voters, and processed 4,067 registration
12 changes. In total, we prepared 6,883 voter
13 registration cards to be mailed.

14 Additionally, 268 registered voters
15 moved out of D.C., 519 voters cancelled their
16 D.C. registrations and registered with other
17 jurisdictions. And 724 voters registered in
18 D.C., after cancelling their registrations in
19 other states.

20 We are continuing to register voters
21 using our website portal. To date we have
22 processed over 99,460 applications using the

1 portal. These include new voter registrations
2 and updates to existing registrations.

3 Total non-citizen registration is 962.
4 In September we registered two new non-citizen
5 voters. Some non-citizens have been removed
6 from the registry due to our list maintenance
7 efforts. And we are continuing our outreach in
8 D.C. communities to share information.

9 2026 election cycle planning.
10 Beginning today we are implementing the
11 Automatic Voter Registration Expansion Act.
12 Individuals who are eligible to register to vote
13 would no longer be able to completely decline
14 registration at the Department of Motor
15 Vehicles, or DMV.

16 The names of individuals who decline
17 will be forwarded to the Board of Elections.
18 They will be placed into a pending voter
19 registration status.

20 We will contact these individuals, and
21 they may have their names removed from the
22 pending list. They may register to vote. Or

1 they may do nothing at all.

2 If the do nothing they will receive a
3 mail ballot for two general election cycles.
4 The mail ballots will allow them to register and
5 vote at the same time.

6 We are, also, monitoring pending
7 legislation and information on the federal
8 level. Legislation to repeal the Local Resident
9 Voting Rights Amendment Act has passed the
10 House.

11 Senator Britt introduced Senate Bill
12 2636 that prohibits individuals who are not
13 citizens of the United States from voting in
14 elections in the District of Columbia. And to
15 repeal the Local Resident Voting Rights
16 Amendment Act of 2022. There's been no further
17 actions in the Senate.

18 During the 2026 election cycle we are
19 scheduled to implement rank choice voting. We
20 have been meeting with other jurisdictions and
21 resource entities to gather information and
22 prepare.

1 Our mail canvas and list maintenance
2 process. We are actively engaged in list
3 maintenance to ensure the accuracy and integrity
4 of the voter registration database.

5 This ongoing effort is critical to
6 keeping the voter registration database
7 accurate, and includes identifying and updating
8 records for voters who have moved out of D.C.,
9 voters who have changed addresses within D.C.,
10 duplicate registrations, and deceased
11 individuals.

12 As part of our biennial canvas we sent
13 two rounds of mailers to make sure the voter
14 registration records are accurate. During the
15 first canvas mailer, a total of 153,407 non-
16 forwardable mailers were sent to voters who did
17 not participate in the 2024 general election.
18 And the full responses will be available in my
19 complete report.

20 The second canvas mailer was sent to
21 21,983 voters who did not respond to the initial
22 mailing. And from this group the numbers who

1 either confirmed their registration, moved,
2 deceased, or mailers that were undeliverable,
3 all of those categories can also be found in the
4 complete report as far as the breakdown.

5 OCTO launched a new mandatory
6 cybersecurity refresher campaign. This
7 campaign, which ran from July 22nd through
8 September 22nd consisted of a self-paced
9 training module designed to reinforce the
10 central cybersecurity practices and protocols.

11 One hundred percent of BOE staff
12 members completed the training timely. There
13 are no cybersecurity incidents reported in
14 September. And all systems remain secure and
15 fully operational.

16 We are actively working with ERIC
17 member states to review cases and identify any
18 potential instances of voters casting multiple
19 ballots in D.C. and other jurisdictions or on
20 behalf of deceased individuals during the 2024
21 general election.

22 This review is part of our ongoing

1 efforts to safeguard election integrity, and
2 ensure all votes cast are valid. We're
3 currently reviewing 144 flagged cases.

4 Of these, approximately 19 cases across
5 six states have been referred to the General
6 Counsel for further investigation. We expect to
7 be finished with this effort before the end of
8 the year.

9 Voter education and outreach. During
10 the month of September the voter education and
11 outreach division participated in 13, I'm sorry,
12 in 32 outreach events on behalf of the Agency.

13 Events included eight outreach events
14 on National Voter Registration Day, which was
15 Tuesday, September 16. National Voter
16 Registration Day ended with a registration drive
17 at Nationals Park. There we partnered with
18 Prince George's County, Maryland, and Arlington
19 County, Virginia to register voters.

20 Election Worker Division. The Election
21 Worker Division is processing all election
22 worker applications that have been received

1 through our website, or from outreach events.

2 The Election Worker Division is working with our
3 vendor, VR systems, on enhancements to our
4 election worker portal.

5 The Division is currently updating
6 training materials to reflect rank choice voting
7 and making revisions to the election worker
8 operations manual.

9 We currently have 16 active ANC
10 vacancies for the 2025/2026 term. These
11 positions are in different stages of being
12 filled.

13 After candidate filing requirements are
14 met an open vote of registered voters of the
15 affected SMD will be held during regularly
16 scheduled ANC meetings.

17 Finally, the Board received a
18 resolution with the results of the 7F08
19 election. And that is the SMD that includes the
20 Department of Corrections. And as a result,
21 Harold Cunningham was named as the winner.

22 The Board certified the vacancy is

1 filled with a posting in the D.C. Register on
2 September 26th. And that concludes my report.
3 Thank you.

4 CHAIR THOMPSON: Well thank you. And I
5 want to thank on our staff for all the hard work
6 they did on National Voter Registration Day.

7 I went out myself to a couple of sites.
8 It was a lot of fun. It's always great to see
9 people registering to vote. It's something we
10 do constantly, not just on that particular day.
11 It's an ongoing process. So, but thank you to
12 everybody at the BOE.

13 So, with that we'll turn to our General
14 Counsel, Terri Stroud.

15 MS. STROUD: Good morning. The first
16 item on my agenda is the issuance of the
17 petition for Initiative Measure Number 84, the
18 Time Stability Act of 2025.

19 And I would, we're going to share the
20 petition that the Board has prepared. And I
21 will invite the proposer, Daniel Bernier, to --
22 I see he has his hand raised.

1 So, we'll invite him as a panelist.

2 Oh, I see him. Daniel, I think that's him.

3 Daniel He/Him.

4 MR. BERNIER: Looks like I'm unmuted
5 now.

6 MS. STROUD: Okay. Thank you.

7 MR. BERNIER: Okay.

8 MS. STROUD: So, I'm going to have the
9 proposer, Mr. Bernier. Am I pronouncing your
10 name correctly?

11 MR. BERNIER: It's fine. It's Bernier.
12 But however. I'm not stressing about my name.

13 MS. STROUD: Okay. So, we will have
14 Mr. Bernier state his name for the record, and
15 our Registrar of Voters who is here with us
16 today. And then we will, I will provide
17 background with respect to where we are in the
18 process.

19 MR. BERNIER: Sure. For the record, my
20 name is Daniel John Bernier, and I'm a resident
21 of Washington, D.C.

22 MS. STROUD: Okay. Ms. Corrente.

1 MS. CORRENTE: Good morning. My name
2 is Marissa Corrente, and I'm the Registrar of
3 Voters here at the D.C. Board of Elections.

4 MS. STROUD: Okay. Thank you. By way
5 of background, on Thursday, August 7th the Board
6 formulated the language for the Time Stability
7 Act of 2025, which was approved as a proper
8 subject on Monday, June 9th, 2025.

9 The formulations were published in the
10 D.C. Register on Friday, August 18th for a ten
11 day review period, during which any registered
12 voter could challenge the Board's formulations
13 in D.C. Superior Court.

14 The review period ended on Monday,
15 August 25th with no challenges being filed.
16 Accordingly the Board formulations are deemed
17 approved.

18 I will now read the formulations for
19 the initiative as they were published in the
20 D.C. Register, and as they will appear on all
21 materials related to the proposed measure into
22 the record.

1 Yes. And you can see it. We've posted
2 on the screen the petition that is the subject
3 of today's proceeding. The petition. Okay.
4 You can leave it there for now.

5 Okay. So, Initiative Measure Number
6 84. The short title is The Time Stability Act
7 of 2025. And the summary statement reads as
8 follows.

9 If enacted this initiative would exempt
10 the District from observing Daylight Savings
11 Time (DST) in accordance with the Federal
12 Uniform Time Act, and establish permanent
13 standard time (which would be equivalent to
14 Eastern Standard Time (EST)) year round
15 beginning Sunday, November 1st, 2026 at 2:00
16 a.m.

17 And so, this is the language that was
18 established as that which would appear in
19 materials related to this measure. And we are
20 providing this petition to you today, Mr.
21 Bernier, for your adoption.

22 And it includes, as indicated, the

1 formulations as they were published in the D.C.
2 Register.

3 MR. BERNIER: Great. Thank you.

4 MS. STROUD: And, Mr. Chair, if you
5 could ask the proposer if they formally adopt
6 the petition as their own.

7 CHAIR THOMPSON: Yeah, Mr. Bernier, do
8 you formally adopt this as your own petition?

9 MR. BERNIER: I formally adopt it as my
10 own petition.

11 MS. STROUD: Okay. And then I would
12 ask for the Board to give a motion that the
13 Board approves the petition form that was
14 adopted by the proposer of the Time Stability
15 Act of 2025. And so, Mr. Chair, if you could do
16 the motion.

17 CHAIR THOMPSON: Thank you. I so move
18 that we adopt the petition as formulated and
19 published in the Register, and as adopted by the
20 proposer.

21 MS. STROUD: Okay. And then we'll do a
22 roll call vote. Mr. Chair?

1 CHAIR THOMPSON: The Chair votes aye.

2 MS. STROUD: Ms. Greenfield?

3 MEMBER GREENFIELD: I vote aye.

4 MS. STROUD: And with that the ayes
5 have it. And the Board approves the petition
6 form as indicated. And now we will have the
7 Registrar read the signature requirement report
8 for the initiative into the record.

9 MS. CORRENTE: Thank you. So, I'm
10 reading a memorandum that's addressed to General
11 Counsel from myself. The subject is titled
12 Initiative 84, Time Stability Act of 2025. It
13 is dated with today's date, October 1st.

14 So it begins, with the preparation of
15 the petition form it is important to note that
16 in order for the measure to be placed on the
17 ballot the petition submitted in support of I84
18 must contain the valid signatures of at least
19 five percent of registered District of Columbia
20 voters, provided that this total includes five
21 percent of the registered voters in at least
22 five of the eight wards.

1 Pursuant to D.C. Official Code 1-
2 204.102(a) the number of registered voters used
3 to compute these requirements is, quote, the
4 latest official count of registered voters by
5 the Board of Elections, which was issued 30 or
6 more days prior to the submission of signatures.

7 While the signature requirement cannot
8 be determined yet, the current calculations
9 using the published August 31st, 2025 monthly
10 voter registration statistics report include
11 476,685 total voters, which would be an overall
12 requirement of 2,834 voters.

13 It also breaks down the wards. But I
14 won't go into that. This will be available to
15 the proposer. So, the proponent is advised to
16 check with the Board on a monthly basis as new
17 statistics are issued, to get up to date
18 estimates of the signature requirement.

19 In addition, with the proposer formally
20 adopting the original petition form as their own
21 at today's Board meeting, the 180 day period for
22 circulating the petition, pursuant to D.C.

1 Official Code 1-1001.16(j)(I) expires on Monday,
2 March 30th, 2026 at 5:00 p.m.

3 The proposer will be sent the following
4 documents to their provided email after the
5 Board meeting concludes, a PDF of the petition,
6 this memorandum, and a secure link to various
7 ballot access handouts and forms.

8 It is the duty of the proposer to
9 ensure that when the petition is printed the
10 formatting matches the original document, which
11 for an initiative petition is on 8.5 by 11 inch
12 paper.

13 The proposer is also responsible for
14 adhering and ensuring that all parties connected
15 to their efforts adhere to the pertinent rules,
16 regulations, and laws. Thank you.

17 CHAIR THOMPSON: Chair has a quick
18 question. Just to clarify, I thought I heard
19 you say 2,834. But it could be my audio
20 connection. Is the correct number 23,834
21 signatures that are needed?

22 MS. CORRENTE: Yes, yep, 23,834. My

1 mistake if I misread that.

2 MS. STROUD: Okay. Mr. Bernier, do you
3 have any questions? No, he's not. He --

4 MR. BERNIER: Yep, sorry. You guys had
5 muted my mic there. So, I couldn't respond.
6 No, I don't have any questions. Thank you very
7 much. And thanks for the clarification over the
8 number of votes. I thought initially that was
9 pretty low.

10 MS. STROUD: No such luck, Mr. Bernier.
11 No such luck.

12 MR. BERNIER: That's all right.

13 MS. STROUD: We've issued the petition.
14 And you are aware of the requirements for
15 circulation. And yeah. So, we can move
16 forward. And you will be provided with the
17 petition in accordance with what the Registrar
18 of Voters has indicated.

19 And you are aware of the deadline by
20 which you must submit the petition with the
21 correct number of ballot signatures. Thank you.

22 The next item on my agenda is

1 enforcement hearings. The first is in the
2 matter of Jocelyn Fant. And I will have staff
3 attorney, Jorge Quintana, come and present this
4 matter.

5 And I see that we have the attorney for
6 the subject present, as well, Mr. Sokolove.
7 Welcome, Mr. Sokolove. And if you could just
8 state your, both of you state your name and
9 residence address or work addresses for the
10 record.

11 MR. SOKOLOVE: Yes, this is William
12 Sokolove on behalf of Jocelyn Fant, from
13 Covington Burling. I, also, have my colleague
14 here from Covington Burling, Heather Finstuen.
15 Our address at Covington is 850 10th Street
16 Northwest, Washington, D.C.

17 MS. STROUD: Okay. And is it my
18 understanding, is it correct that Ms. Fant is
19 not present today?

20 MR. SOKOLOVE: Ms. Fant is present
21 today in the meeting.

22 MS. STROUD: Okay. So, we will make

1 her a panelist, as well. And what is her name?
2 What is Ms. Fant, what are you listed under in
3 the participant's list?

4 I'm trying -- If you could raise your
5 hand on the Zoom that would be great. Okay. I
6 see it. There we go. Okay, Mr. Quintana.

7 MR. QUINTANA: Thank you, Members of
8 the Board. This matter came to our attention as
9 a result of our participation in the voter
10 participation project with the Election
11 Registration Information Center, or ERIC.

12 Based on that report we became aware,
13 the Office of General Counsel became aware that
14 ballots were cast in the same voter's name in
15 both D.C. and in Colorado in the 2024 general
16 elections.

17 Records indicated that that same
18 individual had voted twice. And then when we,
19 the staff, reviewed the mail ballot return
20 envelope it was immediately apparent that the
21 person who had signed the ballot return envelope
22 was not the person to whom the ballot was

1 issued.

2 After further investigation we were
3 able to determine that the signature on the
4 ballot return envelope matched the signature for
5 a Jocelyn Fant, who resided at that same
6 address.

7 We scheduled a pre-hearing conference
8 with Ms. Fant who, through Counsel, promptly
9 responded. And they fully cooperated with us in
10 the pre-hearing conference, as well as, in the
11 follow-up investigation.

12 Based on the facts presented at the
13 pre-hearing, or established at the pre-hearing
14 conference Ms. Fant entered into a negotiated
15 stipulation with the Office of General Counsel.
16 And I'll briefly go over those facts.

17 In October of 2024, the Board issued a
18 ballot to Ms. Thomas Pate. At that time, Fant
19 was residing alone at that same address, and
20 anticipated receiving an election ballot issued
21 in her name.

22 Unaware that the ballot was delivered -

1 - unaware that the ballot delivered was
2 addressed to another voter, Ms. Fant
3 inadvertently completed and cast that ballot.

4 While inadvertent, she did sign the
5 ballot return envelope indicating she was
6 swearing or affirming that she was the voter to
7 whom the ballot was issued, which technically
8 violates the law against fraudulent voting.

9 The stipulation as well as the evidence
10 has been submitted to the Board. And as we
11 established Ms. Fant and her attorneys are
12 present. And they may wish to address the
13 Board.

14 But with that I would ask that the
15 Board accept the stipulation and evidence into
16 the record.

17 CHAIR THOMPSON: Mr. Sokolove, would
18 you like to comment?

19 MR. SOKOLOVE: Yes. Thank you, Mr.
20 Quintana for that recollection of events
21 preceding today, with which we entirely agree.

22 And thanks to the Board for your

1 attention to this matter, and collaboration in
2 resolving this matter. Nothing to dispute.
3 Only agree with what Mr. Quintana said.

4 I would just say that we appreciate
5 your willingness to hear from us on this. And
6 to summarize as Mr. Quintana has already done,
7 Ms. Fant's actions in this matter were entirely
8 inadvertent.

9 As Mr. Quintana said, it was her
10 intention that she submit her own ballot at her
11 own home address, not recognizing that she had
12 actually received a ballot in the name of
13 another.

14 So, moving forward Ms. Fant will
15 certainly confirm that on the name of the ballot
16 envelope. And as I mentioned we appreciate your
17 attention to this.

18 CHAIR THOMPSON: Yep. Thank you very
19 much for that. Thank you for the stipulation.
20 I read through it. I think the key word is
21 indeed inadvertent, non-intentional.

22 In an era of mail ballots this can

1 happen. It's, you know, surprising it doesn't
2 happen more. But, I kind of analogize this to
3 like a traffic ticket in the era of mail
4 ballots, these inadvertent signing of a ballot
5 that's not addressed to the recipient.

6 So, Ms. Fant, thank you so much for
7 your cooperation in this. And with that I would
8 move, I think it's time for a motion, that we
9 adopt the stipulation.

10 MEMBER GREENFIELD: And I second.

11 MS. STROUD: And in light of that I
12 would, also, recommend to the Board that an
13 enforcement action against Ms. Fant, that the
14 Board impose a fine of \$100 for her inadvertent
15 voting of the ballot.

16 CHAIR THOMPSON: Yeah. Thank you for
17 that. Which is encompassed in the stipulation.
18 And we accept, I accept your recommendation and
19 include it in my motion.

20 MS. STROUD: Okay.

21 MEMBER GREENFIELD: I second, again.

22 MS. STROUD: Roll call vote with

1 respect to that, just for crossing Ts and
2 dotting Is. Mr. Chair?

3 CHAIR THOMPSON: Aye.

4 MS. STROUD: Ms. Greenfield?

5 MEMBER GREENFIELD: Aye.

6 MS. STROUD: And with that the Board
7 accepts the stipulation agreement, including the
8 recommendation to impose a \$100 civil fine
9 against Ms. Fant for her inadvertent voting of
10 the ballot. Okay.

11 MR. SOKOLOVE: Thank you, Ms. Stroud.
12 And just one quick follow-up question, which is
13 in terms of the payment of the fine. Should we
14 expect to hear from Mr. Quintana on how Ms. Fant
15 should comply with that obligation?

16 MS. STROUD: Yes. And a written order
17 in this matter will issue, which will outline
18 the fine and how it should be paid.

19 MR. SOKOLOVE: Understood. Thank you.
20 And thanks to all of you for attending to this
21 today. With that should we plan to attend the
22 rest of the hearing? Or may we be excused?

1 MS. STROUD: You may be excused.

2 MR. SOKOLOVE: Thank you. Have a nice
3 rest of your day.

4 CHAIR THOMPSON: We've got hours to go.

5 MS. STROUD: Thank you. The next item
6 on my agenda is the enforcement matter
7 involving, in the matter of Antonio Watkins.
8 Mr. Watkins has indicated that he could not be
9 present today, and did want to appear. And so,
10 he has asked the matter be continued to the next
11 Board meeting.

12 And if it is the Board's pleasure, then
13 we can remove this item from the agenda. We
14 have spoken to him. And he did indicate that he
15 would be present in November.

16 CHAIR THOMPSON: Yeah. That works.

17 MS. STROUD: Okay. So, with that I'll
18 move to the next item on my agenda, which is the
19 litigation status. And the first item on my
20 agenda is Stacia Hall versus the Board, which is
21 in the U.S. Court of Appeals.

22 This is an appeal from the U.S.

1 District Court's denial of a challenge to
2 legislation allowing non-citizens to vote in
3 local elections on the basis of standing.

4 On August 7th, the parties filed a
5 joint status report. And based on that report
6 the Court ordered that the Defendant's renewed
7 motion to dismiss be filed by September 26th,
8 Plaintiff's opposition be filed by October 31st,
9 and the Defendant's reply be filed by November
10 21st, 2025.

11 The next item is Charles Wilson versus
12 Muriel Bowser, et al., in the D.C. Superior
13 Court. This is a remand from the D.C. Court of
14 Appeals of a challenge to both the Board's
15 finding that initiative number 33 -- 83 met
16 proper subject requirements in its formulation
17 of the measure.

18 The Court of Appeals disagreed with the
19 Superior Court decision that the case was
20 untimely filed, because it was submitted before
21 the ten day statutory period for judicial
22 review.

1 On April 8th, the Board filed a motion
2 to dismiss. On September 16th, 2025 the Board
3 filed an answer to the complaint. Interveners
4 subsequently, also, filed an answer.

5 On September 23rd, the Board filed a
6 motion for judgement on the pleadings, and a
7 motion to take judicial notice of the Agency
8 record.

9 At a status hearing on September 26th,
10 the Court set October 13th, 2025 as the deadline
11 for Plaintiffs to file a motion for discovery,
12 and granted the Defendant until October 29th to
13 respond. An additional status hearing was set
14 for March 13, 2026.

15 The next item is Long versus the Board
16 in D.C. Superior Court. This case, which was
17 brought back from the U.S. District Court to the
18 D.C. Superior Court is a case that Plaintiff
19 Long resubmitted in the D.C. Superior Court
20 after it was previously dismissed without
21 prejudice.

22 Mr. Long seeks \$10,000 in damages for

1 an overdraft fee caused by a stop payment on a
2 \$500 check issued for his service as an election
3 worker. To date the Superior Court has not
4 docketed any activity.

5 The next matter is Sobin versus the
6 D.C. Board of Elections in U.S. District Court.
7 This matter concerns a complaint in which the
8 Plaintiff alleges that the Board's petition
9 circulation process requiring candidates to
10 gather signatures violates the Americans with
11 Disabilities Act. And that an Advisory
12 Neighborhood Commission elections held in his
13 single member district was illegal.

14 On June 11th, the OAG filed a motion to
15 dismiss. On June 16th, the Court directed the
16 Plaintiff to respond by June 30th. On June
17 23rd, the Plaintiff filed an opposition to the
18 motion to dismiss. And on June 30th, Defendants
19 replied to the opposition. And there has been
20 no further activity in this matter.

21 The final matter is Sherice Muhammad
22 versus the D.C. Board of Elections. That's in

1 the D.C. Court of Appeals. This matter involves
2 the petition filed by petitioner Muhammad for
3 review of a Board Enforcement Order imposing a
4 \$150 civil fine against her because she failed
5 to personally witness signatures on her
6 petition.

7 On September 17th, the Court dismissed
8 the matter for Petitioner's failure to file an
9 appendix, which was after other deficiencies in
10 the Defendant's, or the Petitioner's prosecution
11 of this matter.

12 And so at this, as of September 17th,
13 this matter is no longer active, having been
14 dismissed for failure to file an appendix.

15 And that concludes my litigation status
16 report, as well as, my report in its entirety.
17 Thank you.

18 CHAIR THOMPSON: All right. Thanks
19 very much. Director Collier-Montgomery, it's
20 great to see you, albeit by Zoom.

21 MS. COLLIER-MONTGOMERY: It's good to
22 be back. Good morning. The first thing I would

1 like to report in the Office of the Director --

2 Well, before I start, I would also say
3 that the full report of the activity of the
4 Agency for the month of September 2025 will be
5 posted at our website, www.ocf.dc.gov before the
6 close of business today.

7 And at this point, I will highlight a
8 few matters of interest for the public from the
9 report.

10 The first in the Office of the
11 Director, the Office of Campaign Finance
12 recently became aware of proposed legislation
13 which was introduced on July the 14th, 2025 by
14 Council Member Charles Allen, and referred to
15 the Secretary of the Council.

16 The bill is assigned Bill Number 26-03-
17 29, and is under review by the Council. The
18 proposal is titled The Campaign Finance
19 Modernization Amendment Act of 2025, and will
20 through the amendment of several provisions of
21 the Act purportedly improve transparency in
22 elections, adopt a customer oriented approach to

1 making information on elections available, and
2 clarify or strengthen several provisions of the
3 Fair Elections Act.

4 The Agency is reviewing the legislation
5 and expects to present comments when appropriate
6 concerning its impact upon the operations of the
7 Agency.

8 Community outreach. The Office of
9 Campaign Finance participated in four community
10 outreach events during the month of September,
11 and shared information with the public about the
12 programs of the Agency.

13 In the Fair Elections Program Division
14 for the month of September 2025, I would report
15 first on authorized base mounts and matching
16 payments.

17 To summarize the 2024 election cycle,
18 there were 19 certified participating candidates
19 in the Fair Elections Program. And the office
20 authorized the disbursement of the total sum of
21 \$2,834,646.15 from the Fair Elections fund in
22 base amounts. and matching payments. The 2024

1 election cycle closed on November the 5th 2024.

2 The 2025 special elections cycle, there
3 were three certified participating candidates in
4 the Fair Elections Program. And the office
5 authorized the disbursement of the total sum of
6 \$447,472.90 from the Fair Elections fund in base
7 amount and matching payments.

8 The 2025 special elections cycle closed
9 on July the 15th, which was the date of the
10 special election.

11 With the 2026 election cycle, as of
12 this date there's one participating candidate
13 who has been certified in the Fair Elections
14 Program, and eligible to receive public funds
15 for their campaign operations.

16 During the month of September, the OCF
17 authorized one disbursement from the fund to an
18 FEP participating candidate from the 2025
19 special election cycle. Excuse me.

20 Matching payments were issued for
21 qualified small dollar contributions, which were
22 received by the Committee on or before the July

1 15th 2025 on special elections.

2 The Committee was Ms. Sheila Bunn with
3 a special campaign committee. The matching
4 payments were in the total amount of \$2,175, and
5 were authorized on September the 3rd, 2025.

6 There were no new certifications of
7 candidates or disbursements authorized for the
8 candidates participating in the 2026 election
9 cycle during the month of September.

10 The FEP Division also conducted 25 desk
11 reviews of reports of receipts and expenditures,
12 which had been filed with the Agency and issued
13 ten requests for additional information as a
14 result of those filings.

15 With the ongoing post-election full
16 field audits in the Division for the 2020
17 election cycle, there are currently six ongoing
18 post-election audits for the 2020 election
19 cycle, which are at various stages.

20 The Division has issued a total of 28
21 final audit reports of the 34 full sealed audits
22 which were initiated for the 2020 election

1 cycle.

2 For the 2022 election cycle, the office
3 issued 42 post-election audit letters for the
4 June 2022 primary election and the November 2022
5 general elections to candidates who were
6 certified to participate in the 2022 election
7 cycle.

8 To date the FEC has issued 28 final
9 audit reports for the '22 election cycle,
10 including the following audit reports we were
11 issued during the month of September.

12 The first is Anita Bonds for 2022
13 principal campaign committee, post-election
14 final audit report. And that was issued on
15 September the 3rd. Veda for Ward 7 principal
16 campaign committee post-election final audit
17 report issued on September the 3rd.

18 Frazier O'Leary for Ward 4 principal
19 campaign committee post-election final audit
20 report issued on September the 9th. And Nate
21 Fleming for Ward 7 principal campaign committee
22 post-election audit report issued on September

1 the 24th, 2025.

2 With the ongoing 2024 post-election
3 field audits, the Agency initiated on February
4 the 3rd by correspondence which was directed to
5 both the candidates and treasurers of the 19
6 candidates who were certified to participate in
7 the 2024 election cycle post-election audit for
8 the, again the June 2024 primary election and
9 the November on 2024 general election.

10 To date the Fair Elections Program
11 Division has issued 19 preliminary audit finding
12 reports and ten final audit reports. All final
13 audits are available for review by the public at
14 the OCF website. And again, the website is
15 www.ocf.dc.gov.

16 In our Public Information and Records
17 Management Division, during the month of
18 September there were no filing of reports of
19 receipts and expenditures which were due.

20 Before the 2026 election cycle we did
21 have new registrations. In the traditional
22 program we had two new candidate registrations

1 during the month of September 2025.

2 For the office of Mayor, Rhonda
3 Hamilton, who registered on September the 2nd
4 2025. For the office of Ward 1 Council Member
5 Travis Porter, who registered on September the
6 29th 2025.

7 In the Fair Elections Program there
8 were four new candidate registrations. The
9 first was for the office of Ward 3 Council
10 Member Matthew Frumin on September the 29th
11 2025.

12 For the office of Attorney General,
13 John Paul Szmykowitz on September the 10th 2025.
14 For the office of Council Member at Large, Nate
15 Fleming on September the 5th, and Adeoye Ibrahim
16 Yakubu-Owolewa. And I'm probably mispronouncing
17 his name, but he registered on September the 8th
18 2025.

19 We, also, had three new committee
20 registrations during the month of September.
21 The first was an initiative committee, well the
22 first two are initiative committees. Pro-Animal

1 D.C., Cady Witt is the treasurer. Registered on
2 September the 23rd 2025.

3 D.C. Living Wage for All, Becca Mandu,
4 treasurer, registered on September the 24th
5 2025. And we had a referendum committee to
6 register as well, D.C. Voters to Stop Pay Cuts,
7 Nikki M.G. Cole, treasurer. And the committee
8 registered on September the 24th '25.

9 And we, also, had candidates who
10 completed our entrance conference. And their
11 names will, are posted in our report, as well.

12 In our Reports Analysis and Audit
13 Division, and that is our traditional program,
14 the audit branch conducted 17 desk reviews and
15 issued nine requests for additional information
16 as a result of the review of reports of receipts
17 and expenditures. They also conducted three
18 candidate's consultations.

19 There were no new audits which were
20 issued in the traditional program during the
21 month of September. But there are six ongoing
22 audits.

1 In the traditional program the post
2 2025 election audits are Trayon White, 2025.
3 That is in progress. In the FEP program the
4 post 2024 election audit of the committee to
5 elect Eboni-Rose Thompson.

6 In the traditional program post-
7 election cycle 2024 audits there are four. Re-
8 elect Trayon White 2024, Jacques 4 D.C. 2024, T.
9 Michelle Colson, State Board of Education Ward
10 4, Eboni-Rose for State Board of Education, Ward
11 7.

12 And the status of those audits is,
13 also, reported in the report, which will be
14 posted today, of the Agency.

15 I would now ask the General Counsel to
16 present the report of the Office of the General
17 Counsel for the office.

18 MR. SANFORD: Thank you, Director.
19 Good morning.

20 MS. COLLIER-MONTGOMERY: Bill SanFord.

21 MR. SANFORD: Thank you.

22 MS. COLLIER-MONTGOMERY: Thank you,

1 Bill.

2 MR. SANFORD: Good morning, Mr.
3 Chairman and distinguished Board Member
4 Greenfield.

5 During the month of September 2025 the
6 Office of the General Counsel received three
7 referrals, completed seven informal hearings,
8 and issued seven orders in which no fines were
9 imposed.

10 In the month of September 2025 the
11 Office of the General Counsel maintained one
12 open investigation. This matter was docketed on
13 August 5th, 2025.

14 The Complainant was Sean Metcalf,
15 Managing Director of Universal Media Limited.
16 Respondent, Tracy Lucas, and the Tracy Lucas for
17 Mayor of D.C. Principal Campaign Committee. The
18 allegation is false campaign finance filing.
19 This matter remains pending.

20 During the month of September 2025
21 there were no requests for interpretive
22 opinions, and no show cause proceedings were

1 conducted.

2 The contents of the Office of General
3 Counsel's report will be published at the Office
4 of Campaign Finance website, under the reports
5 and data section by close of business today.
6 Today's date is the 1st of October 2025. And
7 that concludes my report.

8 CHAIR THOMPSON: Okay. Thanks very
9 much to the Office of Campaign Finance. And
10 with that it's time for public comment. I
11 always love to hear from members of the D.C.
12 public.

13 So, if we have anybody out there that
14 would like to talk with us, just raise your Zoom
15 hand, and I'll call on you in the order that I
16 see them. And I see that Nicholas Schiller has
17 raised his hand. Hello, Mr. Schiller.

18 MR. SCHILLER: Can you hear me okay?

19 CHAIR THOMPSON: We sure can.

20 MR. SCHILLER: Oh great. I've got two
21 brief questions. One of them I did see, Terri
22 did respond to my email concerning old ballot

1 initiatives that were submitted to the Board of
2 Elections. I was just curious how to find some
3 of them.

4 To respond to Terri's email asking
5 which numbers, today the D.C. Council is having
6 a hearing on bottle bills concerning, you know,
7 recycling of bottle.

8 And there was Initiative Number 28.
9 And I was trying to find the legislative text of
10 Number 28, and also Number 24, which were
11 introduced in the 1980s. So, it's kind of hard
12 to find those on the internet when they're that
13 old. So, those are the two that I was looking
14 up.

15 My other thing that I'd like to bring
16 up is, is there a timeline for public awareness
17 concerning the rank choice voting with respect
18 to public mailers?

19 I know in New York where I now live the
20 Campaign Finance Board sends postcards and
21 messages to voters saying, hey we've got rank
22 choice voting coming up. This is how you do it.

1 And my concern is that the Board of
2 Elections should be doing this kind of
3 proactively in D.C., because this primary's
4 coming up.

5 It's going to get, come -- it's going
6 to rise very fast. And I want to ensure that
7 D.C. voters know of the change well in advance
8 of their voter guide arising.

9 I know one of the holdups with respect
10 to the funding of Initiative 83 was that the CFO
11 said that there was going to be a mailer needed.
12 And I'm just curious if that mailer's going to
13 be happening in Calendar Year '25 or only in
14 Calendar Year 2026.

15 Thank you so much. And I appreciate
16 all your hard work for the people of the
17 District of Columbia. Thank you.

18 MS. EVANS: Yes. Thank you, Mr.
19 Schiller. And we share your concerns about
20 making sure D.C. residents are properly informed
21 before getting the voter guide. And we will
22 have multiple mailers.

1 And we, also, will embark upon a very
2 robust voter education and outreach campaign
3 where we will go into the communities and allow
4 individuals to sample ranking their ballot. And
5 so that they are familiar with what it would
6 look like and getting individuals comfortable.

7 So, we plan to go to ANC meetings,
8 community meetings, and engaging in the normal
9 education and outreach that we do. We're still
10 working on the final calendar as far as when
11 those mailers will go out.

12 I'm not quite certain we will have a
13 mailer going out in 2025. We officially
14 launched the 2026 election cycle in January.
15 And we want to make sure that we are providing
16 information when it will be most easily consumed
17 by the individuals receiving it.

18 And a lot of times if you send
19 something out too fast, and they're not thinking
20 elections, it gets tossed. So, we are exploring
21 the timeline for those mailers. Thank you.

22 CHAIR THOMPSON: Yeah, thank you. That

1 actually, I had a related question. I think I
2 understand this. With respect to Initiative 83
3 the Council has funded the first part of it to
4 implement rank choice voting, but I believe has
5 not funded the second part that would enable
6 independents to vote in either primary of their
7 choice. Is that right?

8 MS. EVANS: That is correct. So,
9 beginning with the 2026 primary we will have
10 rank choice voting. But we will not have open
11 primaries, because that was not funded.

12 CHAIR THOMPSON: Okay. Anybody else
13 from the public who would like to raise a hand?
14 Mr. Schiller? Nope. Oh you took your hand down
15 or? It's coming back up, I can't tell. There
16 you go.

17 MR. SCHILLER: Yeah, it went back up.
18 I'm sorry. The Initiative 84 was, the petitions
19 were issued today for it. I was curious, what
20 is the deadline? Because the summary statement
21 for Initiative 84 says that, excuse me, that it
22 would go into effect November 1st, 2026.

1 That means they would have to be passed
2 by the voters in the primary in order for it to
3 be applicable in November of 2026. It cannot be
4 put on to the general election ballot.

5 Therefore, my question is, what would
6 be the deadline for the petitions to be
7 submitted by the proposer in order to be placed
8 on the primary election ballot?

9 MS. EVANS: I believe it is February
10 13th. I think that is the -- let me check.
11 Yeah, it's February 13th. The deadline for, to
12 submit a petition for an initiative measure to
13 appear on the primary election ballot.

14 MR. SCHILLER: Thank you.

15 CHAIR THOMPSON: Okay. Well, not
16 seeing any other hands, it's a beautiful fall
17 day. I hope everybody has the time to go
18 outside, take a walk, at least for a little bit.
19 Enjoy the sunshine. And unless there's anything
20 else that anybody has I would move that we
21 adjourn.

22 MEMBER GREENFIELD: I second.

1 CHAIR THOMPSON: All in favor? Aye.

2 MEMBER GREENFIELD: Aye.

3 CHAIR THOMPSON: Thanks, everybody.

4 (Whereupon, the above-entitled matter
5 went off the record at 11:20 a.m.)
