## **MEMORANDUM OPINION AND ORDER**

This matter came to be heard by the Board on Wednesday, March 7, 2001 at 10:30 a.m. pursuant to the submission of a Petition by the Office of Campaign Finance (hereinafter "OCF") for Enforcement of its August 9, 2000 Order ("Order") imposing a fine of \$500 against Angela Mitchell, Special Assistant in the Office of the City Administrator. The fine was imposed as a result of the Respondent's failure to timely file a Financial Disclosure Statement ("FDS") by the due date as required by D.C. Code § 1-1462(a).

D.C. Code § 1-1462(a) provides that individuals "serving in positions designated as within the Excepted Service and paid at a rate of GS-13 or above ... shall file annually with the Board" an FDS. This FDS must be filed by May 15<sup>th</sup> of each year. The Respondent was employed as a Special Assistant in the Office of the City Administrator during calendar year 1999 in an excepted service position where she was paid at a rate of GS-13 or above.

D.C. Code § 1-1462(d)(1) provides that the FDS "shall be filed not later than ... May 15th[.]"

Accordingly, the Respondent was required to file such Statement by May 15, 2000. The Respondent failed to do so. However, the Respondent did file the required statement on August 16, 2000.

By Notice of Hearings, Statements of Violations and Orders of Appearance dated June 21, 1999 and July 18, 1999, the Office of Campaign Finance ordered the Respondent to appear at hearings scheduled on June 28, 2000 and July 26, 2000, and show cause why she should not be found in violation of the D.C. Campaign Finance Reform and Conflict of Interest Act of 1974, as amended by D.C. Code § 1-1401 et seq. ("the Act") and fined accordingly. The Respondent failed to appear at either of these hearings. However, as noted above, the Respondent did file the FDS on August 16, 2000.

The penalty established at 3 DCMR §§ 3711.2(y) for failure to timely file the FDS as required by D.C. Code § 1-1462(a) is a fine of \$30.00 per day for each business day subsequent to the due date for each violation. On August 9, 2000, the Director of OCF issued the Order imposing a fine of \$500.00 against the Respondent for failure to file the FDS by the due date in violation of D.C. Code § 1-1462(a). This Order became effective on August 24, 2000, in the absence of a request for review of the penalty by the Respondent Committee to the Board, pursuant to 3 DCMR § 3711.5.<sup>2</sup> Pavment of the fine was due no later than September 3, 2000, pursuant to 3 DCMR § 3711.7.<sup>3</sup> As of January 26, 2001, the Respondent had failed to pay the fine imposed by the Order of the Director issued August 9, 2000.

On February 1, 2001. OCF transmitted a Petition for Enforcement of its Order to the Office of the General Counsel for the Board. The General Counsel held a pre-hearing conference in the matter on Monday, February 26, 2001. Despite being served with notice of this conference by regular, first-class mail on Thursday, February 15, 2001, the Respondent failed to appear. A hearing in this matter was held before the Board on Wednesday, March 7, 2001. Despite being served with notice of this conference by regular, first-class mail on Thursday, February 15, 2001, the Respondent again failed to appear.

D.C. Code § 1-1435 provides that "[i]f the person against whom a civil penalty is assessed fails to pay the penalty, the Board shall file a petition for the enforcement of its order assessing the penalty in the Superior Court of the District of Columbia." OCF has shown that the fine of \$500.00 imposed against the Respondent was wholly justified. Despite attempts on the part of the Office of the General Counsel to meet with the Respondent and make arrangements to settle the matter, the Respondent has not demonstrated a willingness to do so.

Accordingly, it is this 9th day of March 2001,

**ORDERED** that the Order of the Director of be enforced and that a Petition for the Enforcement of Order be filed in Superior Court forthwith.
