3 CHAIR THOMPSON: Good morning, everybody.

4 My name is Gary Thompson, the Chair of the DC Board
5 of Elections.

6 And with us here today is Karyn Greenfield,
7 my fellow board member. We have a quorum.

8 At this time, I move that we adopt the
9 agenda that we've both had a chance to review.

10 MEMBER GREENFIELD: I second.

11 CHAIR THOMPSON: All in favor?

12 Aye.

13 CHAIR THOMPSON: Aye.

14 CHAIR THOMPSON: And also, at this time,
15 I move we adopt the minutes from our last regular
16 board meeting of January 14th.

17 MEMBER GREENFIELD: I second.

18 CHAIR THOMPSON: All in favor?

19 MEMBER GREENFIELD: Aye.

20 CHAIR THOMPSON: Aye.

21 CHAIR THOMPSON: And with that kickoff,
22 we'll turn to -- I think first up is the delegation

1 of authority?

2 MS. STROUD: Yes.

3 MEMBER GREENFIELD: Yes.

4 CHAIR THOMPSON: You want to set that up,
5 General Counsel Stroud?

6 MS. STROUD: So today, the Board is
7 considering delegation of authority that would
8 establish the allocation of authority between the
9 Board and the Agency officers.

10 And so, this is an acknowledgment of the
11 fact that the Board is a three-member governing body
12 that exercises policy setting, certification,
13 adjudicatory and rulemaking authority, but as, you
14 know, everyone knows, or should know, the Board
15 itself does not perform operational or ministerial
16 election functions.

17 The Board is charged with administering
18 elections, voter registration, and other activities
19 as set forth in the election statute, but that occurs
20 through the Board acting as -- the Board, as an
21 agency, acting through the Office of the Executive
22 Director, the Office of the General Counsel, and

1 the staff under the supervision in those two
2 offices.

3 And so, the delegation of authority, and
4 this is not the first one that the Board has
5 authorized pursuant to the statute, which
6 specifically is DC Official Code Section
7 1-1001.05(a)(14), which allows the Board to
8 delegate authority to the Office of the Executive
9 Director and the General Counsel to perform
10 activities necessary to conduct its major programs
11 of election administration and voter registration.

12 Now, there are certain things that the
13 Board cannot delegate, pursuant to the statute, such
14 as certification of election results, adoption,
15 amendment or appeal of regulations, the issuance
16 of final orders disposing of matters before the
17 Board, the adoption of ballot measure formulations,
18 and the appointment and removal of the executive
19 director, but everything else is accomplished
20 through the Agency's leadership and the staff under
21 the direction of that leadership. And so, this just
22 clarifies what the allocation of authority is.

1 For example, just to give some examples
2 of activities that the three-member board does not
3 do, the Board does not -- neither the Chair, nor
4 Member Greenfield, publishes items of the DC
5 Register.

6 They do not process initiative measures.
7 Meaning, they do not draft the formulations.

8 They do not -- they certify the election
9 results, but all the activities that occur before
10 that, for the most part, are accomplished through
11 staff. And so, this just makes that clear. And
12 so, this will be published in the DC Register and
13 become effective.

14 We are currently existing -- the most
15 recent one that was done by the Board was done in
16 2011, July 6 of 2011, when Togo West was the Chair
17 of the Board.

18 And so, this is just the next delegation
19 and it will take place -- or be published in the
20 DC Register upon the Board's adoption of it.

21 CHAIR THOMPSON: All right. I've had a
22 chance to review this and I want to thank General

1 Counsel and others for putting this together. I
2 mean, to me, it simply confirms what our practices
3 already are.

4 Maybe this is a little bit of Inside
5 Baseball, but obviously Karyn and I and the third
6 member, when we have one, I mean, we are the Board
7 of the Board of Elections. So, we don't do what
8 the staff does. There's no way we could possibly
9 do all those things.

10 In fact, the DC Election Code very
11 expressly tells our three-member board to delegate
12 to the staff all the things that are listed here.

13 So, as the General Counsel explained, this
14 has been in place for some time and this is an update.

15 And the six things that are listed here
16 as nondelegable are clearly the things that we, the
17 three-member board, must do, including adjudicate
18 contests and certify election results, appoint the
19 Executive Director and General Counsel.

20 And everything else is delegated very
21 carefully to either the Executive Director, or the
22 General Counsel, or the staff, with a couple of other

1 clauses about emergency authority and such.

2 So, we've had a chance to review this and
3 talk about it and it's been edited a little bit.

4 So, I think it's in really good shape and, at this
5 time, I'd move that we adopt it.

6 MEMBER GREENFIELD: And I second that. I
7 read through that and I agree it's probably time
8 for an update. So, I'm good with it. So, I second.

9 MS. STROUD: And so, we'll take a roll call
10 vote with respect to the motion.

11 Mr. Chair?

12 CHAIR THOMPSON: Aye.

13 MS. STROUD: Member Greenfield?

14 MEMBER GREENFIELD: Aye.

15 MS. STROUD: And with that, the delegation
16 will be published in the DC Register at which point
17 it will become effective.

18 CHAIR THOMPSON: Okay. With that, it's
19 time for the Executive Director's report, and in
20 lieu of Monica Evans we have Alice Miller.

21 MS. MILLER: Thank you. Good morning,
22 everyone. I will give the report of the Executive

1 Director on behalf of her, and I'm going to start
2 with our January engagements.

3 On January 6th, we met with Council Member
4 Anita Bonds and Council Member Zachary Parker to
5 discuss ranked choice voting in the District of
6 Columbia. We discussed with them our outreach
7 plans and the status of the draft regulations.

8 Council Member Bonds proposed a town hall
9 to be held at the Wilson Building. Where the Board
10 would demonstrate ranked choice voting to members
11 of the public.

12 Council Member Parker offered the
13 assistance of his office to support our education
14 and outreach efforts.

15 During the month of January, the Executive
16 Director attended several outreach events to give
17 presentations about ranked choice voting.

18 On January 8th, she gave a presentation
19 at the DC Dems General Body Meeting, and I would
20 like to mention that that meeting is on YouTube and
21 it should -- it is available for anyone who wants
22 to review it and look at that presentation. It

1 gives a really in-depth view of how we will be
2 conducting ranked choice voting.

3 She also participated in events at Greater
4 First Baptist Church, ANC 6/8F, with Wednesday
5 Community Task Advocate the links, the League of
6 Women Voters and the DMV Social Action Coordinators
7 of Delta Sigma Theta Sorority Incorporated.

8 Individuals of the Ranked Choice Voting
9 Resource Center visited the Agency on January 30th
10 and worked with the staff to conduct a tabulation
11 exercise on ranked choice voting.

12 They provided technical assistance and
13 shared best practices with staff members from other
14 jurisdictions.

15 The Resource Center will be supporting our
16 efforts throughout this election cycle as we
17 introduce ranked choice voting to the voters in the
18 District of Columbia.

19 The voter registration rules. In
20 January, the Board of Elections registered 1,194
21 new voters and processed 2,596 registration
22 changes. In total, we prepared 3,790 voter

1 registration cards to be mailed.

2 Additionally, 101 registered voters moved
3 out of DC, 218 voters cancelled their DC
4 registrations and registered with other
5 jurisdictions, and 1763 voters registered in DC
6 after cancelling their registrations in other
7 jurisdictions.

8 With respect to online voter registration,
9 we are continuing to register voters using our
10 website portal.

11 To date, we have processed over 102,820
12 applicants on this portal. These include new voter
13 registration and updates to existing registrations.

14 The noncitizen registration is up to 960.

15 We did not register any new noncitizens in January.

16 We will continue our outreach in DC
17 communities to share information about the ability
18 of noncitizens to register and vote in local
19 elections.

20 But also on that note, we also are
21 continuing to monitor legislation to repeal the
22 Local Resident Voting Rights Amendment Act and

1 waiting for further action from the Senate on that
2 note.

3 The election cycle planning. We're
4 continuing to implement the requirements of the
5 Automatic Voter Registration Act -- AVR Act. The
6 names of eligible individuals who decline voter
7 registration at the Department of Motor Vehicles
8 will be sent over to our offices.

9 These individuals will be placed into a
10 pending voter registration status and we will send
11 them mailers containing additional information.

12 We are now maintaining a list of pending
13 voters and we have begun sending mailers to them.

14 We've processed over 9,900 pre-approved
15 registrations from DMV.

16 As a result, we have added over 3,000
17 individuals to the pending voter registration list,
18 and we have also been able to process 2100 address
19 changes. From this, we've added 31 new voter
20 registrants to the rolls.

21 Ranked choice voting. During the 2026
22 election cycle, I think, as we all know, we are

1 implementing ranked choice voting for the first
2 time.

3 We are in the process of developing
4 informational material and refining our voter
5 education and outreach plan.

6 So, we've begun to provide educational
7 materials and information to all eligible voters
8 explaining how ranked choice voting works,
9 conducting hands-on demonstration using voting
10 equipment, collaborating with community
11 organizations and groups to access their membership
12 to expand education, engagement and outreach
13 opportunities around ranked choice voting.

14 We're currently actively scheduling
15 virtual and in-person outreach events. We're
16 working on a video and additional print materials.

17 All outreach events, including those
18 specific to ranked choice voting, can be found on
19 our website.

20 And we're also developing a slide
21 presentation that can be shown during these outreach
22 events that can explain ranked choice voting.

1 There are many online tools to assist with
2 explaining ranked choice voting. The BOE website
3 has information dedicated to RCV, including mock
4 ballots and frequently asked questions.

5 We're taking mock ballots and the voting
6 equipment into the equipment, also providing
7 informational materials to our community partners
8 and education will not end.

9 Ahead of in-person voting, we will have
10 these educational materials available at the vote
11 centers during the election cycle.

12 List maintenance. In preparation for the
13 2026 election cycle, BOE is conducting our list
14 maintenance process to ensure our voter
15 registration database is accurate and complete.

16 Since the last update, we have reviewed
17 and updated records for individuals who have moved,
18 changed addresses, appear to have duplicate
19 registrations or are deceased.

20 Voters are encouraged to please check
21 their registration status and make any necessary
22 updates before the registration deadlines.

1 Instructions on how to verify or update
2 voter information are available on our website.

3 Inactive voters. We've completed a
4 canvas from the previous elections. As a result
5 of our efforts, we will remove a total of 55,228
6 inactive voters from the voter rolls.

7 Consistent with the federal law,
8 systematic removal of voters who have not responded
9 to any of our canvassing efforts will not take place
10 within 90 days of the election. Certain criteria
11 must be met before the voter is removed.

12 Specifically, we assure voters have not
13 voted in any primary or general election in the
14 District of Columbia since, or on, November 2020
15 and have not responded to any notices mailed after
16 the November 2022 general election, and have not
17 updated their voter registration information with
18 the Board, or any other District of Columbia voter
19 registration agency, since the November 2020
20 general election, and have had notices sent to their
21 registration address as returned to the Board by
22 the postal service as undeliverable.

1 ERIC voter participation. We're still
2 actively working with ERIC member states to review
3 cases and identify any potential instances of voters
4 casting multiple ballots in DC and other
5 jurisdictions, or on behalf of a deceased individual
6 during the 2024 general election.

7 This review is part of our ongoing efforts
8 to safeguard election integrity and ensure that all
9 voters -- all votes cast are valid.

10 Voter education and outreach. During the
11 month of January, the Voter Education and Outreach
12 Division participated in nine outreach events on
13 behalf of the Agency.

14 Events included the naturalization
15 ceremony at the US District Court and the Southwest
16 Waterfront AARP Community Luncheon.

17 The Division is refining the outreach plan
18 and is actively scheduling events on ranked choice
19 voting.

20 If anyone is interested in having members
21 of the staff come out and discuss ranked choice
22 voting, we would ask that you please contact us by

1 email as soon as possible so that you can be added
2 to the event schedule.

3 Election Worker Division is working to
4 process applications that have been received
5 through our website or from the outreach events.

6 As the Division prepares for the 2026
7 election cycle, they are engaged in the following
8 activities: Updating the Vote Center Operations
9 Manual for the 2026 primary election.

10 And I will say that copies of the manual
11 for our election workers is currently being printed
12 and will be available soon.

13 They are revising the curriculums and
14 PowerPoint presentations that will be used during
15 election worker training classes and also producing
16 videos to update the online training modules for
17 election workers.

18 ANC Vacancies. Currently have 14 active
19 ANC vacancies for the 2025-2026 term. These
20 positions are in different stages of being filled.

21 After candidate filing requirements are
22 met, an open voter, registered voters of the

1 affected SMD will be held during the regularly
2 scheduled ANC meetings.

3 And finally, to restore the vote, Division
4 is currently working with the Department of
5 Corrections to develop a regular schedule for
6 outreach with respect to the 2026 election cycle.

7 We have reached out to them and are
8 awaiting their response so that this can be put into
9 the cycle.

10 And that concludes the Director's Report.

11 Thank you.

12 CHAIR THOMPSON: All right. Thank you very
13 much. With that, we'll turn to the General
14 Counsel's report.

15 MS. STROUD: Thank you, Mr. Chair.

16 So, the first time on my agenda is a proper
17 subject determination hearing with respect to the
18 DC Equal Home Ownership Act.

19 And by way of background, and I feel like
20 we've been having an initiative -- something related
21 to an initiative at every meeting, but -- the
22 background.

1 In the District, voters are permitted to
2 participate directly in the legislative process via
3 the right of initiative.

4 That term is defined in the District's Home
5 Rule Act, or the Charter, as the process by which
6 electors may propose laws, except for laws
7 appropriating funds, and to present such proposed
8 laws directly to the registered qualified electors
9 of the District for their approval or disapproval.

10 Pursuant to DC Official Code Section
11 1-1001.16, the Board, upon receipt of a proposed
12 measure, must refuse to accept it if it determines
13 that the measure conflicts with or seeks to amend
14 Title 4 of the DC Home Rule Act, which is the District
15 Charter, conflicts with the US Constitution, has
16 not been properly filed, was not accompanied by a
17 timely filed copy of the verified Statement of
18 Contributions that was submitted to the Office of
19 Campaign Finance, would authorize discrimination
20 in violation of the DC Human Rights Act, would negate
21 or limit a budgetary act of the council or would
22 impermissibly appropriate funds under applicable

1 DC Court of Appeals Rulings.

2 If the measure does not suffer from any
3 of these defects, it may proceed along the
4 initiative measure process.

5 Today, the Board is considering the DC
6 Equal Home Ownership Act, which it must assess to
7 determine whether proper subject requirements are
8 met.

9 And we shall proceed as follows: We will
10 hear from any opponents of the measure who have
11 indicated that they would wish -- that they wish
12 to provide testimony. And we actually have
13 received no comments either for or against the
14 measure.

15 I will share what the Office of the
16 Attorney General and the General Counsel for the
17 DC Council have stated regarding the measure and
18 the advisory opinions that they are statutorily
19 required to provide to the Board.

20 And then we'll hear from the proposer and
21 then make a recommendation to the Board as to whether
22 or not it should be accepted or rejected.

1 And the Board does not have to rule today
2 on the measure. It may vote to enter into closed
3 session to deliberate pursuant to DC Official Code
4 Section 2-575(b)(13), or they may render the
5 decision orally from the dais. In any event, a
6 written order will issue thereafter.

7 So, the measure was properly filed by
8 proposer Addison Sarter on December 22nd, 2025.
9 According to its summary statement and legislative
10 text, the measure would, if enacted, authorize DC
11 government agencies to develop residential housing
12 units on District-owned land.

13 Those units could then be sold without any
14 required down payment and could be offered based
15 on an affordability formula.

16 The authorization would be subject to
17 funding by the Council, and it also includes a policy
18 that favors publicly developed affordable homes on
19 District land over the private development of rental
20 housing.

21 It sets parameters for eligible purchases
22 of the housing proposed and for priority

1 consideration for housing for certain persons.

2 It also empowers agencies to issue rules,
3 as necessary, to implement its authorizations.

4 So, both the Office of the Attorney General
5 and the General Counsel for the Council provided
6 opinions as to the measure on January 15th, and both
7 have been provided to the Board and are included
8 in the record.

9 Those opinions reached different
10 conclusions as to whether the measure should be
11 accepted by the Board.

12 Both opinions focused on the right of
13 initiative as granting power to voters to propose
14 laws, which the advisory opinions explain means that
15 a voter's proposal must be legislative in character.

16 The General Counsel for the Council
17 characterized the measure as a policy statement that
18 does not arise to legislation.

19 In so doing, she relied on language in
20 Section 3 of the measure that provides that no
21 provision has independent legal effect without
22 separate council action.

1 The Office of the Attorney General,
2 however, found that the measure's proposed program
3 of housing development in Section 4 was sufficiently
4 legislative in character to allow it to be accepted
5 by the Board.

6 And, as I indicated, no other comments
7 regarding the measure were received by the Board
8 and no one requested to present testimony today on
9 the question of whether or not the measure met proper
10 subject requirements.

11 And so, I see that someone named Addison
12 is on the line and I suspect that is Mr. Sarter.

13 And could you confirm that and also you
14 are -- if you are Mr. Sarter, you can present at
15 this time concerning the measure.

16 MR. SARTER: Yes, ma'am. This is -- I'm
17 Addison Sarter and -- are you able to hear me?

18 MS. STROUD: Yes.

19 MR. SARTER: Okay.

20 MS. STROUD: Your name for the record?

21 MR. SARTER: Yes. Addison Sarter. I'm
22 the proposer of this initiative and -- and so, you

1 would like my testimony about the decisions made
2 or, I guess, the opinions made by both agencies?

3 MS. STROUD: Sure.

4 MR. SARTER: Okay. I would say, you know,
5 obviously, respectfully with the DC Attorney
6 General being the, you know, legal authority in DC,
7 I believe that, you know, his interpretation of the
8 law, you know, I guess should be, you know, really
9 leaned on since he is the legal authority of the
10 law in DC.

11 And I guess I would just have two questions
12 for the Board. I don't know if you all would like
13 me to ask that now or after you guys, um, well, I'll
14 ask it now.

15 So, the question I have is that under DC
16 law, it says that a legislative act may adopt public
17 policy and set its execution in motion even if
18 implementation is carried out later by the executive
19 and is subject to appropriations.

20 Is that correct?

21 MS. STROUD: So, you're restating what was
22 stated in the Office of the Attorney General

1 opinion?

2 MR. SARTER: Yes, the Office of the Attorney
3 General -- I'm sorry, the General Counsel.

4 So, they said that it is not a legislative
5 act. And so, the question that I ask -- or the two
6 questions I ask is, that, under DC law, a legislative
7 act may adopt public policy and set its execution
8 in motion even if implementation is carried out
9 later by the executive and is subject to
10 appropriations.

11 And I just want to know if that was correct
12 under DC law.

13 MS. STROUD: I would say that that reading
14 is correct. That the implementation -- yes, I would
15 agree with what you said.

16 MR. SARTER: Okay. Thank you. And so,
17 the other question I have is, does my initiative
18 state that the policy it adopts is to be carried
19 out by district agencies and that implementation
20 is subject to appropriations approved by the
21 Council?

22 MS. STROUD: Your initiative does state

1 that.

2 MR. SARTER: Okay. Thank you. Those are
3 the only questions I have for now.

4 CHAIR THOMPSON: All right. Okay.
5 Thank you so much. We appreciate you being here.

6 Is there anybody else we need to hear from either
7 in favor or opposed to the initiative?

8 MS. STROUD: So, the OAG and the General
9 Counsel for the Council, I don't see that they --
10 does anyone from the General Counsel for the
11 Council's office or the Office of the Attorney
12 General present on the line to -- that wishes to
13 make a statement with respect to the measure?

14 If so, raise your hand or indicate so in
15 the Q&A.

16 (Pause.)

17 CHAIR THOMPSON: All right. Yeah, so not
18 seeing anybody, at this time I'll ask the General
19 Counsel if there's a recommendation for our board
20 to consider.

21 MS. STROUD: Yes. I would recommend that
22 the Board reject this matter on the grounds that

1 it does not propose a law.

2 As I indicated, electors may propose laws.

3 And while it is true that an initiative may require
4 later council action to implement the law, voter
5 approval must itself enact binding legal authority
6 or standards and I think that this measure contains
7 language throughout that provides that it does not
8 do so.

9 Throughout the text of the initiative
10 there are -- it repeatedly indicates that it would
11 not have independent legal effect.

12 For example, Section 3B states this is a
13 statement of policy only. Section 3C provides that
14 no provision has independent legal effect without
15 separate council action. Section 7B states that
16 it functions solely as a statement of policy.

17 And other language in the operative
18 provisions of the measure do not enact binding law
19 upon voter approval or upon the occurrence of stated
20 conditions.

21 For example, Section 4 says that district
22 agencies may develop public home ownership units

1 only if the council separately appropriates funds,
2 and that's fine, the council -- this is subject to
3 appropriation, so -- or authorizes land use.

4 Section 2A defines public home ownership
5 units as units constructed and sold only if
6 separately authorized by the council.

7 Section 2B says that the affordability
8 formula must be established by regulation and
9 approved by the council. Section 6 says that agency
10 rulemaking may occur only after council
11 authorization.

12 So, taken together, the measure conditions
13 the existence of legal authority on subsequent
14 discretionary legislative action by the council.

15 So, voter approval doesn't seem, by the
16 terms of the measure, to alter legal rights, duties,
17 or authority.

18 Instead, it functions as an endorsement
19 of policy preferences and a request for future
20 legislation.

21 I do not think the measure appropriates
22 funds based on the language, but I do not think that

1 the measure sets into motion the effectuation of
2 policy as law.

3 I think that the council has to do a lot
4 of -- take a lot of actions in order to create the
5 law that I think is the underlying motivation for
6 this measure.

7 And so, because of that, I would say that
8 the measure does not propose a law and is not a proper
9 subject for initiative.

10 CHAIR THOMPSON: Yeah, I appreciate that.

11 There are contingencies within contingencies as
12 you read through this.

13 There's some general direction in terms
14 of a statement in favor of public housing, but it
15 quickly leaves open several areas of additional
16 legislation that the Council would have to address.

17 So, even if it were passed as a provisional
18 statement, there's a lot of blanks to fill in here.

19 And it's, you know, never easy to make this
20 distinction between when does a law become a law,
21 like, when is something legislative in character,
22 but it's probably more in line with the initiative

1 that we decline on the same basis.

2 I think that General Counsel for the DC
3 Council cited one of our former BOE administrative
4 opinions on this issue, the university incubator
5 initiative. Looks like it's from 2018.

6 So, I had a chance to read that and the
7 several cases that are cited and I'm inclined to
8 agree with our general counsel here.

9 You know, having said all that, I'm ready
10 to make a motion unless my fellow board member would
11 like to deliberate for a little while.

12 MEMBER GREENFIELD: Yeah, I think just --
13 and I think I'm inclined to agree with you, because
14 I think my understanding and, Terri, what you're
15 saying is, you know, if the Council action were
16 probably more narrow like appropriation of funds
17 to things they have to do, that would be different,
18 but this seems to say you can't do anything without
19 council action. So, I'm not sure what we would be
20 enacting.

21 MS. STROUD: So, I guess a question for
22 Mr. Sarter would be, if the Council were to fund

1 this, would there be nothing left for them to do
2 or would there still be other things for them to
3 do in terms of legislation in order to make this
4 happen?

5 (Pause.)

6 MS. STROUD: Mr. Sarter?

7 MR. SARTER: I'm unmuted now. Thank you
8 for you guys' reply -- response. So, I would say,
9 I guess, to answer your question -- so, to clarify
10 -- so, any reference of -- any council approval or
11 reference, that's solely through, I guess, the
12 normal budget and appropriations process for
13 implementation.

14 MS. STROUD: Or regular legislative action.

15 MR. SARTER: Well, yes, that as well. So,
16 but just speaking simply from this -- the ballot
17 measure, so I guess it's simply a matter of, I guess,
18 not a legality issue, but more so interpretation
19 because, I guess, the -- including the Attorney
20 General, he interprets it the same way as that any
21 council approval that is referenced through this
22 ballot measure is simply referring to the normal

1 budget and appropriations process. Meaning, that,
2 no matter what, in order for this program to come
3 into action, it needs funding, which comes from DC
4 Council.

5 MS. STROUD: Well, there are actions
6 outside of simply funding the measure that, based
7 on the text of the measure, would have to happen
8 outside of an appropriation to support the program.

9 MR. SARTER: That's filed from the other
10 DC agencies, as mentioned in the text.

11 CHAIR THOMPSON: All right. Well, thank
12 you so much for that. You know, I do want to state
13 on the record, of course, some of the comments
14 adopted by the Attorney General's opinion, which
15 is that, of course, voter initiatives are to be
16 liberally construed and, you know, we should respect
17 the right of the voters to propose legislation that
18 is coextensive with the power of the DC Council to
19 make legislation itself.

20 There's a lot of support for that in the
21 two main cases that were cited. So, but it's not
22 the case that every initiative that contains ideas,

1 you know, is appropriate to take to the voters.

2 I think this one just simply lacks enough
3 direction. It's too contingent on too many things
4 that the Council, in turn, would have to legislate
5 about to give any kind of clear direction.

6 I think the voters would be quite confused
7 by it, is kind of what I'm thinking about as what
8 -- how would you explain what you're asking them
9 to vote for.

10 Maybe I'll just try to give an example,
11 like, maybe something less complex would be once
12 upon a time a statement by the voters that they would
13 like marijuana to be legal in the District of
14 Columbia. I mean, that's pretty clear statement
15 of policy.

16 The administrative details of how that
17 comes about would be, you know, for the Council to
18 add.

19 That's probably a statement of policy that
20 would come on the -- that would pass the test for
21 voter initiative, but this one just seems to have
22 too many layers of unknowns within it to even give

1 a clear idea of what it is -- what type of policy,
2 even, that the voters are asked to endorse.

3 But I'm not saying -- I mean, I think you
4 could -- this could be redone in a way that has more
5 clear direction, more specificity to it that would
6 be very fair for the voters to consider.

7 And if passed, something for the Council
8 to grapple with, because underneath this all is
9 obviously a preference for public housing. I mean,
10 that's a very serious and important thing that we
11 all talk about all the time.

12 So, I'm just making these comments ad hoc
13 that, you know, there's probably a way to draft a
14 policy statement that puts that squarely in front
15 of the voters for an initiative and, in turn, to
16 the Council to consider how to go about doing that.

17 As it's drafted, anyway, especially
18 Section 4, I'm inclined to agree with our general
19 counsel and, unfortunately, would make a motion that
20 we conclude that this is not a proper subject for
21 voter initiative.

22 MS. STROUD: Okay. And with that, we'll

1 take -- do we have a motion?

2 CHAIR THOMPSON: Yeah, I -- that's a motion.

3 MS. STROUD: Okay. So, we'll take a roll
4 call vote with respect to the motion.

5 CHAIR THOMPSON: Chair votes aye.

6 MS. STROUD: Oh, did you second the motion,
7 Karyn? I just want to --

8 MEMBER GREENFIELD: Second.

9 MS. STROUD: Okay. We'll take a roll call
10 vote with respect to the motion.

11 Mr. Chair?

12 CHAIR THOMPSON: Aye.

13 MS. STROUD: Madam Greenfield?

14 MEMBER GREENFIELD: Aye.

15 MS. STROUD: Okay. And with that, we have
16 a roll call vote to accept the recommendation of
17 the Office of the General Counsel, which would be
18 to reject the measure as not presenting a law. And
19 with that, the matter is closed and a written order
20 will issue shortly.

21 And the next item on my agenda is an
22 enforcement hearing. This is in the matter of Margo

1 Falls.

2 This enforcement matter concerns the
3 voting and return of a mail ballot issued to another
4 registered voter in the District of Columbia 2024
5 general election, and the matter will be presented
6 by Senior Staff Attorney Christine Pembroke.

7 MS. PEMBROKE: Good morning, members of
8 the Board. As the General Counsel indicated, this
9 is an enforcement matter.

10 It came to our attention as a result of
11 a report produced by the Electronic Registration
12 Information Center that showed a particular voter
13 voted twice in the 2024 general election, once in
14 Maryland and once in the District of Columbia.

15 As a result of that report of illegal
16 voting activity, we opened an investigation and went
17 and looked at the scan of the mail ballot return
18 envelope in the District of Columbia.

19 So, the District of Columbia ballot was
20 cast by mail and we scan those ballot return
21 envelopes into our system.

22 And the scan of that ballot return envelope

1 showed very clearly that the envelope was signed
2 by another voter whose name is Margo Falls.

3 I reached out to Ms. Falls to let her know
4 that we had evidence that she had wrongfully cast
5 a ballot mailed and intended for another voter.
6 So, she wrongfully cast a ballot of another
7 individual.

8 And I had a pre-hearing conference with
9 her and she didn't recall casting that ballot.

10 So, after the pre-hearing conference, I
11 sent her the image of the scan of that ballot return
12 envelope and she quickly acknowledged that that
13 indeed was her signature.

14 And we had a subsequent pre-hearing
15 conference and she entered into a stipulated
16 agreement whereby she acknowledged that she
17 unintentionally cast a mail ballot that was issued
18 to another voter.

19 As you know, this sometimes happens when
20 a mail ballot goes to a resident's address. And,
21 in this case, the voter who popped up on the ERIC
22 report had the same address as Ms. Falls.

1 So, the ballot was mailed to her address,
2 but the name appearing on the ballot return envelope
3 was for another voter and she just didn't recognize
4 that it was actually intended for another individual
5 and accidentally cast that ballot.

6 So, she cooperated with the investigation,
7 entered into the stipulated agreement.

8 As part of that stipulation, the General
9 Counsel, subject to a few conditions, agreed to cap
10 her recommendation of a fine and that's where we
11 are.

12 Ms. Falls is here. I don't know if the
13 Board wants to hear from her.

14 CHAIR THOMPSON: Oh, yeah. Yes, please.

15 MS. PEMBROKE: And, Ms. Falls, when you
16 unmute yourself, if you could state your name and
17 address for the record? Thank you.

18 MS. FALLS: Good morning. My name is Margo
19 Falls and my address is 2114 I, that's the letter
20 I, Street, N.E., Apartment 301, Washington, D.C.
21 20002.

22 MS. PEMBROKE: Okay. Thank you.

1 And, Ms. Falls, do you have anything that
2 you would like to say with respect to the (audio
3 interference) about the stipulated agreement?

4 MS. FALLS: Well, the only thing I could
5 -- have to say is that I -- when it was first
6 presented to me, I didn't understand because I have
7 never did anything like this before.

8 And I, you know, didn't have no knowledge
9 of me doing it until it was sent to me and I said,
10 oh, yeah, that is my signature, but I don't know
11 how I did it.

12 And I don't -- I'm assuming that because
13 in a rush and not looking when I thought that I was
14 filling out my form, signing it in and it wasn't.

15 So, with that, I acknowledge that it was
16 my fault that this had happened, but it wasn't
17 intentionally at all because I never done nothing
18 like this.

19 MS. PEMBROKE: Thank you, Ms. Falls.

20 CHAIR THOMPSON: Yeah, thank you so much
21 for that. We appreciate your comment. Thank you
22 for agreeing to the stipulation.

1 I've often analogized this sort of thing
2 to, like, a traffic ticket. It's -- in the era of
3 mail ballots, you know, we've seen people
4 inadvertently, mistakenly, not intentionally, but
5 fill out somebody else's ballot.

6 And our course of action here has been to
7 impose a modest administrative fine, which I think
8 is built into this stipulation, right?

9 MS. STROUD: It is.

10 CHAIR THOMPSON: \$100, I think?

11 MS. STROUD: It is, um-hm. Yes.

12 (Simultaneous speaking.)

13 MS. STROUD: Yes. And my recommendation
14 would be that the Board accept the stipulated
15 agreement which was signed by myself and Ms. Falls,
16 and that the Board agree to impose a civil fine of
17 \$100 for erroneous voting and that we not refer her
18 to either the OAG or the US Attorney's office.

19 CHAIR THOMPSON: Okay.

20 MS. STROUD: She has acknowledged that she
21 made a mistake.

22 CHAIR THOMPSON: Erroneous voting, that's

1 the phrase I was looking for.

2 MS. STROUD: Okay.

3 CHAIR THOMPSON: The Chair so moves that
4 we accept the stipulation.

5 MEMBER GREENFIELD: I second.

6 MS. STROUD: Okay. We'll take a roll call
7 vote with respect to the motion.

8 Mr. Chair?

9 CHAIR THOMPSON: Aye.

10 MS. STROUD: Member Greenfield?

11 MEMBER GREENFIELD: Aye.

12 MS. STROUD: And with that, the agreement
13 that was entered into by the Office of General
14 Counsel and Ms. Falls is accepted.

15 The Board has imposed a fine of \$100
16 against Ms. Falls for erroneous voting, which is
17 to be paid in accordance with the terms of the
18 stipulated agreement. And with that, the matter
19 is closed.

20 CHAIR THOMPSON: Okay.

21 MS. FALLS: Thank you.

22 CHAIR THOMPSON: Thank you.

1 MS. STROUD: Thank you, Ms. Falls.

2 The next item on my agenda is litigation
3 status. I'll be reporting on activities since the
4 Board's last meeting on January 14th.

5 The first matter is Stacia Hall versus the
6 Board. This is in the U.S. Court of Appeals for
7 the DC Circuit. This case challenges legislation
8 permitting noncitizens to vote in local elections
9 and is before the DC Circuit on remand following
10 a standing determination.

11 Since the Board's last meeting, the
12 plaintiffs filed their opposition to the Board's
13 motion to dismiss on January 20th. And the Board's
14 reply brief is due on February 17th.

15 The next matter is Charles Wilson versus
16 Muriel Bowser, et al. And that's in DC Superior
17 Court.

18 The plaintiffs here challenge the Board's
19 proper subject determination and formulation of
20 Initiative 83.

21 The Board and interveners timely filed
22 reply briefs on the pending dispositive motions on

1 January 16th.

2 The Board also filed a motion to expedite
3 and a motion to strike portions of plaintiff's
4 omnibus response.

5 Interveners responded to the motion to
6 expedite on January 21st, the Board replied on
7 January 27th, and plaintiffs filed an opposition
8 to the Motion to Strike on January 30th. The Court
9 has scheduled a further status hearing for March
10 13th.

11 The next matter is Long versus the Board.
12 It's in D.C. Superior Court. This matter concerns
13 a claim for damages related to an alleged overdraft
14 fee tied to election worker compensation.

15 There has been no docketed activity in this
16 matter following the federal court's February 2025
17 remand.

18 The next matter is Sobin versus the Board.
19 This is in the US District Court for DC. The
20 plaintiff alleges ADA violations related to the
21 petition circulation process and challenges the
22 legality of an ANC election.

1 There has been no court action since the
2 Board's last meeting and the motion to dismiss
3 remains pending.

4 The final matter is the US Department of
5 Justice versus the Board. This action seeks
6 production of the Board's full voter file, including
7 personal identifying information.

8 The DOJ served the Office of the Attorney
9 General, which is handling the matter for the Board,
10 on January 30th. And the Board was served, in
11 person, on February 2nd.

12 A status conference and motions hearing
13 on motions to intervene are scheduled for tomorrow,
14 February 5th.

15 And that concludes the litigation status
16 and my report in its entirety.

17 CHAIR THOMPSON: All right. Thank you so
18 much.

19 And with that, we'll turn to the Office
20 of Campaign Finance. And we have with us today --
21 it's General Counsel Mr. William SanFord.

22 MR. SANFORD: Good morning, Mr. Chairman

1 and distinguished Board Member Greenfield.

2 On January 21st, 2026, the Office of
3 Campaign Finance presented before Advisory
4 Neighborhood Commission Single-Member District
5 1A04 and provided the ANC commissioners with
6 information regarding the traditional and fair
7 elections programs.

8 During the month of January 2026, the
9 Office of Campaign Finance certified five
10 candidates in the fair elections program for the
11 2026 election.

12 The five candidates were the following:

13 Brian for D.C., certified on January 5th,
14 2026;

15 Miguel for Ward 1, certified on January
16 5th, 2026;

17 Janeese for D.C., Principal Campaign
18 Committee, certified on January 8th, 2026;

19 Rashida for Ward 1, Principal Campaign
20 Committee, certified on the 22nd of January 2026.

21 And Gloria for Ward 6, certified on the
22 13th of January, 2026.

1 In the Public Information and Records
2 Management Division, there were seven required
3 filers regarding the constituent services program.

4 Six filed timely and one extension was granted.

5 In the senators, representatives
6 statehood funds requirements for January, four
7 required filers filed timely.

8 Additional candidate committees for 2026,
9 the compliance numbers were the traditional
10 candidate committees, political action committees,
11 independent expenditure committees, fair election
12 committees are still under review, the January 31st
13 required filing and those figures will be published
14 at a later date.

15 There were six new registrants or
16 candidates for mayor in January 2026. They were
17 Muhshin Umar, registered on the 7th of January 2026;

18 Kenyan McDuffie registered on the 14th of
19 January 2026;

20 Adrian Byrd registered on the 16th of
21 January 2026;

22 Ernest Johnson registered on the 23rd of

1 January 2026;

2 David Gatling registered on the 26th of
3 January 2026;

4 and Christopher Edward Rossi registered
5 on the 28th of January 2026.

6 Six candidates for the At-Large Council
7 position registered in January 2026. They were the
8 following:

9 Dyana Forester registered on the 12th of
10 January 2026;

11 Michael Graham registered on the 16th of
12 January 2026;

13 Kevin Chavous registered on the 13th of
14 January 2026;

15 Gregory Jackson registered on the 27th of
16 January 2026;

17 and Dwight Davis registered on the 28th
18 of January 2026.

19 One candidate registered for council
20 chair. That was current chairperson Phil
21 Mendelson, who registered on the 28th of January
22 2026.

1 Four candidates registered for the Council
2 At-Large Special Election January in 2026. They
3 were the following individuals:

4 Khalil Lee, January 5th, 2026;

5 Elissa Silverman, January 21st, 2026;

6 Juan McCullum, January 23rd, 2026;

7 and Edward Daniels on January 23rd, 2026.

8 One candidate registered for the Ward 1
9 council position in January and that candidate was
10 Jett James Jasper, registered on the 26th of January
11 2026.

12 In the report's Audits and Analysis
13 Division, three final audits were issued. On
14 January 19th, the Audit Division issued a final
15 compliance audit to the T. Michelle Colson, the
16 State Board of Education for Ward 4 Committee.

17 On January 28th, the Audit Division issued
18 a noncompliance audit for the Committee to elect
19 Eboni-Rose Thompson.

20 And an additional noncompliance audit was
21 issued to the Committee to elect Eboni-Rose Thompson
22 in the Fair Elections Division on the 28th of

1 January. Both noncompliance audits have been
2 referred to the Office of the General Counsel.

3 In the Office of the General Counsel during
4 the month of January 2026, two referrals were
5 received, three informal hearings were completed,
6 and three orders were issued, which included fines
7 of \$5,300 that were all imposed against Jacque
8 Patterson.

9 Separate committees, Patterson for Ward
10 8 received the fine of \$850, Jacque for DC 2024
11 received a fine of \$1,100, and Jacque for DC 2024
12 received an additional fine of \$3,350.

13 During the month of January 2026, there
14 were no open investigations pending before the
15 Office of Campaign Finance, no requests for
16 interpretive opinions were received, and no show
17 cause proceedings were conducted.

18 The entire Director's Report and the
19 Office of General Counsel's Report will be published
20 at the Office of Campaign Finance website under the
21 Reports and Data section by close of business on
22 today's date, the 5th of February 2026. And that

1 concludes our report.

2 CHAIR THOMPSON: All right. Thank you
3 very much. With that, we'll turn to public comment.

4 We always welcome comment from our
5 District of Columbia residents and I see Nikolas
6 Schiller is here and has his hand raised.

7 If you could state your name and address,
8 and we'd like to hear from you for about three
9 minutes.

10 MR. SCHILLER: All right. Can you hear me
11 okay?

12 CHAIR THOMPSON: Yeah.

13 MR. SCHILLER: All right. Nikolas
14 Schiller, 2448 Massachusetts Avenue, N.W.,
15 Washington, D.C. 20008.

16 A couple things. I would like to
17 reiterate what I brought up last month about the
18 publication of the rulemaking in advance of it going
19 to the Register so constituents and voters can ask
20 questions for clarity before submitting comments.

21 I'd like to -- I have a comment about the
22 validity of signatures change. The old text said

1 the petition -- 1007 validity of signatures of
2 petitions does not include the address of the
3 signer. And then it's changed to, the petition does
4 not include the address of the signer or the address
5 entered by the signer is illegible.

6 So, there was a change basically adding,
7 or the address entered by the signer is illegible.

8 And my question concerning that is if a
9 voter is able to be found in the voter roll, they
10 sign their name, you can read their name, their
11 address you can't read, but their signature matches
12 and their name matches a unique voter, if their
13 address is now illegible, would that signature be
14 then thrown out?

15 So, that's my question on the change
16 because the old version says it's completely blank.

17 Like, the petition does not include the
18 address of the signer. So, it's totally blank.

19 The new, revised regulation says that it
20 could be blank, but it could also be illegible and
21 how do we find illegibility in -- that's one
22 question, but the other question is, if that voter's

1 name and signature are found in the voter roll while
2 their address, in itself, is illegible, does that
3 signature still count? So, that's my question.

4 Following up to that, separate matter, on
5 the 13th of January -- I'm sorry, the 16th of January
6 the campaign that I'm involved with, the More
7 Affordable DC Campaign Committee, the proposer went
8 to the front office of the Board of Elections to
9 resubmit legislative text.

10 As you know, last month the legislative
11 text for the second iteration of that ballot
12 initiative was found not to be proper subject
13 matter.

14 The campaign had intended to resubmit a
15 third version while keeping the second version
16 active.

17 When the proposer came to the Board of
18 Elections office, they were told by staff that in
19 order to resubmit new legislative text, they were
20 forced to withdraw that ballot initiative.

21 By withdrawing that ballot initiative, the
22 campaign forfeited the ability to take the Board

1 of Elections to court to determine -- or to compel
2 the Board to accept that as proper subject matter.

3 The campaign intended to go forward with
4 that because there are about 50 different special
5 purpose funds that are essentially, I guess,
6 dictated by Hessey that it cannot be touched through
7 the ballot initiative process.

8 And, you know, the campaign wished to
9 actually move forward with that, but they were told
10 by the staff that in order to submit a new ballot
11 initiative, they had to withdraw the old one. So,
12 my question is, were the staff incorrect in that
13 respect?

14 Two, the previous ballot initiative, the
15 foie gras ballot initiative, they were allowed to
16 submit two ballot initiatives at the same time.

17 In fact, the last agenda for last month
18 included both their ballot initiatives on there.

19 So, would the Board of Elections make a
20 mistake on that or is there -- I mean, my read on
21 the regulations is that it's actually silent on
22 that. That a campaign can submit multiple ballot

1 initiatives if they so choose.

2 So, those are my two things. I
3 appreciate your time and your service to the people
4 of the District of Columbia.

5 CHAIR THOMPSON: Thank you very much for
6 those two very specific questions. It may take us
7 some time to drill down on this, but I -- the first
8 question, I think you're referring to the
9 regulations at 1407.1, subparagraph F.

10 MS. STROUD: Or E.

11 CHAIR THOMPSON: E?

12 MS. STROUD: You're talking about --

13 MR. SCHILLER: That's correct.

14 Subparagraph E.

15 MS. STROUD: E?

16 MR. SCHILLER: Correct.

17 MS. STROUD: Okay. Yes.

18 CHAIR THOMPSON: Do you want to comment
19 on that?

20 MS. STROUD: Right. So, I think the answer
21 is that a determination would have to be made.

22 We'd have to see because this was a

1 specific request from the registrar of voters who
2 is going to actually come in to speak to why this
3 change was requested, but I don't think that there
4 is anything that is problematic with the regulation
5 as drafted.

6 And certainly, Mr. Schiller, the
7 opportunity to submit, in writing, comments so that
8 we can really consider it -- and we understand that
9 you might have some concern with it, but I think
10 that the best forum is to take advantage of the
11 opportunity to provide written comments regarding
12 the regulation so that we can consider it, which
13 is the purpose for the opportunity to provide
14 comment. And, again, that is open for comment and
15 it has been since January 23rd.

16 And then with respect to the second matter
17 --

18 CHAIR THOMPSON: Can I just comment on that
19 real quick?

20 MS. STROUD: Yes, um-hm.

21 CHAIR THOMPSON: I'd also note that 1407.2
22 says the Board may waive a defect for good cause

1 --

2 MS. STROUD: Um-hm.

3 CHAIR THOMPSON: -- notwithstanding the
4 details of 1407.1. So, in the scenario you
5 mentioned where the voter's identified, the name
6 is known, if an address is illegible, that strikes
7 me as something that's curable.

8 It may take a little bit of work in the
9 challenge stage, but it doesn't strike me as
10 something that's fatal --

11 MS. STROUD: That's correct, yeah.

12 CHAIR THOMPSON: -- in any event. So, I
13 -- but I think it's important for us to drill down
14 on this and thank you so much for that question.

15 MS. STROUD: And I cannot speak to, and
16 I don't want to, you know, respond with respect to
17 something that happened in the front office that
18 I was not aware, but what was your question with
19 respect to what is permissible?

20 MR. SCHILLER: Does a campaign committee
21 have to withdraw a ballot initiative to resubmit
22 a ballot initiative?

1 So, we were told at the front office by
2 staff that in order to submit our third draft of
3 the ballot initiative, we had to withdraw the second
4 one.

5 Well, that day we were preparing legal
6 briefs to take the Board to court, but we couldn't
7 take the Board to court the moment we withdrew that
8 ballot initiative because it becomes moot at that
9 point. So, that's the question.

10 Is a campaign required to withdraw before
11 they can resubmit?

12 MS. STROUD: No.

13 MR. SCHILLER: Okay.

14 MS. STROUD: And my understanding, you
15 know, is that the -- my understanding was that the
16 campaign said or indicated that it would be
17 withdrawing the measure, if we're talking about the
18 same one.

19 so, I am not -- but, no, that's not the
20 case. And so, we will determine what actually
21 happened, but I was not aware that you were told
22 that you had to in order to resubmit an updated

1 version.

2 My understanding was that you intended --
3 or the campaign intended to withdraw the measure.

4 MR. SCHILLER: Okay. Well, I don't want
5 to get into the weeds of it. My understanding, from
6 the proposer, is that he was told by the front office
7 staff in order to resubmit, you had to withdraw.

8 And so, he felt coerced into that respect
9 where he was like I'm here to resubmit, and they're
10 telling me I have to withdraw, so I'm going to
11 withdraw.

12 He didn't know, by withdrawing, that it
13 also ended the campaign's ability to take legal
14 action on the matter. He just didn't know the ins
15 and outs of the law, so to speak.

16 So, when a staff member says, you have to
17 withdraw this in order to resubmit it, he's like,
18 okay, we want to keep moving forward, but they didn't
19 know that the act of withdrawing, submitting the
20 withdraw, ended the ability to take action or compel
21 the Board to accept the second draft of the ballot
22 initiative as proper subject matter.

1 So, it was kind of frustrating on my end
2 and I think it might be something to instruct all
3 staff that if a campaign is resubmitting a ballot
4 initiative, they are not required to withdraw the
5 previous iteration of it.

6 That if it's like, you know, standard, all
7 the staff know that this is how it is, then, in the
8 future, if a proposer comes in, they're not being
9 told incorrect information.

10 CHAIR THOMPSON: Thank you so much. Our
11 registrar is here.

12 Marissa Corrente, did you want to address
13 some of these issues?

14 MS. CORRENTE: Good morning. Thank you.

15 CHAIR THOMPSON: Yeah.

16 MS. CORRENTE: Again, my name is Marissa
17 Corrente. I serve as the registrar. I pulled the
18 different iterations, which are three, of the
19 initiative that have been submitted or withdrawn,
20 and talked to staff who signed off on the forms.

21 And staff's recollection of the event is
22 that they just -- on the 16th, they asked if the

1 proposer wanted to withdraw the initiative. They
2 didn't feel or remember that they forced them to.

3 They asked the question and the proposer
4 said, yes. So, they provided the documentation and
5 moved forward as they did.

6 So, I will of course go over everything
7 with the team and make sure that we're clear, but
8 their recollection of the event does not necessarily
9 align. So --

10 CHAIR THOMPSON: Yeah, it doesn't make
11 sense that they would say that.

12 MS. CORRENTE: And, you know, I obviously,
13 like, yeah. So, we have documentation of what to
14 do and we'll just -- I'll talk to the team about
15 it --

16 MR. SCHILLER: Okay.

17 MS. CORRENTE: -- but just wanted to share
18 that we have --

19 MR. SCHILLER: Yeah.

20 MS. CORRENTE: -- followed up on this and
21 share what I found.

22 CHAIR THOMPSON: Well, thanks for stepping

1 in to address that.

2 MS. STROUD: And I just want to add I think
3 that when -- and I'm looking at email -- an email
4 exchange that took place and I recall that it was
5 indicated that new language was going to be
6 submitted.

7 And I asked that, you know, I be advised
8 as to your intention concerning the measure that
9 we discussed today -- or yesterday, and this was
10 with respect to the meeting that we had on the
11 previous measure.

12 And, you know, there was -- so, I know that
13 I asked what the intention was, which should make
14 clear that it's not -- you're not required. I
15 wanted to know what you intended to do with respect
16 to one measure versus the other.

17 And then when you came in and it was
18 indicated that you were withdrawing the measure
19 that, you know, so there was no indication that you
20 were required to turn in. I wanted to ask what you
21 intended to do with respect to the measure.

22 MR. SCHILLER: Understood and I appreciate

1 your context. I think -- because I was on that email
2 chain that morning.

3 I think it was just a misunderstanding with
4 the proposer who was not fully, I guess, did not
5 fully understand the gravity of the withdraw.

6 He knew that they were supposed to submit,
7 and I think we just have a differing of opinion of
8 how it transpired. And I'll settle up there because
9 I think it's water under the bridge, because things
10 are moving forward otherwise. So, I appreciate
11 your time on this.

12 And I don't want to take up too much of
13 your time, but, since Marissa is here, I do have
14 a question, but I'm willing to let others ask other
15 questions if there's other people in the queue ahead
16 of me.

17 CHAIR THOMPSON: Why don't you go ahead
18 and -- because I think we're just about to conclude.

19 MR. SCHILLER: Okay. Concerning
20 Administrative Order 2510 which concerns the
21 requirement of the Initiative 83 petition
22 circulators to attend a DC Board of Elections

1 training, how are campaigns able to know that
2 circulators that they are hiring have completed this
3 training without being required to contact the Board
4 of Elections?

5 I have a more thorough email that I will
6 be sending Marissa and Terri later today, but the
7 general gist is my suggestion is that the Board make
8 a page that lists all the people who have attended
9 the Board of Elections training so that anyone who,
10 you know, wants to be hired as a petition circulator
11 for any campaign into the future, can easily go to
12 the Board of Elections' website and see if that
13 person has attended a training.

14 And that's, you know, Initiative 83
15 circulators, it's candidates, it's whoever has
16 attended a training, because they can be used as
17 that person's -- a skill that they actually can say
18 -- a marketable skill that, yes, I have attended
19 a Board of Elections training as a petition
20 circulator. You can go onto the Board of Elections
21 website and see that I've attended this training.

22 So, instead of creating some sort of, like,

1 black list of people that are subject to the
2 enforcement who might not have ever even changed
3 the petition themselves, that a campaign doesn't
4 have to constantly ask the Board of Elections, hey,
5 can I have the updated training list of who's been
6 trained?

7 And some campaigns are not even aware of
8 the administrative order and they might hire a
9 circulator, and the circulator might attend a
10 training through that campaign and think that
11 they've actually fulfilled the obligation.

12 So, I will send that email later and I
13 appreciate your time on this.

14 MS. CORRENTE: Thank you. Yeah, we'll take
15 that under advisement.

16 CHAIR THOMPSON: Yeah. Thanks so much,
17 yeah. Obviously, on something like that I defer
18 entirely to our registrar and our staff, but we'll
19 certainly think about that.

20 So, I'll just take the opportunity to say
21 thank you to our registrar and her staff. It's an
22 incredibly busy time, obviously, at the Board of

1 Elections, but we're really in full swing here with
2 candidates having picked up petitions.

3 And starting on February 23rd, I think,
4 they're going to start to file their nominating
5 petitions.

6 And then it's really going to be crunch
7 time for a couple of weeks as we cope with assessing
8 those petitions, counting ballot signatures,
9 dealing with challenges and going to adjudication
10 on some of those things.

11 MS. CORRENTE: More like a month and a half.

12 CHAIR THOMPSON: Yeah. Right now, we're
13 looking -- if you ever hiked a big mountain before,
14 you know, it's just a battle. Then you see the peak,
15 like, way up there still like you got a long way
16 to go.

17 So, this is an advanced thank you for how
18 much work is ahead --

19 MS. CORRENTE: Sure.

20 CHAIR THOMPSON: -- for you and your
21 staff.

22 MS. CORRENTE: I would love to just also

1 shout out the team, the voter services team, because
2 they've been working really hard.

3 We've had a huge amount of candidates
4 especially on that first day. I think more people
5 came in on the first day ahead of the snowstorm.

6 CHAIR THOMPSON: Yeah.

7 MS. CORRENTE: And so, they've been doing
8 really incredible work --

9 CHAIR THOMPSON: Yeah.

10 MS. CORRENTE: -- and just want to thank
11 them for everything they're doing to serve DC and,
12 you know, the democratic process.

13 CHAIR THOMPSON: Yeah, really impressive.

14 And we're doing great if anybody out there is
15 wondering. So, thank you.

16 With that, I'll go ahead and move that we
17 adjourn until our next regular meeting, which I
18 think is March -- the first Wednesday in March, I
19 think.

20 Is there a second?

21 MEMBER GREENFIELD: I second.

22 CHAIR THOMPSON: All right. All in favor?


